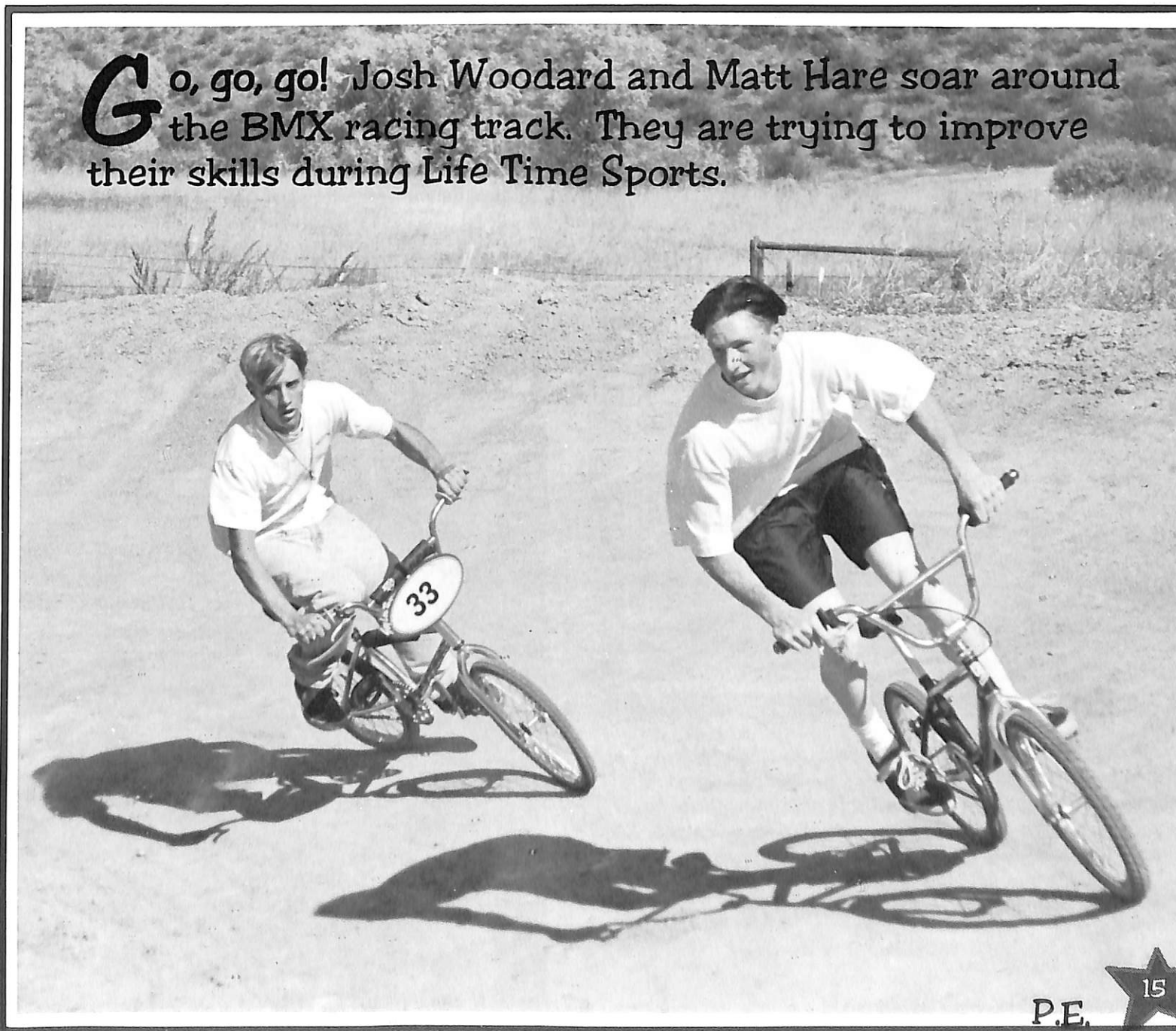
Hilda Hubbard said, "It was different because they didn't let us use hooks that day. Our class is a little disfunctional and we probably would have hooked each other."

