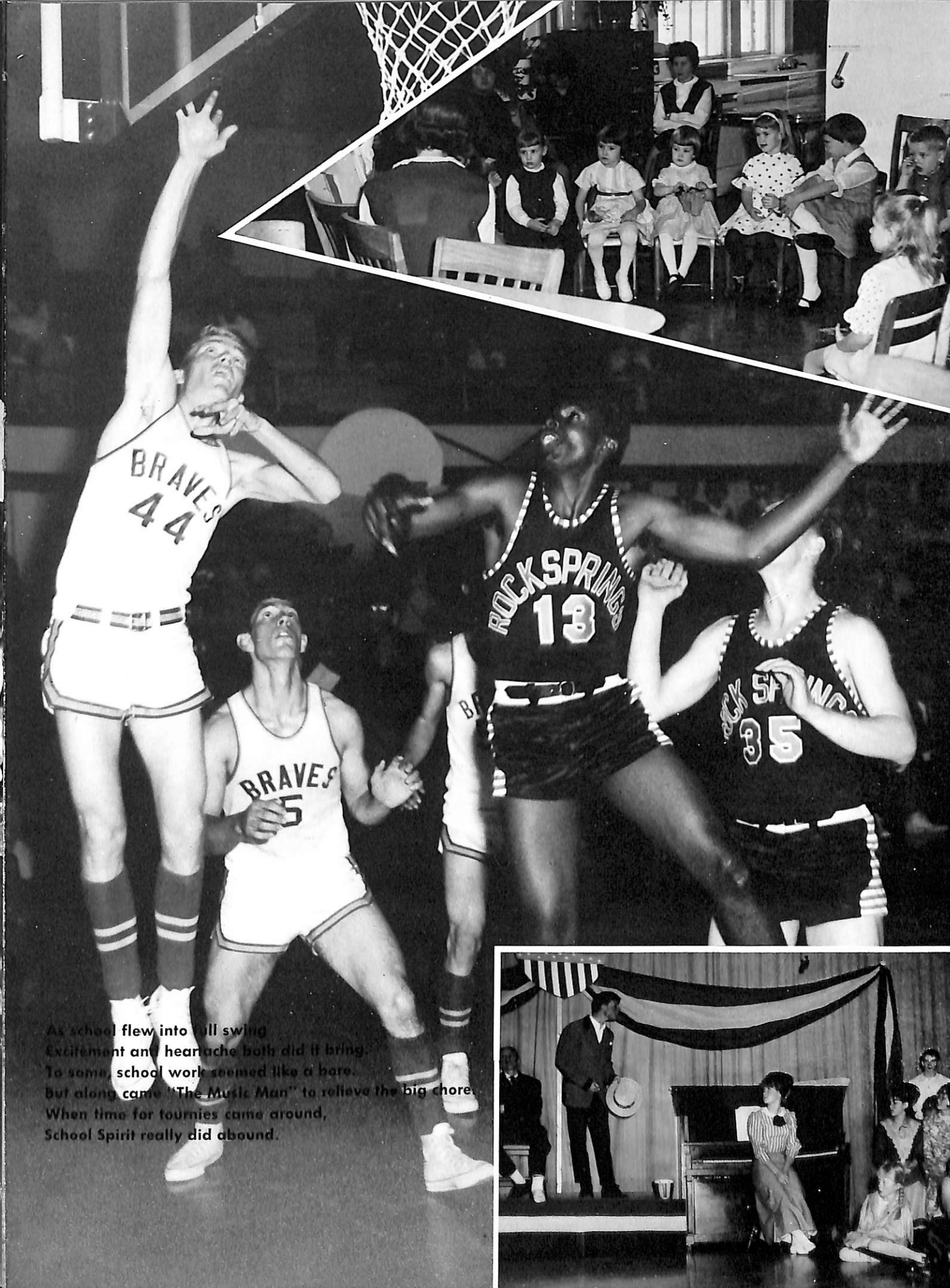

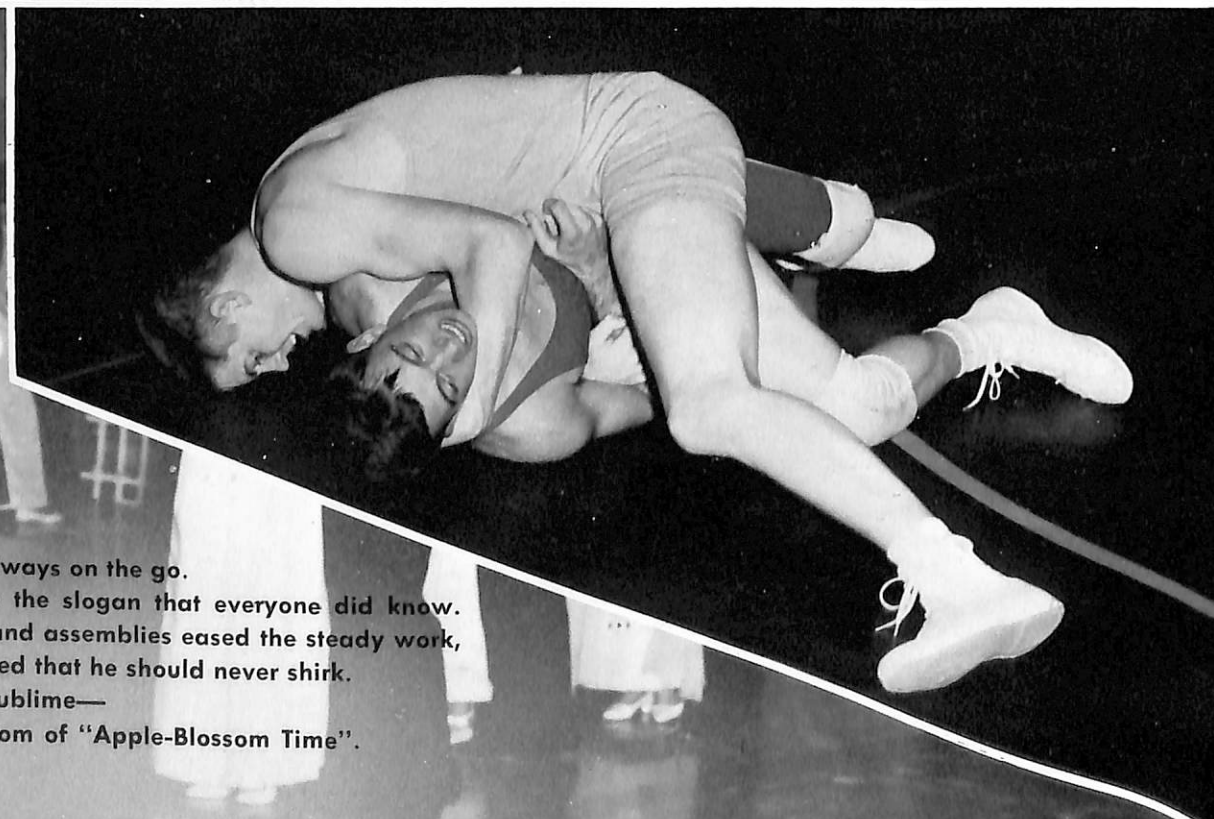
