













































DUMPING ICY WATER ON ALS

In the summer of 2014 the "Ice Bucket Challenge" raised \$115 million in eight weeks. These donations, that helped fund more research, have paid off. The specific gene responsible for ALS has been identified, which brings scientists one step closer to discovering a cure.




CRISIS IN ALEPPO

BOB DYLAN WINS NOBEL PRIZE

The Nobel Prize committee awarded Bob Dylan the Nobel Prize for Literature, becoming the first musician to win the prize. Traditionally reserved for creators of written works, the prize was given to Dylan for "having created new poetic expressions within the great American song tradition."



YAHOO! SUFFERS HISTORIC SECURITY BREACH

In the largest cybersecurity breach in history, over 1 billion Yahoo! user accounts were compromised. Information exposed in the breach included passwords, names, dates, and other sensitive items. Yahoo! officials did not say who carried out the attack, but urged its users to change passwords.



BRITAIN VOTES TO LEAVE EU


On June 23, more than 30 million British citizens voted on a referendum on whether Britain should leave the European Union (EU). 52% voted for leaving. The implications of Britain's decision to leave the EU are far reaching, both economically and socially. So far, experts have no easy answers for the how, why, or even when this will play out.



THE BABIES ACT

President Obama signed into law a bill that requires government buildings to install baby changing stations not only in women's restrooms, but in men's restrooms as well. The bill, called the BABIES Act, received bipartisan support, and was the result of recognizing the growing place of men in the basic duties of child care.





RECORD HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATION RATE

The end of the 2015-2016 school year marked a high point for educators, students and parents throughout the U.S., when more students successfully graduated than in any previous year. It was the fifth record-setting year in a row, raising the high school graduation rate to an all-time high of 84%.





MALL OF AMERICA GOES DARK ON THANKSGIVING

The Mall of America, the U.S.'s biggest indoor mall, decided to keep its doors closed on Thanksgiving. This meant turning consumers away on the eve of Black Friday, the biggest consumer spending day of the year. The move came at no small cost, but benefited the many employees, allowing them to spend the holiday with friends and family.

DAKOTA ACCESS PIPELINE

The Dakota Access Pipeline is a proposed project to install a pipeline between North Dakota and Illinois. The pipeline would transport 570,000 barrels of crude oil a day harvested from North Dakota's Bakken Shale. The project has come under controversy, with protesters objecting that the pipeline endangers sections of the Missouri River, a primary source of drinking water of the Native American Sioux Tribe. Responding to safety concerns, the Department of the Army declared that it will discover and use an alternative pipeline route. Removing much uncertainty around the future of the project, President Trump, in the week after taking office, issued a Presidential Memorandum effectively permitting the completion of pipeline.


HEALTHY, WOOLY AND WISE

Six years later she was put to rest after tumors were found in her lung. Her premature death left in its wake questions about whether clones could live healthy lives. Now, 20 years later, it looks like the question has been answered. Daisy, Diana, Debbie, and Denise are sheep cloned from the same cell line as Dolly, but unlike her, have aged into their senior years, as healthy as any non-cloned sheep.



NEW GIRAFFE SPECIES SPOTTED

A new study analyzing the DNA of 190 giraffes across Africa revealed an unexpected fact. What was formerly thought to be a single species of giraffe turns out to be not one, but four species: the southern giraffe; the Masai giraffe; the reticulated giraffe, and the northern giraffe.



FEATHERS FROM THE PREHISTORIC PAST

The feathers of a dinosaur's tail was discovered preserved in a 99-million-year-old piece of amber, marking the first time dinosaur material has been found preserved in such a way. Lida Xing, a geoscientist from China University, found the specimen for sale at an amber market in Myanmar.





GOLDILOCKS PLANET DISCOVERED

Proxima B could be a potentially Earth-like, habitable, and life-containing planet located in the vicinity of Proxima Centauri. At 24.94 trillion miles away, this makes it the nearest star to our own solar system. Proxima B is in a "Goldilocks" region that allows for the possibility of both life and water in its liquid state. In other words, it's not so distant from its own sun that it's too cold, but not so close that it's too hot.




LOOSENING PARALYSIS' GRIP

A man, once paralyzed from the chest down, is now able to play a computerized guitar with the aid of a computer chip implanted in his brain. Another, a quadriplegic, is now able to manipulate a robotic hand and feel pressure from its fingertips.

HUMANS ON MARS BY 2030?

Working toward bringing humans to Mars, NASA is developing ways to keep humans alive on their journey to the Red Planet, their stay, and then the return trip back to Earth. One such method may be the use of a newly discovered Martian ice deposit, which contains as much water as Lake Superior, the largest freshwater lake on Earth.