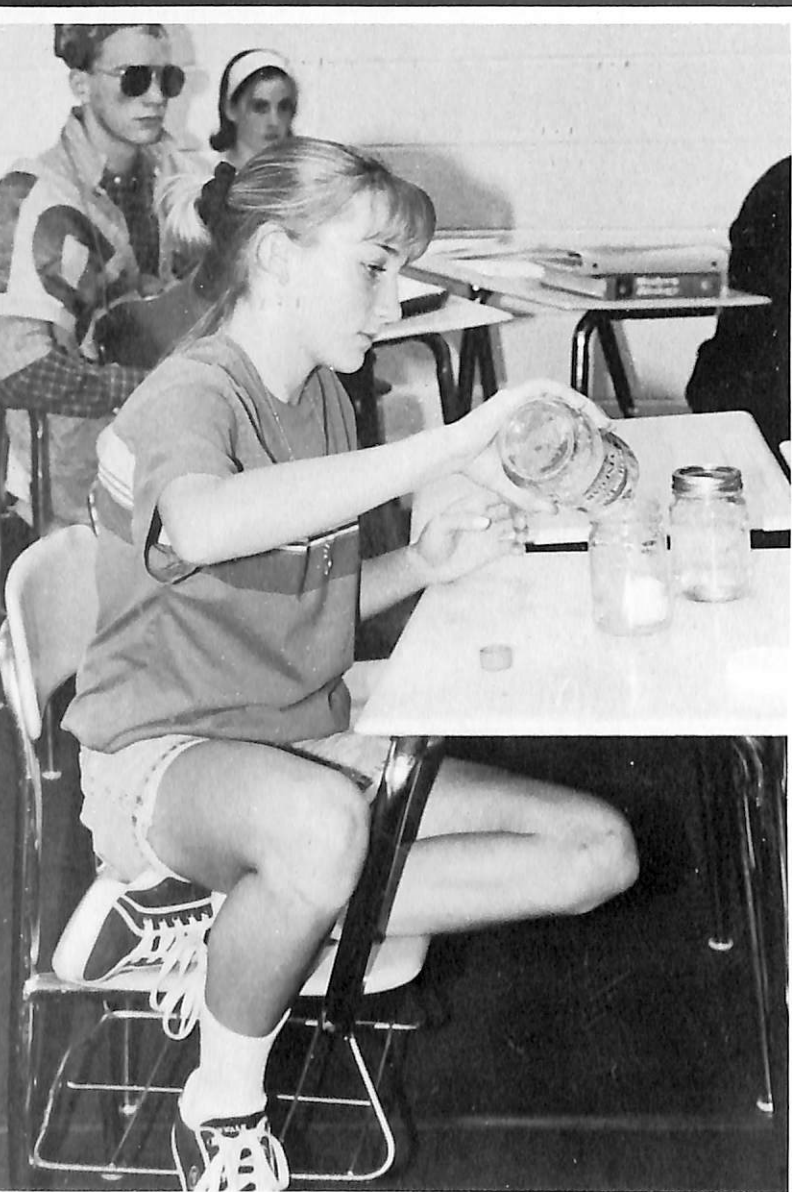

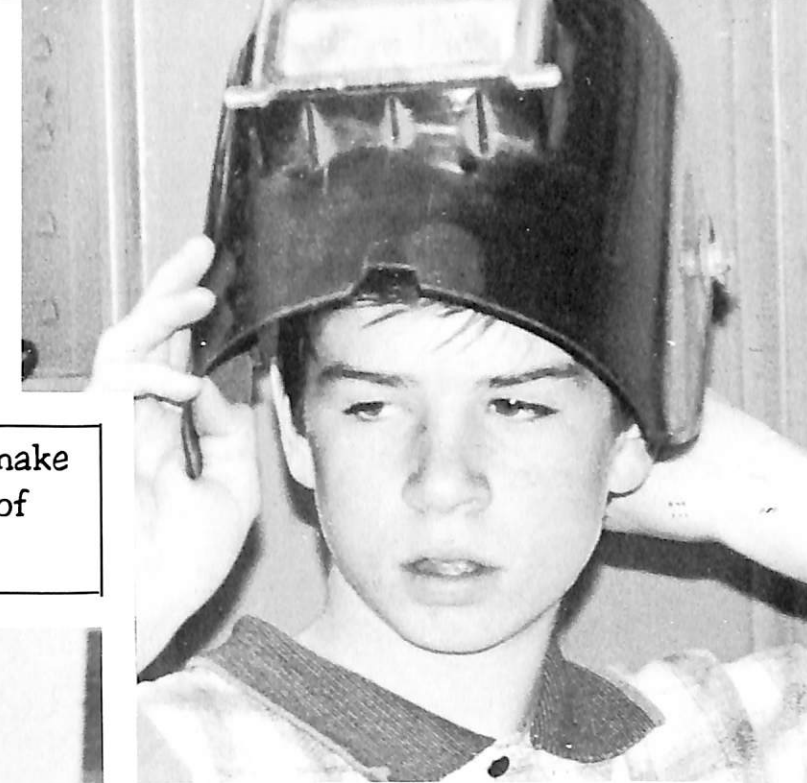