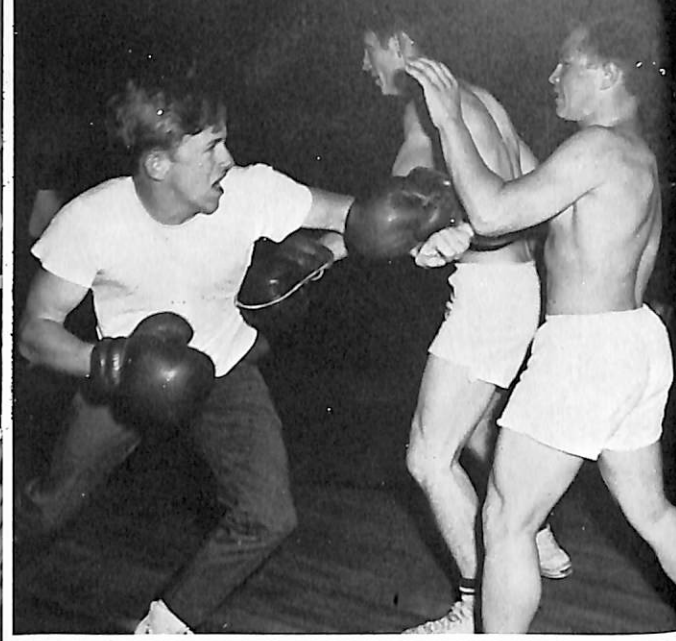


Another year upon us came,

 And at Sach's Hawkins we danced all night.



