



I thought of all the happy days, The sad ones now just seemed a haze, And in a flash I came to see How much the past had meant to me.


We walked along—I wondered where The future led and what was there. The past still echoed from behind I was its, and it was mine.

My silent but my constant guide.


The stranger's hand I felt in mine.

He smiled and said, "I'm called Hello."






Sophomores deviate from daily schedule as they are given shots, which are given to tenth graders each year.






Our Student Leaders