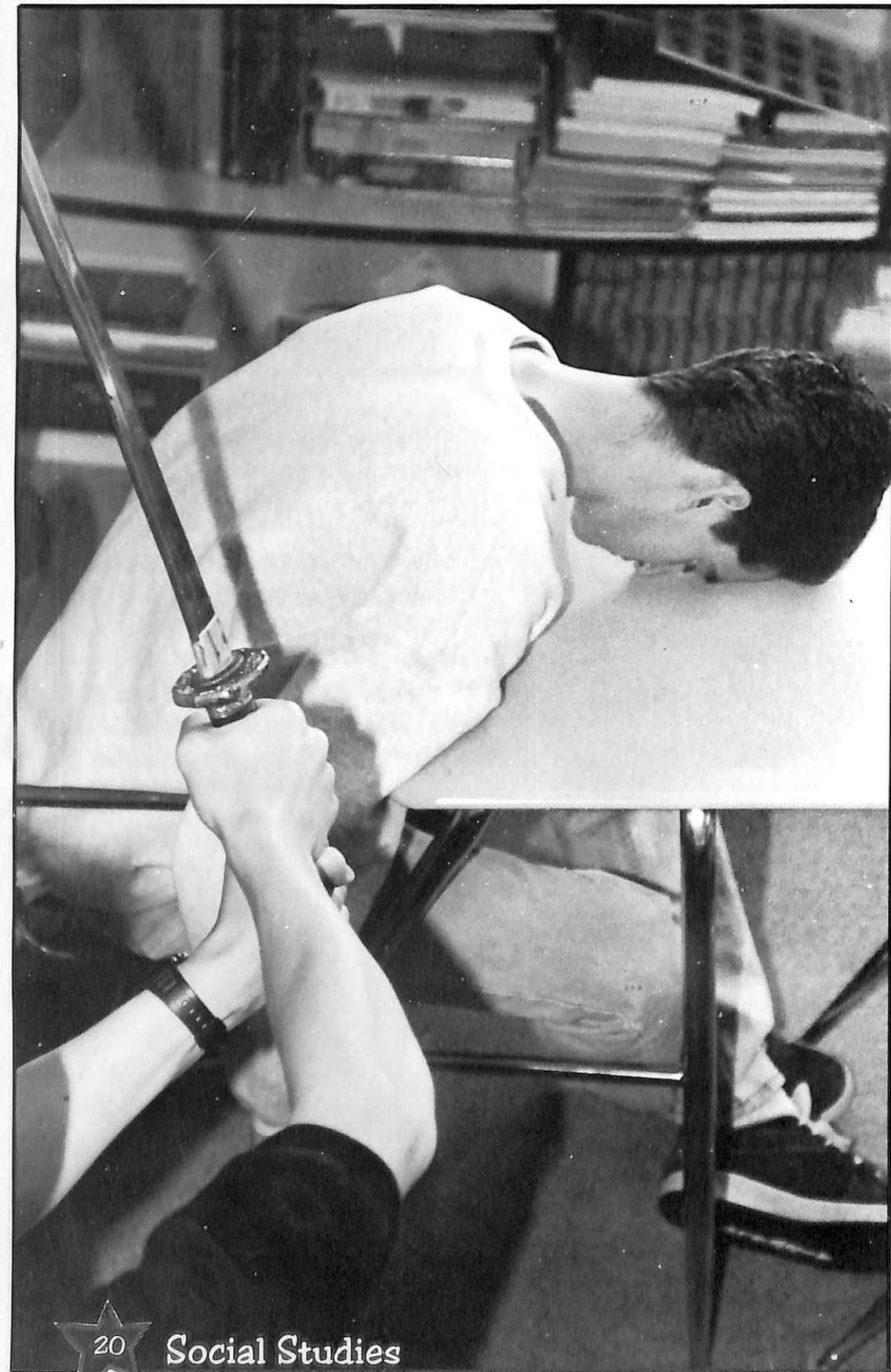