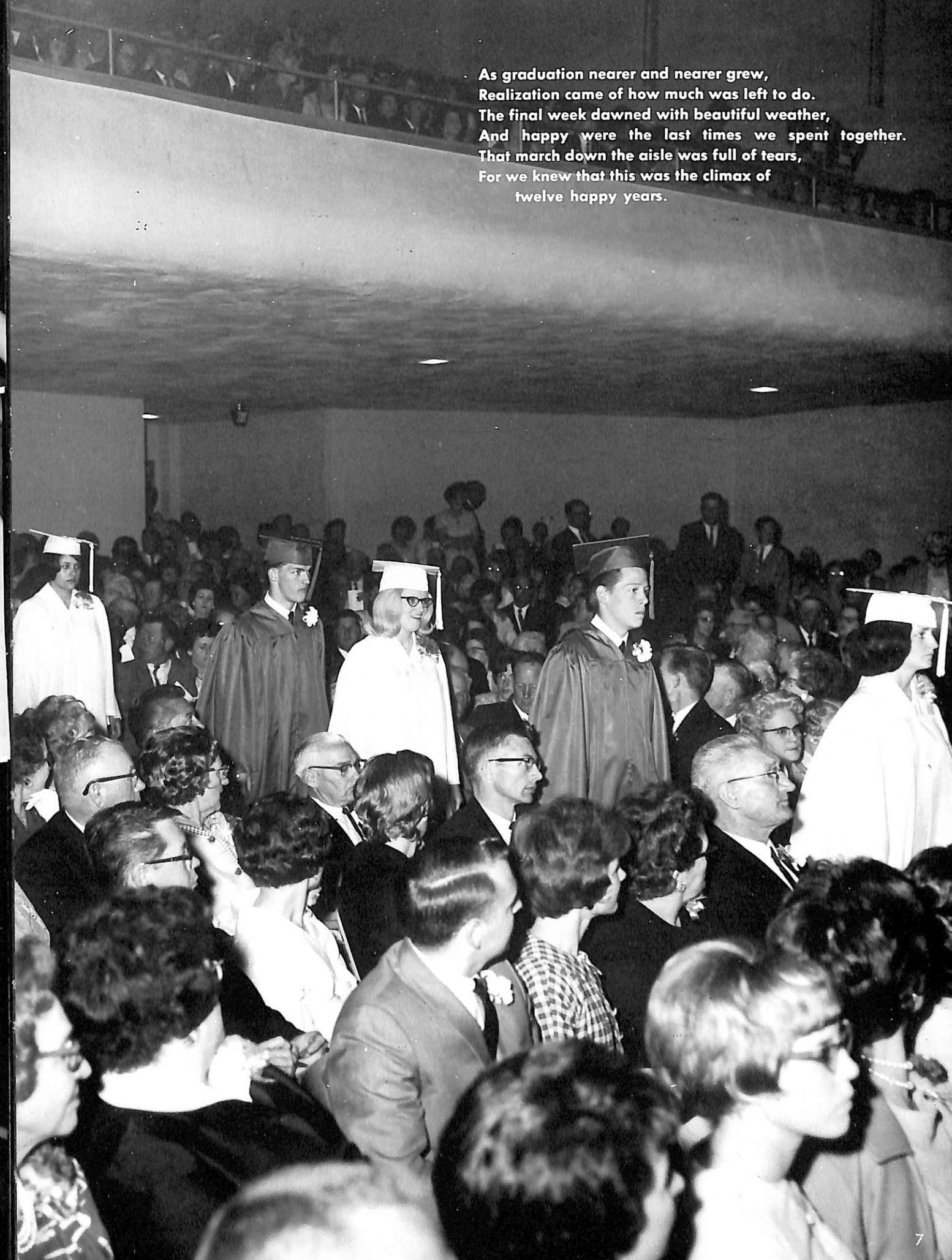
As school flew into full swing

 School Spirit really did abound.



