










Even though Mr. Ron Erickson spent several weeks on crutches and in a cast, he still managed to teach physical science and general math.

Mr. Doug Jenkins student-taught first semester under Mr. Nord Wilkes.








Social studies grows; uses new media






A research paper on the career of their choice was the largest project of Veldon Izatt's two freshman citizenship classes.



Using audio signal generators to amplify audio signals, then transmitting these to an oscilloscope screen, helped Dick Dana's electronics classes understand sound waves.


In classes instructed by Steven Timothy, girls made purses, belts, rings and other jewelry. Gun racks, a china closet, and coffee tables were made by boys.




Accounting II introduced

This was the first year for an Accounting II class instructed by Mr. Hale Wray. Also under this direction were teachers' aids who helped teachers in the junior high and elementary schools.




Students in Gari West's basic speech course found themselves performing once a week by telling stories and presenting public speeches. Voice variation and eye contact were especially stressed.

Individual autobiographies were written in Janis Reeves' personal writing class. Each student recorded memories, impressions and other ideas from their lives.


Contemporary literature was popular, and Mrs. Yvonne Clark taught Cancer Wood, Exodus, and Gulag Archipelego.















Home Ec. buys microwave oven


Consumer Ed. and home management was taught as a bi-annual class. Students discussed credit, advertising, money management, and use of time and energy.


New this year in Miss Flygare's classes was bladder ball. This is played with the soft inside of a regular ball.


A new test, the Armed Services Vocational Battery, was used as a vocational aptitude test for upperclassmen.

Stan Penrod, a new resource teacher, assisted students with learning disabilities, using SRA and Macmillan materials.

















Food prices rose to all-time highs this year, causing school lunches to also rise to 55¢. Still the average daily lunch count was 800.





But,




Citizenship winners named








Braves close season with .500 record






Hopes dwindle as year progresses




Sophomores and freshmen show future promise for Braves




At the double-elimination State tourney in Laramie, March 13-15, the Braves stayed close in each of their first two games, but were edged out in the final minutes.



Because of illness and injury of varsity wrestlers, Rodney Lloyd and Weston Crook moved from JV to varsity. This backup helped add team strength.






Braves place 7th at State; Clark sets new SVHS record

Team placing at State was seventh, with Torrington, Kemmerer, Evanston, Thermopolis, Buffalo and Glenrock ahead of them.












Dave Parker competes in national rodeo finals



Both choruses participated at district music festival in Kemmerer April 25-26. They received 1+ and 1 ratings, highest in the district and were paid special compliments by festival judges.






Creative arts section Quill and Scroll project


SV hosts Jr. Legislature

Flag Twirlers go to Logan; present five routines





Band presents concert; rates high at district


Culminating the year's activities, SVHS Concert Band received 1- and 2+ ratings at the ten-school District Music Festival at Kemmerer, April 25-26.


Wicki-Up, Mountain Star receive All-State awards





Star Valley High experienced a number of assemblies during the '74-'75 school year. They ranged from strictly educational to sheer entertainment.








Dramatists stage "Girl Crazy"




Aside from this, elections were the same at SVHS and everybody knows that elections at SVHS are akin to "Mardi Gras" in New Orleans.


Formal Junior Prom hosted April 11




Seniors raised money;

Beginning their last year short of funds, seniors filled the first several months with money-making projects. They sold at a football and basketball game and peddled cards, stationery and candy door-to-door.


Their first big activity was homecoming where they placed first on their float and first in the Volkswagen race. They also made their traditional hike to the star.

Ninety-nine seniors marched down the aisle May 21, for the last time. "Each Dawn is a New Beginning" was the theme for the 1975 commencement exercises.



Smallest class in a number of years, the class of '75 held its own when it came to achievement and talent.




Sophomores present March 26 assembly,