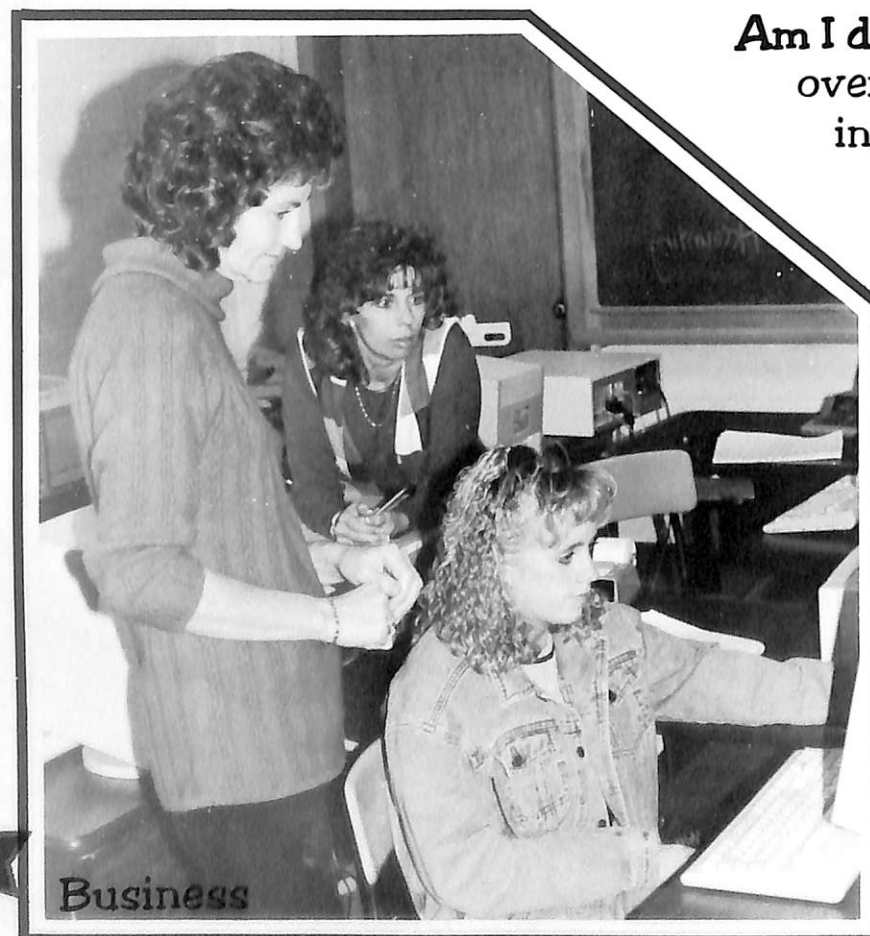

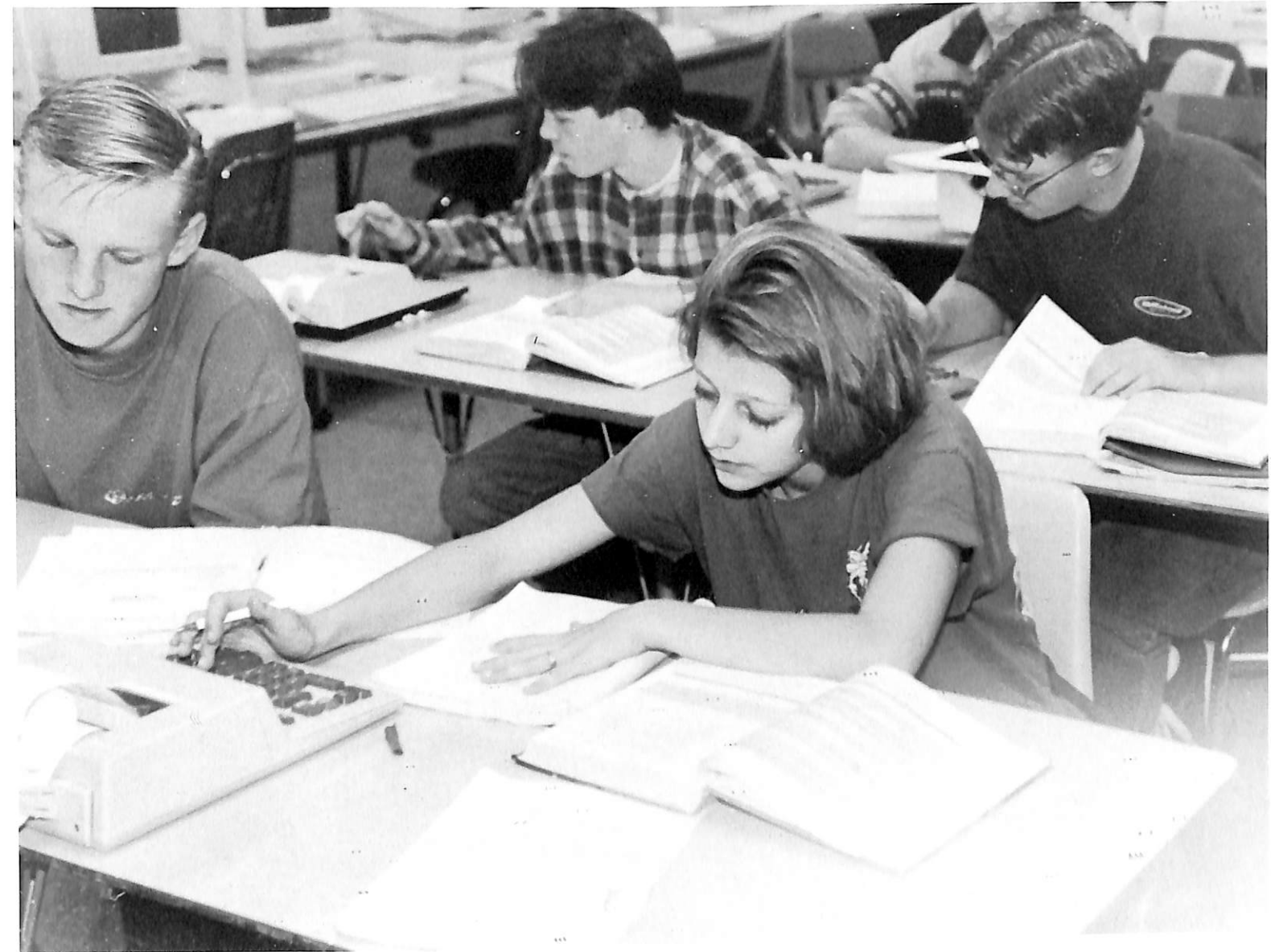