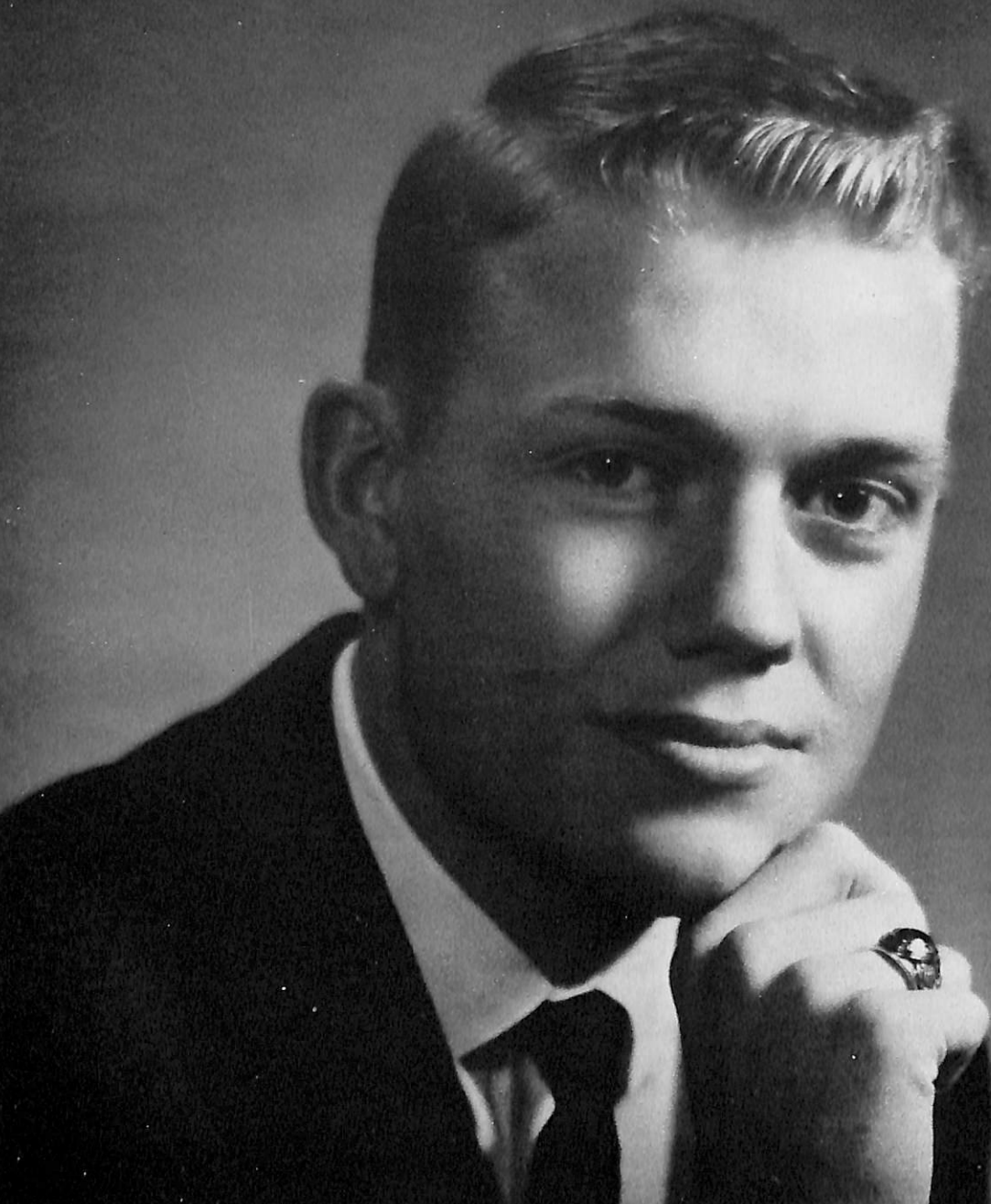


Busy, busy, busy always on the go.

