The State Experiment Barn

This barn was built in contract for the State of Wyoming in 1931 by Thomas John Call on property that was originally part of the William Walton Burton Farm. The state acquired this land for experimental efforts in agriculture. The Church Seminary Building was built between 1930 and 1937 by Thomas Call, and moved to this site in 2001.



Dick & Shirley Taylor Barn (Auburn)

Barn was built in 1890s by John Reeves for milk cows and horses and to store hay in the loft. Frank Cranney bought it in 1901 and Dick Taylor bought the Cranney Place in 1966 from King & Kaydra Cranney. Built of red pine from the hills west of the ranch. The barn is no longer used. It has housed many newborn calves and baby lambs in the past. Currently we have 240 acres – down from 1000 acres. Used to calve out 300 cows and lamb out 800 sheep. Now we raise hay and barley for cash crops.

Lloyd Burton Barn (Afton)

Barn was built between 1900 and 1910 by the William Walton Burton Co. and was known as the "Burton Dairy Barn." Built of local lumber from the head of Stumpp Creek. William took a tent up there & stayed all summer to cut logs & haul them to the sawmill in Auburn. Roof was later replaced with the same type as the experimental farm barn. Current use is for storage and to house beef cattle and calves. When the Burtons built this barn they had several creameries around the valley and also had a mercantile store in Afton.

Val and Shelley Pendleton Barn (Thayne)

Built in 1940 for dairy operation by Calvin Pendleton. He milled the red pine lumber himself –it's tongue and groove boards fitted together tightly & painted to protect from weather. The logs were brought from Grover Park by horse teams & sleighs in the winter. Design was typical of the area. It was known as Pendleton Dairy. The barn is loved & family members have carved their initials in the posts between cow milkings. Once owned 550 acres & had 220 milk cows. The barn is currently used for storage.