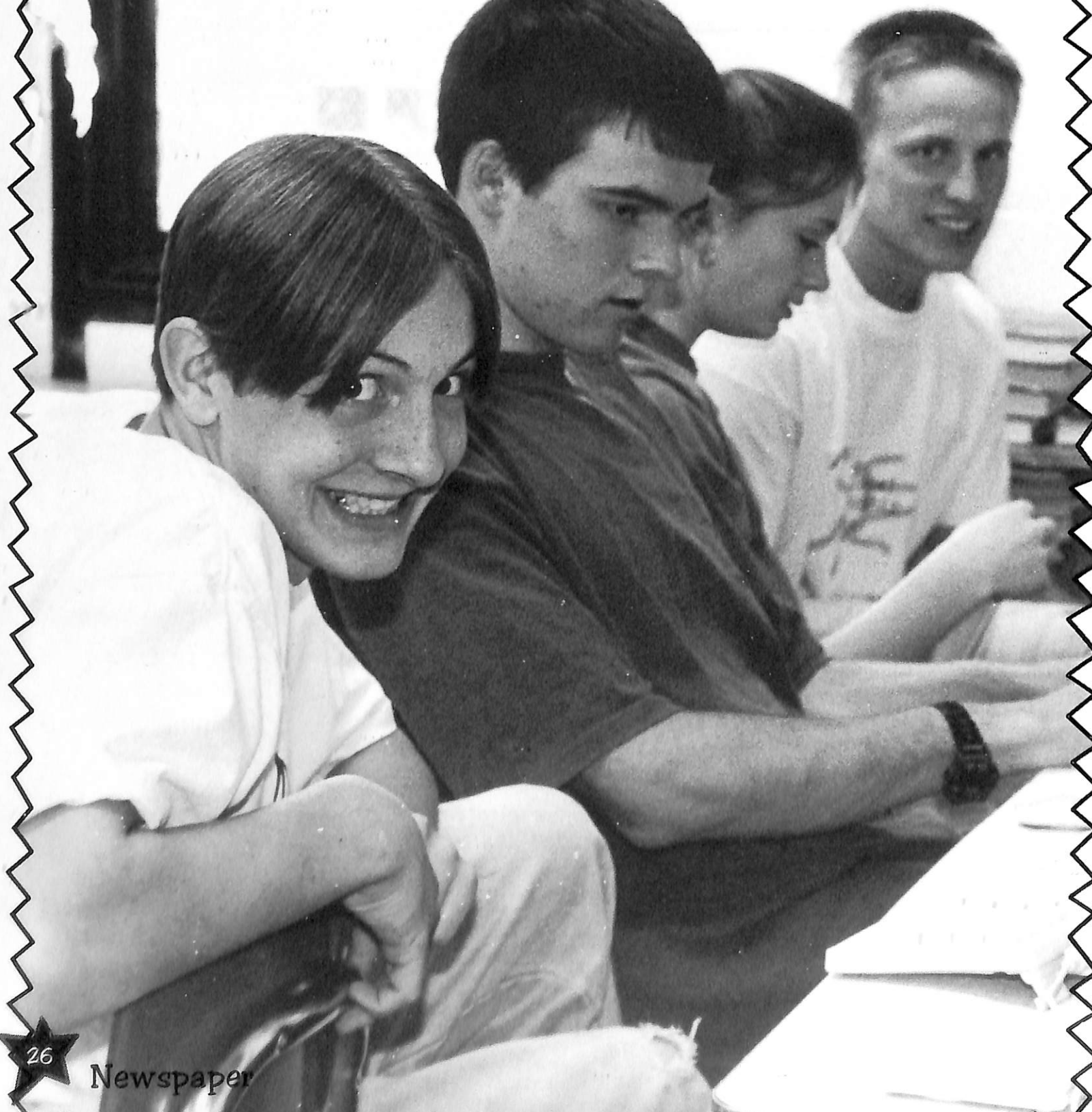

Messin 'with mud.