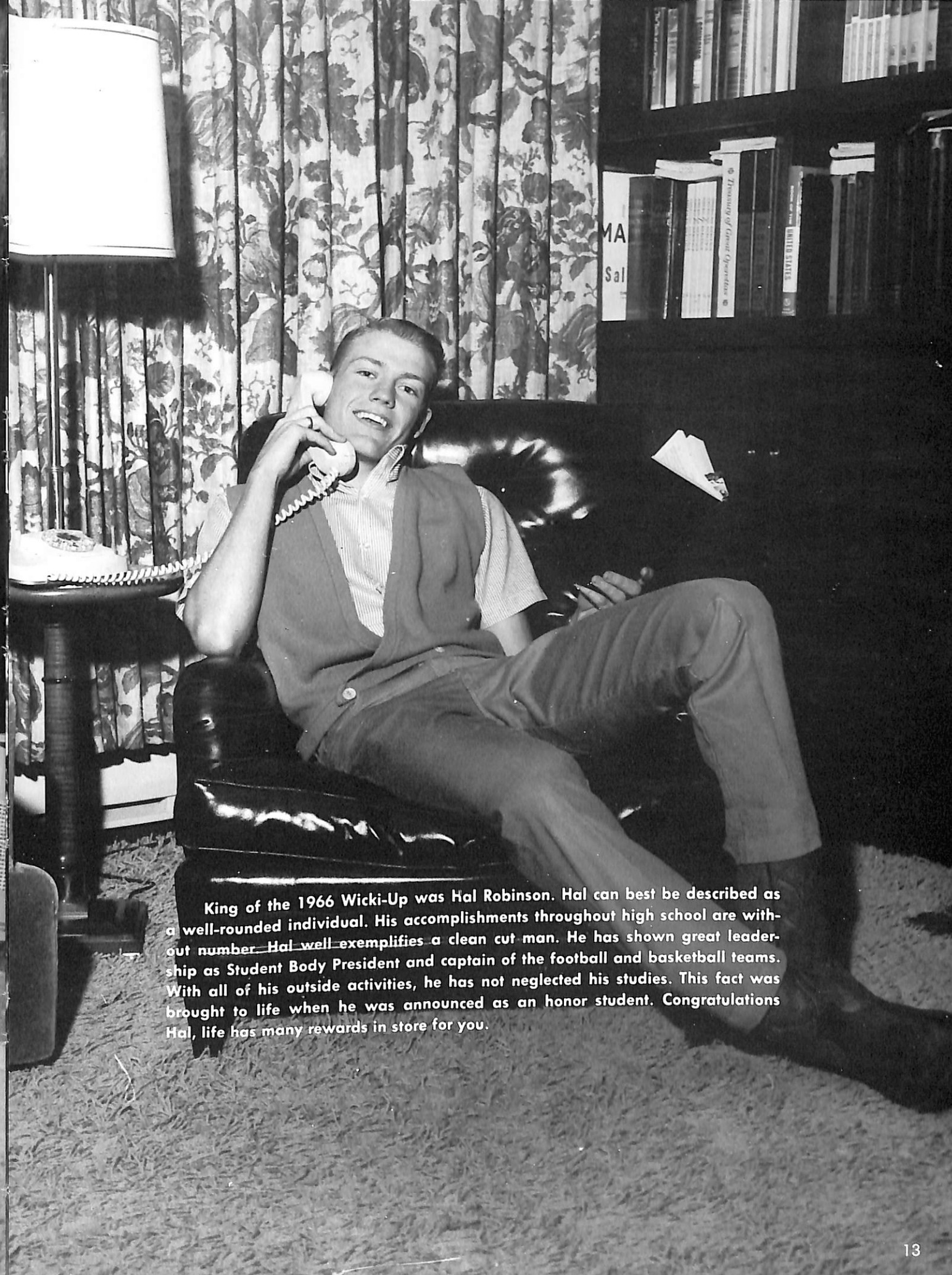


Royalty

