






"Celebrate good times, come on." Cokeville had many chances to celebrate in the 1980-81 year. Not only students enjoyed the year but townspeople helped celebrate also






There are always chores to do after school at Pope's ranch




Nothin' Like a Panther Homecoming








B U S I N E S S


E C O O O O M O M I C S

At the end of the year, the members of each class displayed all of their works at the annual "Mothers' Luncheon."






Seniors Wrap It Up

However, those who did vote, voted 57 for the new proposal and 44 against. Since it required at least a three-fourths vote, the new proposal did not pass.

great amount of authority.





CHS Has First ExchangeStudents

Antero Americo Gallo Fernandez, Jr., was an exchange student from Sao Paulo, Brazil, and lived at the home of Norene Thompson. In Brazil, he was in his second year of high school, which is comparable to a senior in the U.S.