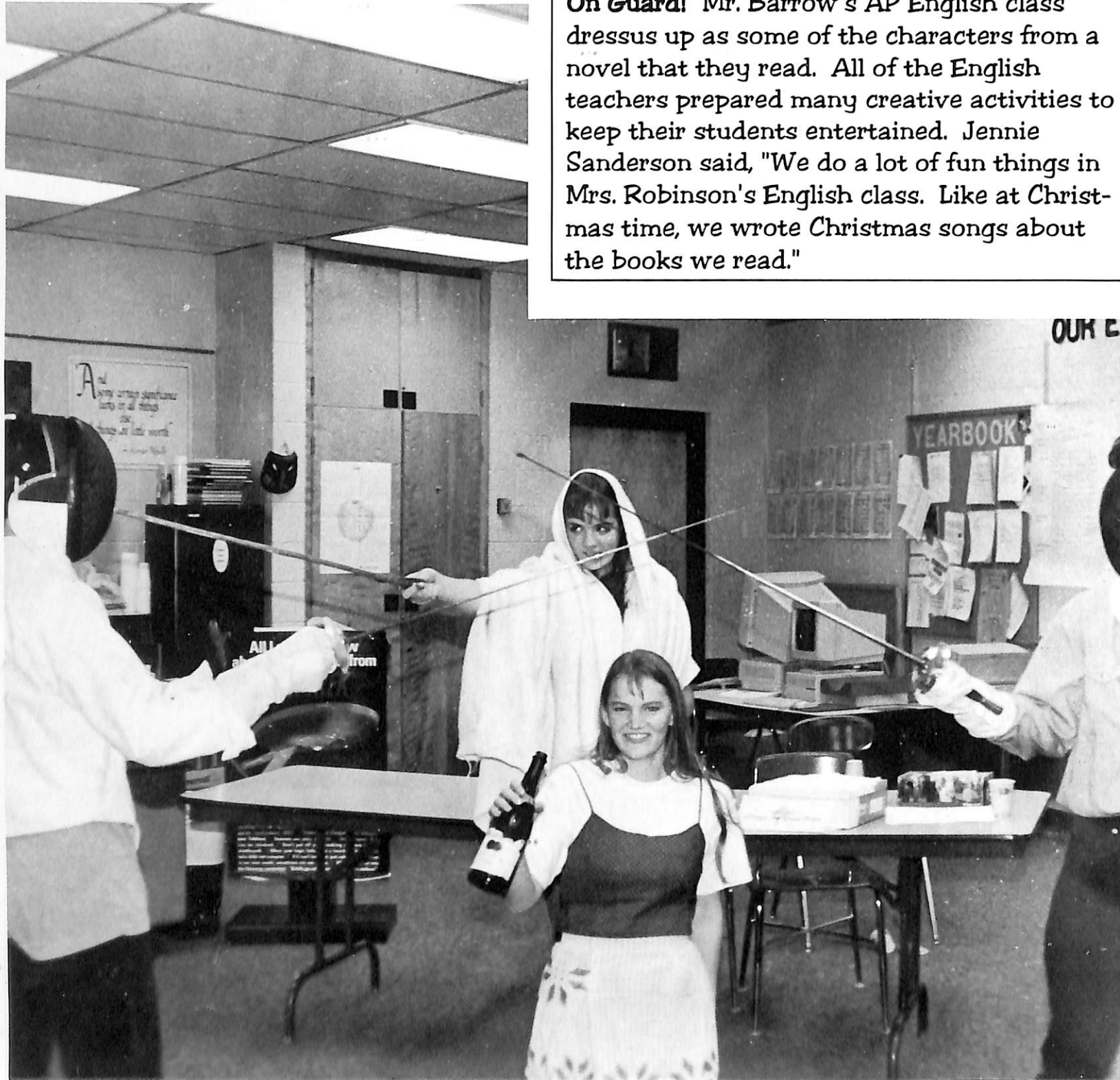

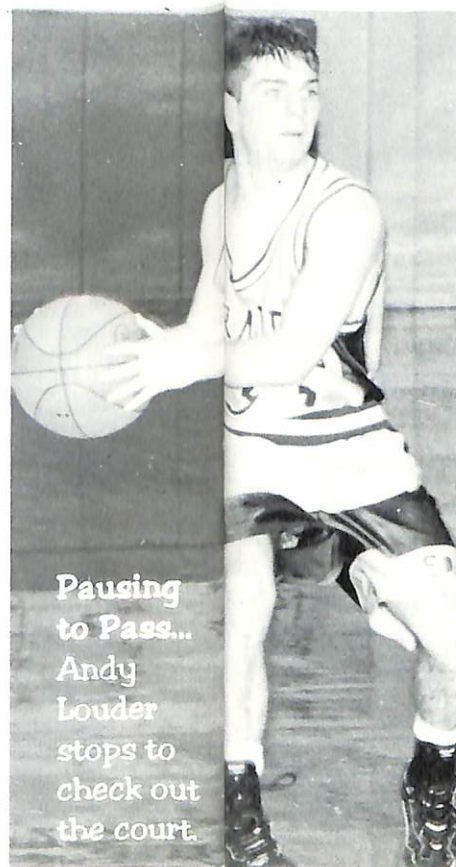