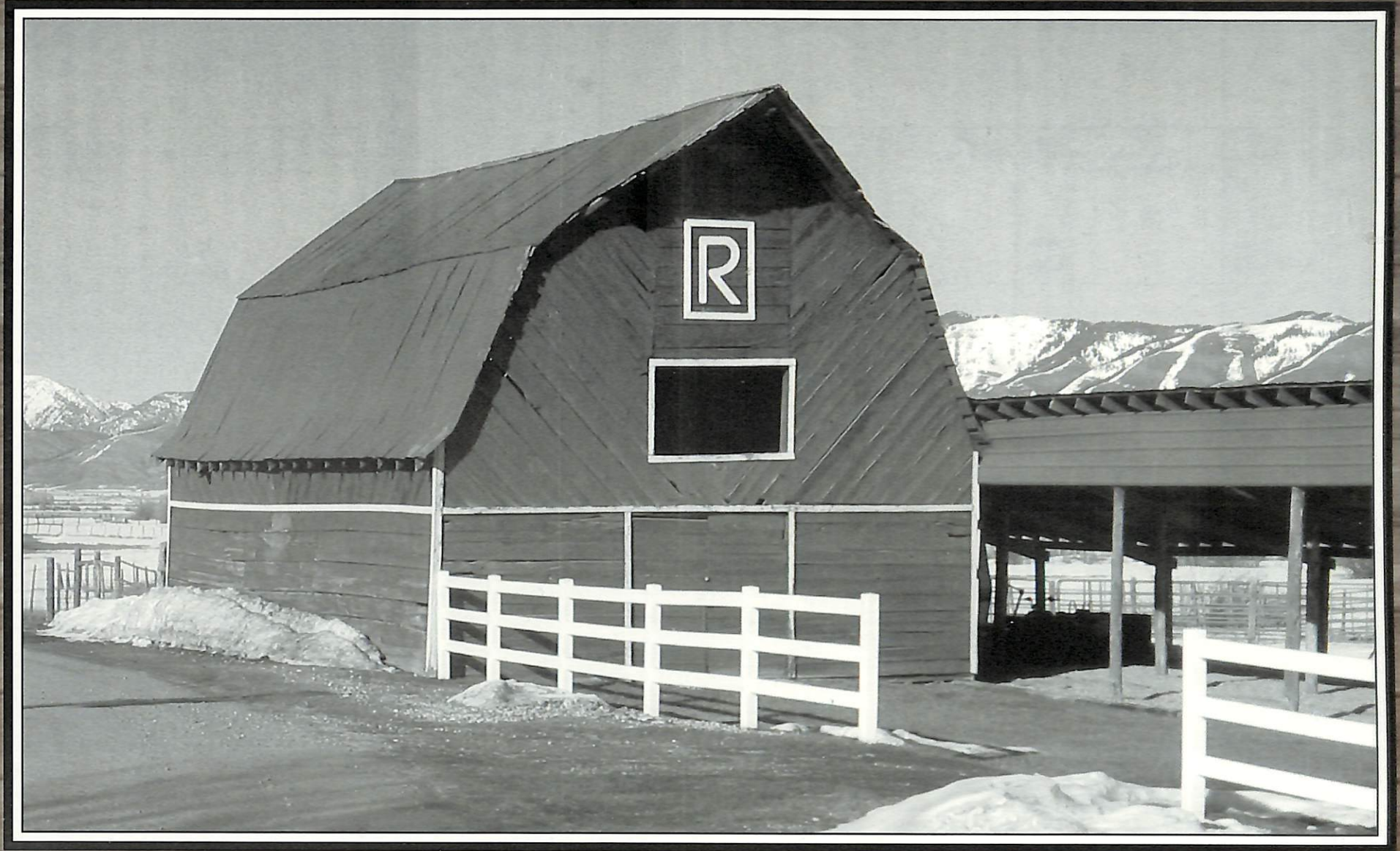


LaMont Merritt Barn (Afton)

Built about 1940 for a dairy barn and also used for storing hay in the loft. Built by Ray Merritt & his boys, D'Orr and LaMont. Has concrete floor and frame sides with rustic (overlap) lumber. Gravel for concrete taken from nearby creek. Concrete was mixed by hand in a barrel type mixer. Logs were hauled from nearby forest & sawed at Gardner's Sawmill. Metal for roof was purchased locally. Current use is for storing baled hay in loft and bottom is used to store household items. Hay is fed to horses used in our hunting camp and cable & pulleys are used to elevate hunting tents for drying and storing.

