



CROW CREEK MONUMENT PROJECT - Ron Anderson & Lane Allred

HALFWAY HOUSE – The Crow Creek Road was the link between the Mormon settlements of Bear Lake and Star Valley for 50 years. The 100 mile round trip between Afton and the railhead at Montpelier would take a team of horses from 3 to 7 days depending on the conditions along the way. Road Ranches were set up to help provide for the needs of the freighters and their draft animals no matter what the weather. Nield Ranch to the north, Camp Giveout and Henggi's Dairy to the south, Halfway House in the middle became the biggest and best of all the stations along Crow Creek Road.

In 1912 Benomi (Noen) and Mary (Maime) Wilkes homesteaded 322 acres where cabins had been built by Hale-Tolman with the mail contract. Mr. & Mrs. Wilkes built Halfway House and a large barn that could house 32 teams and their drivers. This was a Haven for freighters, the mail wagon between Afton & Montpelier, and the daily stage coach where travelers could stop for dinner and a change of horses. Maime telephoned Afton daily to find how many guests were on their way so she could provide a family style meal on her wood-burning range. The bunkhouse had a cook stove for those who wished to cook their own meals. A stop at Halfway was a social event that provided a welcome relief from the hard work of a freighters life. Life at the Halfway House for the Wilkes family ended in 1925 when the state Highway (convict road) pulled the traffic over Salt Creek Pass further east.

WHITE DUGWAY – Clinging to the white shale formation a mile east of the new monument, is the White Dugway. There was moisture in the shale and when frost had it in its grip the road was very slippery. Freighters learned to be cautious as a wagon or sleigh could easily slide off the Dugway and tip over. Around this dangerous point, the first loads of salt were hauled from the Crow Creek salt mines to the Bear Lake Valley. Following the salt road, the first settlers entered Salt River Valley (Star Valley) improving the road as they traveled. For 50 years (1879-1929) the life line of the Star Valley Community was the Crow Creek Road. Cheese, butter, hides, wool, and hogs loaded on sleighs and wagons, moved to the railhead at Montpelier. Machinery and equipment large and small, household goods, food, clothing, and medical supplies were hauled on the return trip. The Star Valley Stage moved mail and passengers daily. New breeding stock (dairy & beef cattle, hogs, sheep & horses) were moved by rail to Montpelier and hauled or driven by this route to Star Valley. Virtually everything coming and going had a little thrill around the White Dugway.

CAMP GIVEOUT – Within 5 years after Apostle Charles C. Rich was called to establish a settlement in Bear Lake Valley, 1868, he looked at western Wyoming as a possible expansion of the Mormon community. By 1879 the Bear Lake Stake of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints extended 90 miles to encompass the Salt River Valley, named Star Valley by visiting Apostle Moses Thatcher in 1878. The closest freight route to the railroad at Montpelier was 50 miles over Beaver Divide. Star Valley, a vast beautiful wilderness, clung to its existence by virtue of the supplies hauled by freighters over Crow Creek Road. By 1889 the population grew to more than 200 families who experienced the first severe winter since 1879. Starving animals were suffering the most but many families were in short supply of food. Men on snowshoes, hauling flour one sack at a time on their back, were not meeting the needs of the people. By March of 1890 the unprepared snowbound Saints sought help from their Stake President, William Budge in Paris, Id. Two experienced snowshoers who had left to seek help from family and friends in the Bear Lake Region, had not been heard from in more than two weeks. A road must be opened through deep & drifted snow in order that provisions and grain might be secured. On 17 March 1890, a company of 29 men with 11 teams of horses set out from Star Valley, wending their way up Crow Creek. The going was very slow. But they finally made it as far as what they named Camp Giveout. In the meantime, the 2 snowshoers had alerted the Bear Lakers who had set out with 18 men to open that end of the road. On the afternoon of 24 March the two parties met and camped below Snowslide Canyon. & traveled to Montpelier the next day. Early the next morning the Star Valley folks left to return to Star Valley with the much needed supplies. Though many animals starved to death, no human lives were lost because of the bad conditions. The station at Camp Giveout lasted only for a short length of time in 1908 a brush fire swept down

SNOWSLIDE CANYON – by 1881, just 5 years following the opening of the Crow Creek Freight Road, freighters had started calling the canyon by that name. snow-slides were frequent on snowy, windy days as drifts would build up on the shale ridge. Unable to hold the steep side hill, the snow would come crashing down on anything in the canyon below, damming off the creek. Over the years many loads were buried and several teams of horses were crippled or killed as they triggered a snowslide while pulling their loads along the road. It was truly a blessing that no man ever lost his life here as several had very close calls. Tommy Ritson was buried with his team while traveling with the Inez Campbell & Clifford Thornton wedding party on January 12, 1912. By holding his head up out of the rising water while digging him out, the party was able to save Tom's life. His team drowned in the water because they were unable to free them in time. In February 1914, 18 sleighs were caught in a blizzard in the canyon. Blocked by snowslides ahead and behind them, freighters managed to ride their horses out over the slide to Hanke's Ranch. They took turns by the fire to keep warm during the 4 days it took to dig out of Snowslide Canyon. Always hospitable with food and shelter for freighters, Jacob Henggi (Hanke) had a dairy & road ranch on Montpelier Creek located on what is now just above the head waters of Montpelier Reservoir. Hanke was a horse trader, a farrier, & a welcome sight to a weary freighter out on the Crow Creek Road.