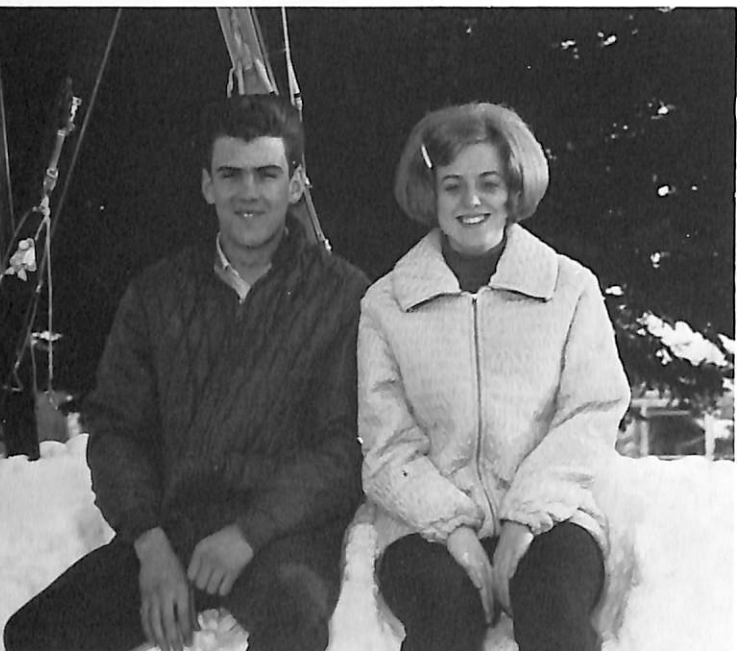

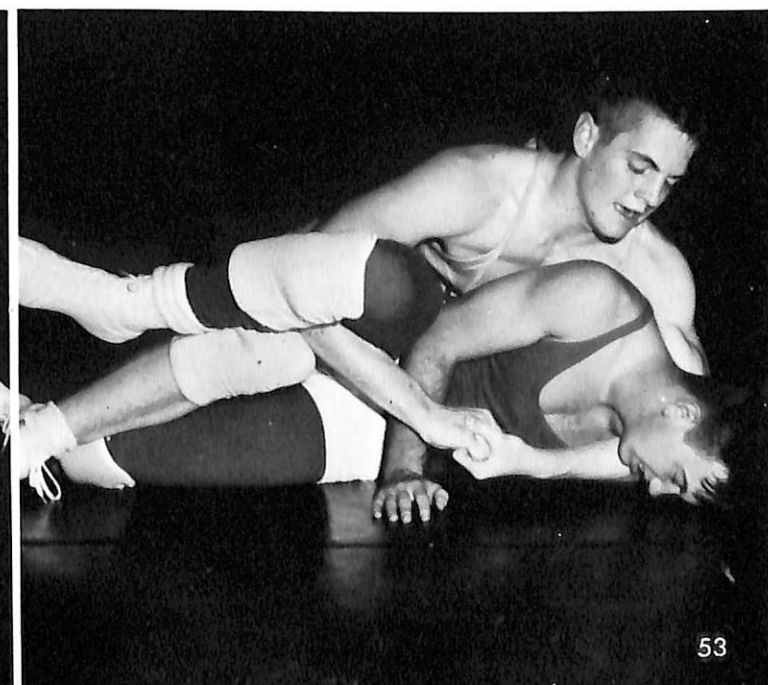