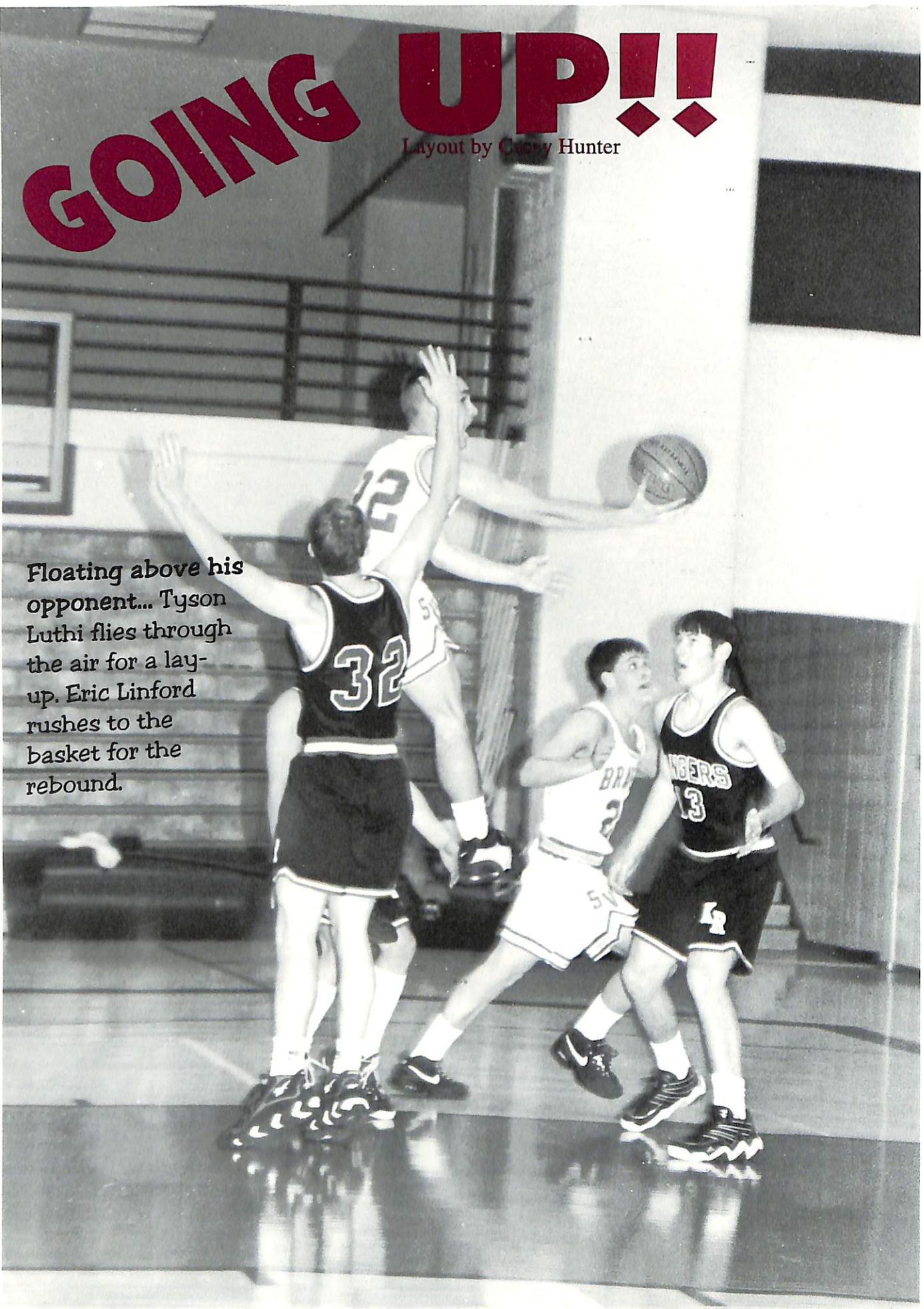