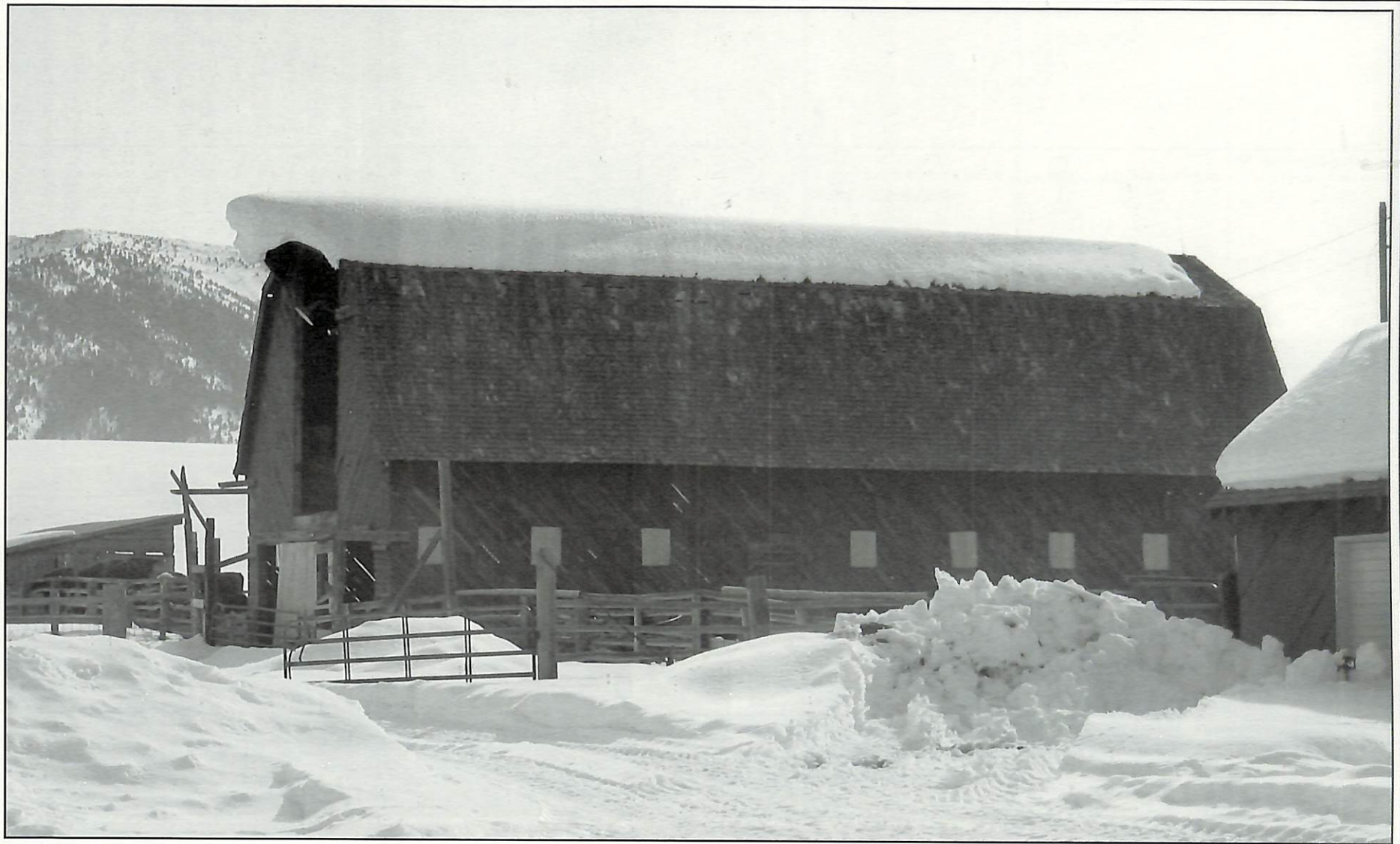


Alvin Robinson Barn (Fairview)

Barn was built in 1930 by Loraine "Dickey" Anglesey & Clarence, Marion & Lavere Hoopes. Purpose was for a cow and horse barn and to store hay and other feed with a tack room for harnesses & saddles. A track with a fork was installed in 1936 to make filling the hayloft easier. It was built with red pine, rough cut lumber from Matthew Alleman's sawmill up Crow Creek. Clarence was a farmer & a freighter on the Crow Creek Road. Current use is for storage. Alvin added the "R" (his brand) & painted it red in the 1990s.

Earl Kinslow Barn (Thayne)

Barn was built in 1950 by George Miller and his son Glen. Materials came from a local sawmill and the design is typical for this area. It was used to store hay in the loft and to house livestock. It has also been used to store machinery. Current use is for hay storage. Mr. Kinslow changed the ground floor to allow tractor use in storing baled hay. The barn is excellent for his operation. He has 272 acres and raises grain and purebred beef livestock.

Donnie Sanderson Barn (Freedom)

This barn was built in 1937 of red pine lumber, with a concrete foundation and a tin roof to let the snow slide off easier. Built by William Sanderson and Swede Robinson. Design is typical for Star Valley. Current use is for a calving operation & shelter for cows. Milk stanchions were removed and pens were made for cows to calve in. It works well and we want to keep it for a long time. Farm consists of 200 acres of alfalfa & grass & beef is raised..

Jack Hemmert/Ken Hokanson Barn (Thayne)

Barn was built in the 1940s and took six months to build. It was built of cinderblock & pine lumber. Gravel from Salt River was used to make the cement. Design was local & was built by Duane Castle and Wilford Hemmert. The purpose was to milk & house 25 dairy cows. The other purpose of the barn was for basketball games in the loft. All the kids in Thayne came to play. It's still used today for basketball. Current use is for calving. Wood stanchions & mangers were taken out in 1969. Farm consists of 500 acres & registered Hereford cattle & hay and grain are raised.