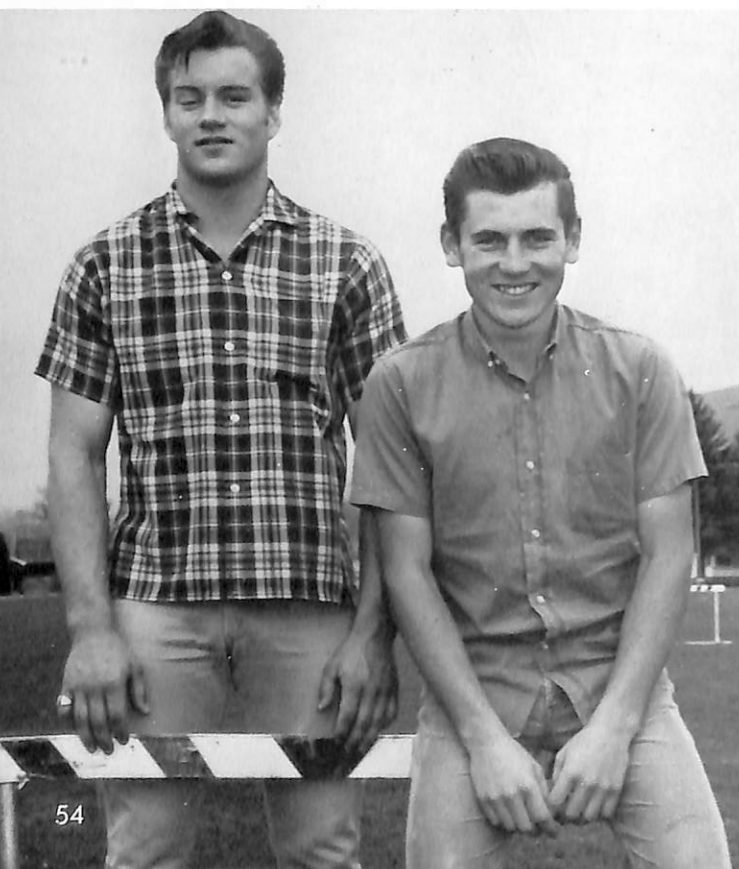

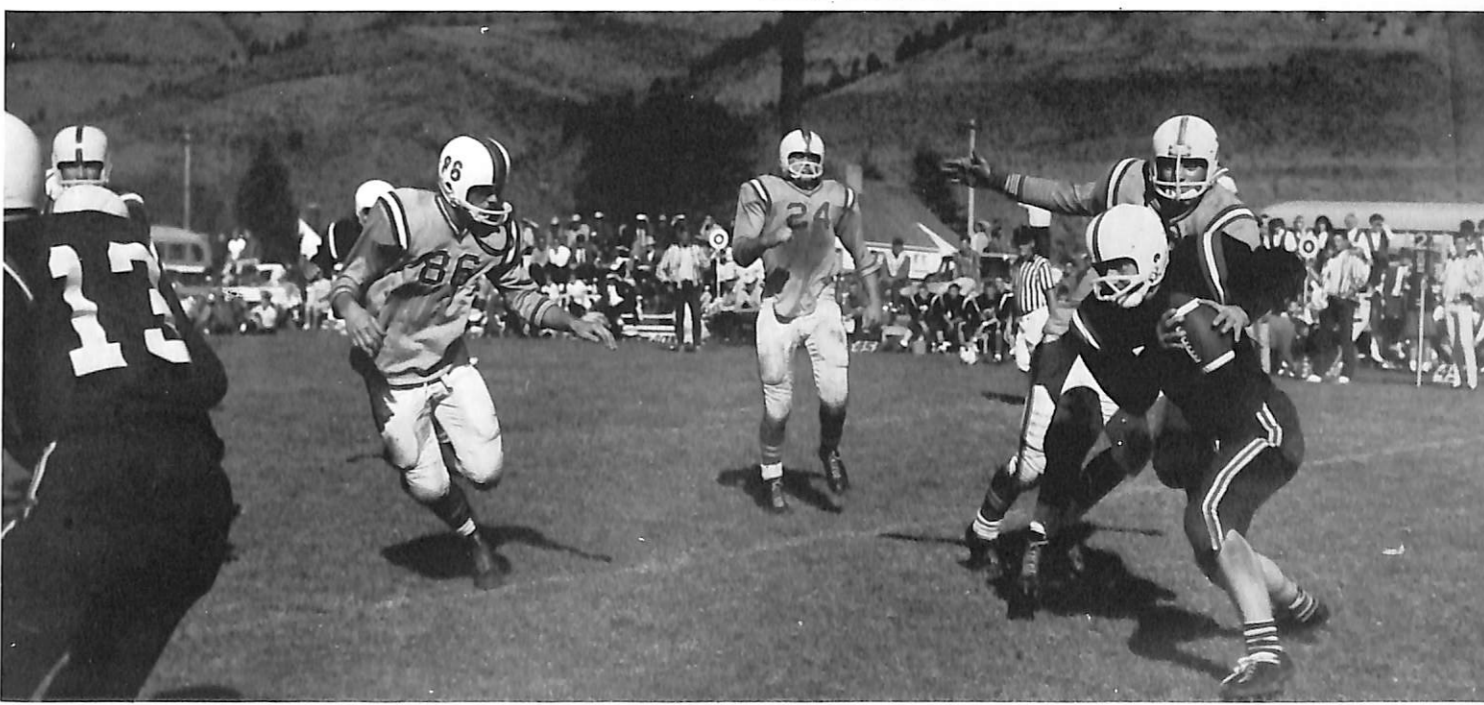

