







HIP TO HICK








The competition in Chicago was much tougher than here in Wyoming, so it wasn't much of a surprise that this tourist-traveling team took state for the sixth year in a







Without the size and power that we had had in previous years, the coaching staff decided to work for good fundamental football. To do this they started the season working on the basics such as blocking and tackling techniques.

The game ended with a score of 20 to 6 and with Cokeville once again the State 1A champions.

Many said it couldn't be done, others said that we were just lucky, but the real fact of the matter is that when they put heir mind to it, the Cokeville Panthers had what it took inside to do the unexpected, even if it was Against All Odds.


With Success



Defending The Title




2 + 3 = x-cellent year







The Takraw assembly gave students the chance to use their technique and athletic concentration in playing games like unto haki-sak.





In the song "I'm Gettin' Nuttin' for Christmas," Nicole Dana and Travis Walker sing about how naughty they have been.












Spooks and Goblins Haunt Rehearsal



Most of the calls taken by Mrs. Rentfro get transferred to the office of the principal, Mr. Dale Lamborn.



With one minute left in the game and the score tied at 30,










Elementary: More Than **Expected**



WORK And Then Some




Little things like this are what make the yearbook so much fun to look at and to keep as a perfect time machine.