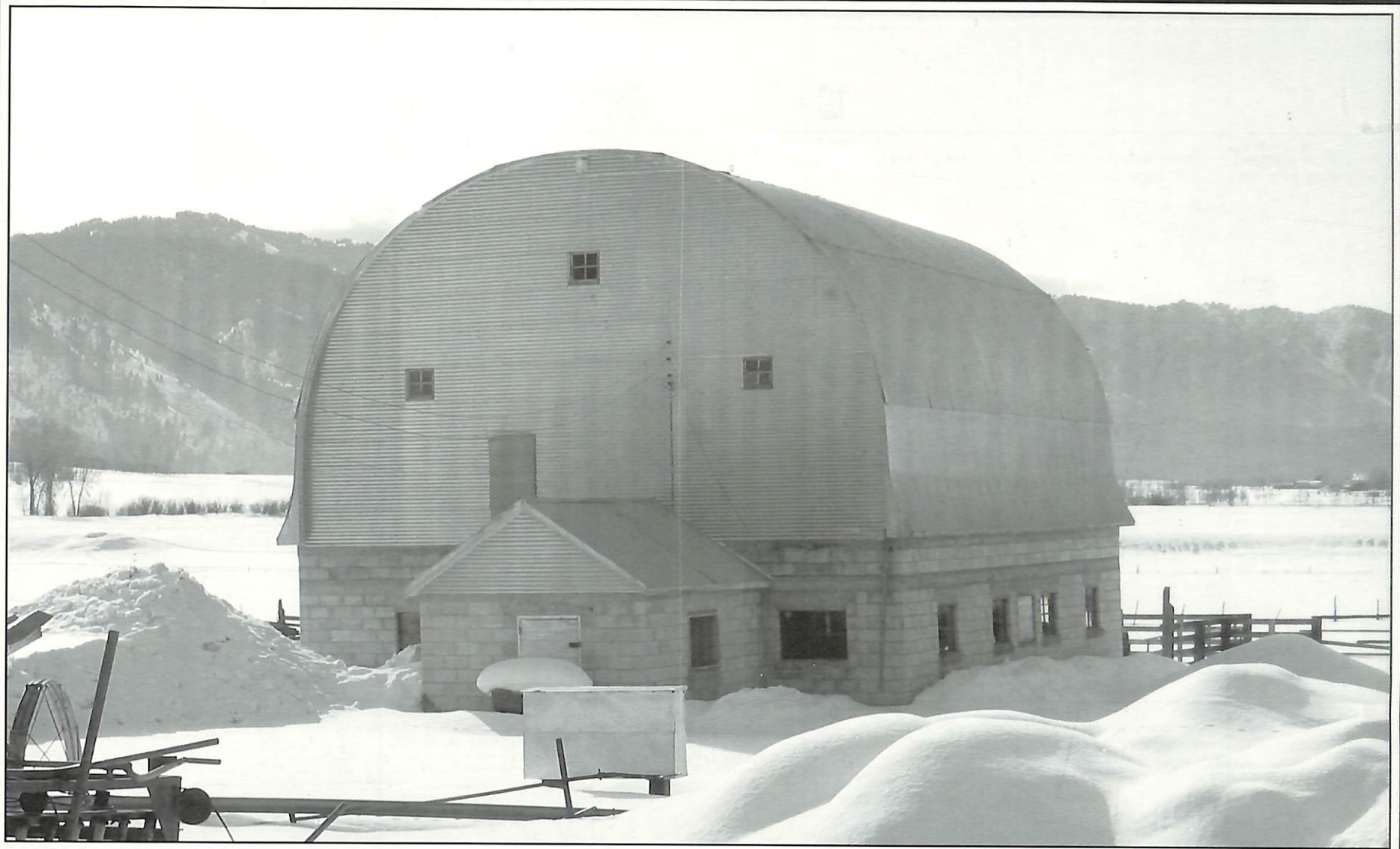


Floyd & Fayone Brown Barn (Thayne)

Barn was built from wood sawed from logs cut by hand & hauled out of the mountains by teams & sleighs and wagons in about 1910. Barn was built by Charley Stoker, Sr. and was typical for the Star Valley area. The purpose of the barn was for horses, dairy cows and lambs. Current use is mostly for storage. There has been no changes in the design, just general repair. It works well for farming operation consisting of 216 acres - hay, some pasture & raising sheep.