Putting Hands To Work



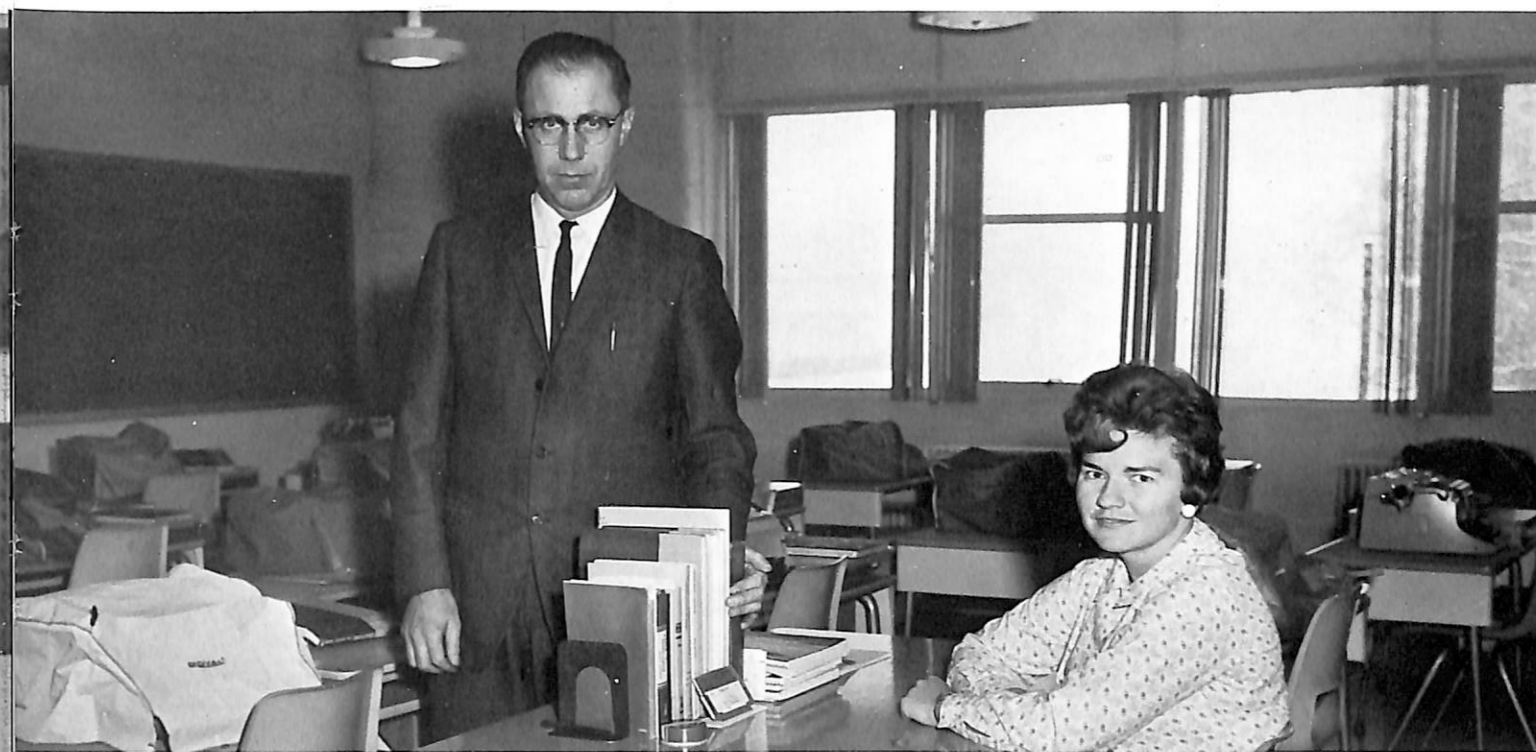