HEY, I'M (STILL) DRIVING HERE!

Tesla and Uber unleashed the first wave of self-driving cars onto U.S. roadways. While some Tesla models include all the onboard technology to fully pilot themselves, regulations restrict them from taking full control. For now, the self-automated vehicles are limited to managing their own speed, parking themselves, and changing lanes.

HOME, SMART HOME

Google and Amazon widened their reach into consumer's homes this year. Amazon's tech, called "Echo," and Google's, "Google Home," are low-profile, speaker-like devices, waiting to supply information or carry out commands. For example, users can order the delivery of goods and services, schedule events, ask questions, dim lights, or have music or video played on connected devices.





SAMSUNG NOTABLE PHONE RECALL

Users of Samsung's Note 7 smartphone began reporting explosions of the device while charging. This prompted the South Korean company to suspend sales and urge owners to exchange the device for non-faulty units. An official recall was issued in September by the U.S. Consumer Product Safety Commision. The device was eventually discontinued, and the U.S. Federal Aviation Commission and Department of Transportation deemed it a hazard and banned it from all flights. The recall and discontinuation affected over 2 million devices and cost Samsung an estimated \$17 billion in revenue.

NO MORE WAITING

Amazon, known for its online retail and web services, opened a brick-and-mortar grocery store to revolutionize the "good, old-fashioned" shopping experience. Its Seattle-based "Amazon Go" test store enables shoppers to enter the store, pick up items and then walk out, all without waiting in a line or interacting with a cashier. Everything is tracked, charged, and handled automatically through an app on your smartphone.





WHERE IS REALITY HEADED?

Two new innovated, related technologies, "mixed or augmented reality" and "virtual reality," are starting to grab public attention. Both use "head mounted displays"—basically computer displays strapped to users' heads like glasses or goggles—to project information onto real world objects or allow for total immersion into digital space. The equipment is still costly but becoming cheaper, with companies from Microsoft to Sony creating products aimed at the everyday consumer.


THE POWER OF THE SUN

After 550 hours of flight and 25,000 miles of travel, Solar Impulse 2 touched down, completing the world's first solar-powered flight around the globe. The aircraft embarked from Abu Dhabi and 18 months later completed its round-trip. While the aircraft itself could have made the flight without stopping, the pilots needed to land every month to rest up before resuming. Future expectations for the aircraft is to fly solar powered around the globe on autopilot.

U.S. Olympians took home more gold from the 2016 Olympics than any other nation. 46 gold medals in all. That's nearly twice than second-spot Great Britain's 27 gold medals. Among the many national highlights, Michael Phelps became the most decorated Olympian of all time, Ashton Eaton won gold in men's decathlon, and the U.S. Women's Basketball team won gold. U.S. gymnast Simone Biles won 4 gold medals and secured her spot as the most decorated



U.S. RETURNS TO RYDER CUP VICTORY

For the first time since 2008, Team USA won the 41st Ryder Cup, held at Hazeltine National Golf Club in Minnesota. Phil Mickelson and J.B. Holmes secured the cup for the 12-man team.



SUPER BOWL 2017: ONE FOR THE RECORD BOOKS

The New England Patriots defeated the Atlanta Falcons 32-28, winning Super Bowl 2017. This year's Super Bowl broke records left and right. It featured the biggest comeback in its history, marked the first ever to push into overtime, and Patriots' Tom Brady is the first quarterback to take home 5 Super Bowl titles.



PITTSBURGH PENGUINS WIN THE STANLEY CUP


MID-ATLANTIC WINS LITTLE LEAGUE WORLD SERIES

The Cleveland Cavaliers won the NBA Finals, beating the Golden State Warriors 93-87 in game 7 of the NBA Finals. The win ended a 52-year drought for the Cavs, and also marked the team as the first to come back in the Finals from being down 3-1.

Serena Williams claimed the Wimbledon title for the 7th time in 14 years. The win marked Williams' 22nd major singles title. It also tied her with Steffi Graf for the Open-Era Grand Slam record.



THE CUBS WIN!





GOTTA' CATCH 'EM ALL

Pokemon Go took the top spot for mostplayed mobile app game in history, clocking in over 500 million downloads and, at its peak in July, 21 million daily active users. That's more than Snapchat, Twitter, Instagram or Facebook. This trend quickly played out with 79% of players shelving the game by September.

Take a partially filled bottle of water, hold it from its mouth, flip it through the air, and get it to stick its landing upright. As thousands of kids can attest, the trick requires finesse, control and tons of practice. The original water bottle flipping video that started it all racked up 6.6 million views in under five months.



THE YOUTUBE GENERATION






EVERYTHING OLD IS NEW AGAIN