Harold Bateman Barn (Bedford)

Barn was built in the 1940s and took two years to build. Purpose was for a dairy barn & to store loose hay in the loft. A round roof was used instead of the usual peaked roof. The barn was made of cinderblock, red pine timber and roofed with metal. It was built by Frank Bateman and Rony Suter and the Bateman family. Current use is for storage. It was an excellent facility for dairy cows. Harold remembers how scary it was to put up the rafters because the roof was so tall. Six posts were added to the middle of the barn later because of the heavy snow load.

Alan Chadwick Barn (Afton)

Harvey Allred, Mitt's brother-in-law, built this barn for the Mitt Barrus Mink, Chinchilla and Fox Farm in the 1930s. It was designed with a round roof to have more room so the loft could be used to store animal pelts for drying and turning. The bottom housed a big grinder and refrigerator to keep meat. The grinder ground meat & bones from dead animals to feed to the mink, fox, and chinchilla. Mitt raised hundreds of these animals from 1936 until 1941. When World War II started the bottom dropped out of the fur market.

Reynold Johnson Barn (Smoot)

Lonnie Garrett Barn (Turnerville)

This barn was built in 1917 by Delos Turner, who was 16, and Clifford Turner, who was 15, with help from neighbors while their father, Rawsel, was on a mission. It was a cow milking barn typical to the area. The foundation was hand mixed concrete with large rocks added. The timber was Douglas Fir sawed at the Turnerville sawmill. Currently, the barn is being made into a gathering place for the family. Plywood was put over the rough lumber in the loft and large windows were put in the gable ends. The lower part will be excavated and new concrete floors will be poured. Restrooms, kitchen and a dining area will be added.

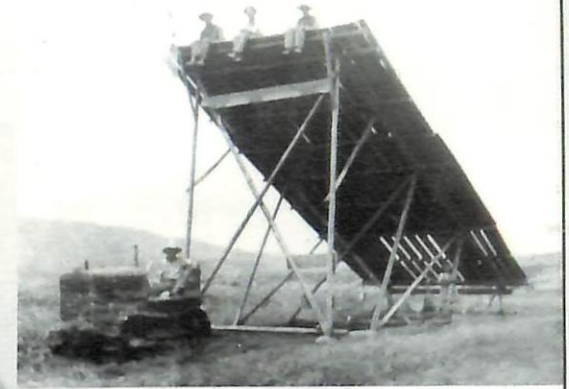


Brett Jones and Mary Button Barn (Thayne)

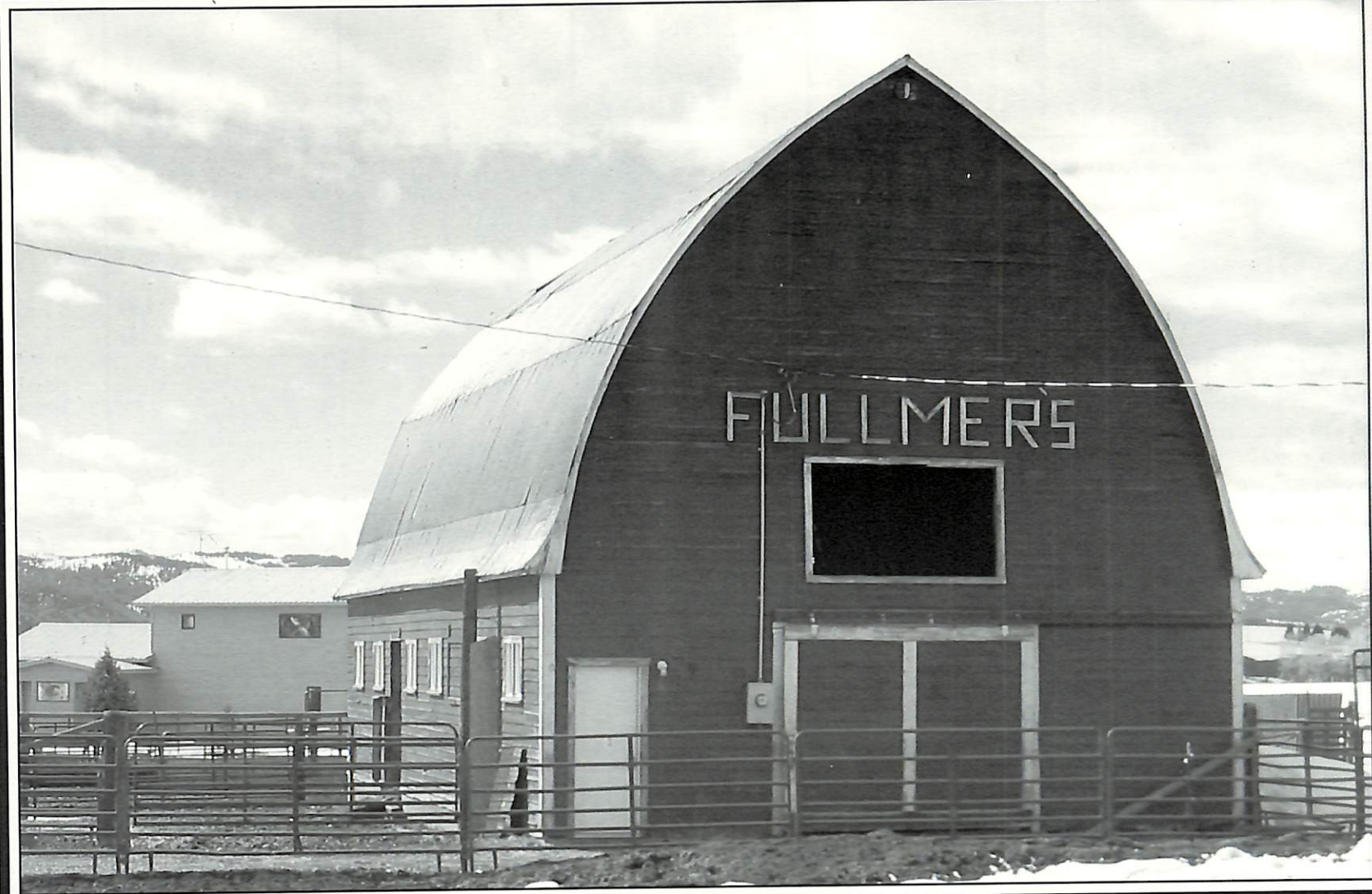

The Tygee Valley Barn

This barn was built for Samuel Draney in Tygee where Wendell and Joyce Draney live, and where Gregg and Lenna Draney and family live. It was built by Charles Welchman about 1930 and was a beautiful barn with four decorative ventilators on the roof. It was used primarily for dairy cows and hay was stored in the loft. This picture shows how the hay was lifted to the loft for storage. The man is Reuel Jenkins and the child on the fence is Imri Draney, son of Samuel Draney. Sadly, the barn collapsed a few years ago.

Barry Fullmer Barn (Bedford)

This dairy barn was built in 1946 by Mr. Seymour whose father-in-law was Marius Call. The Call family were early builders in Star Valley. It's a red pine wood frame patterned after the hull of a ship turned upside down. Guy Fullmer purchased the barn in 1949 and in the 1970s put the Fullmer name across the east end of the barn in large letters. Its current use is as a horse barn. The stanchions were taken out and horse stalls and a tack room were built. It works well for current operation. It's a symbol of the family ranch which has gone from an 800 acre dairy, beef, sheep & crop ranch to a 40 acre horse ranch. The barn is listed in Great Barns of Wyoming under the name of Guy Fullmer.