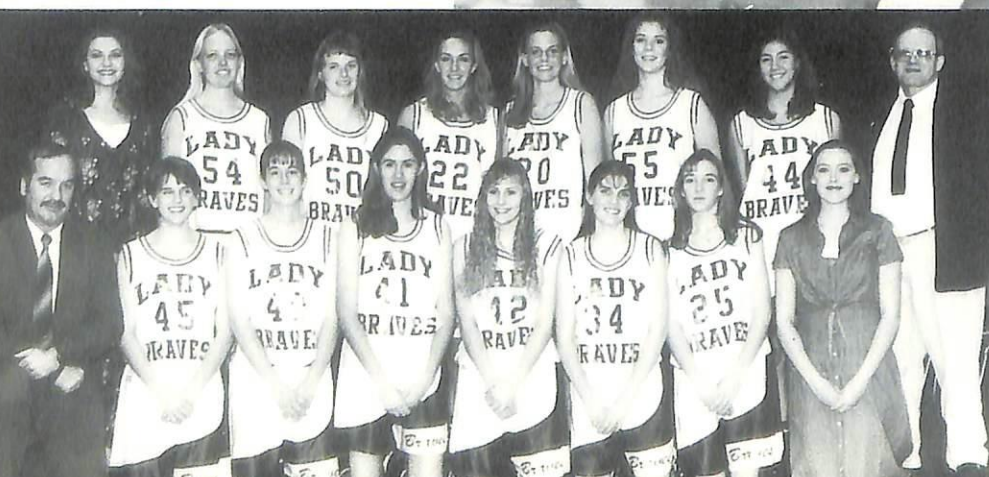

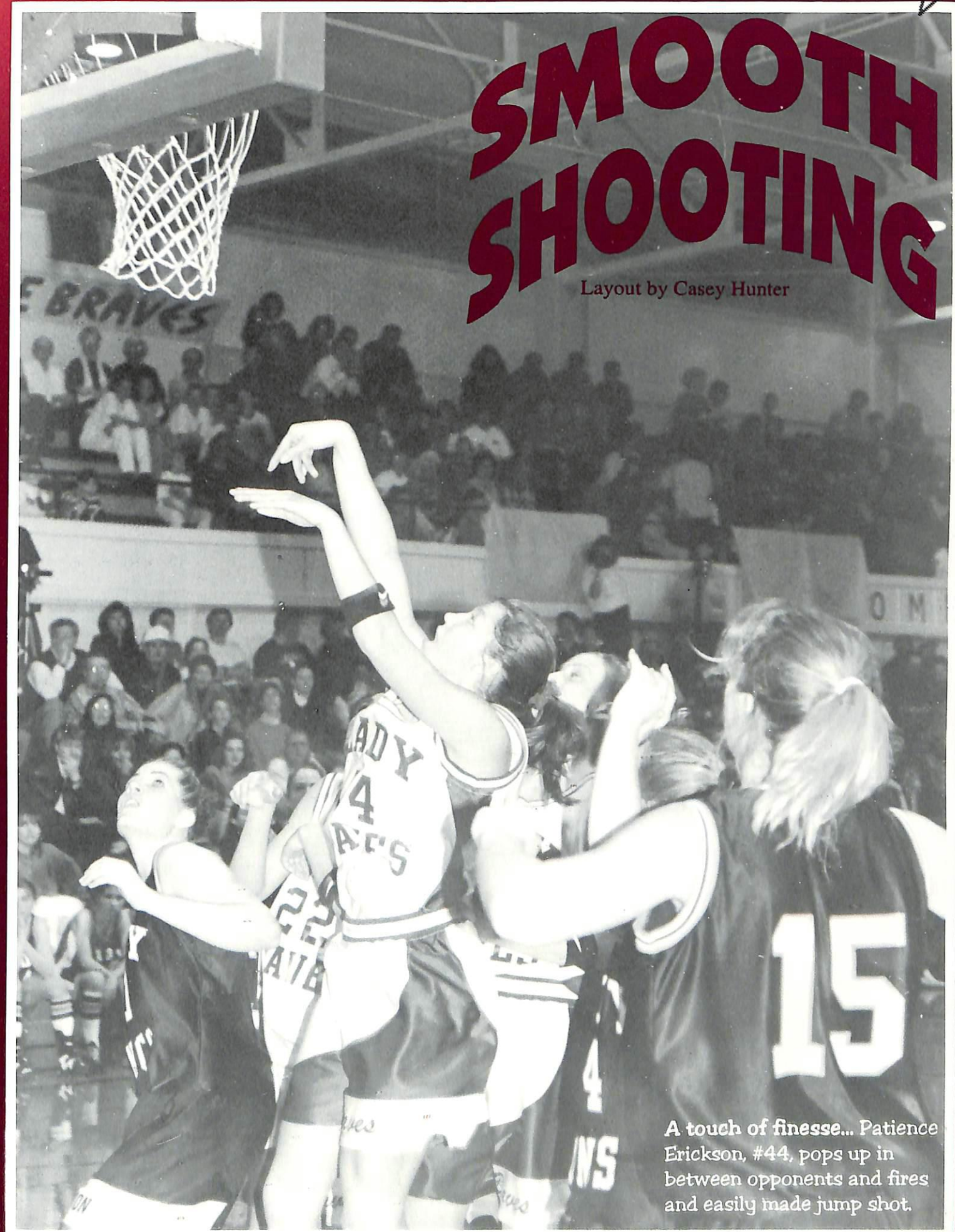

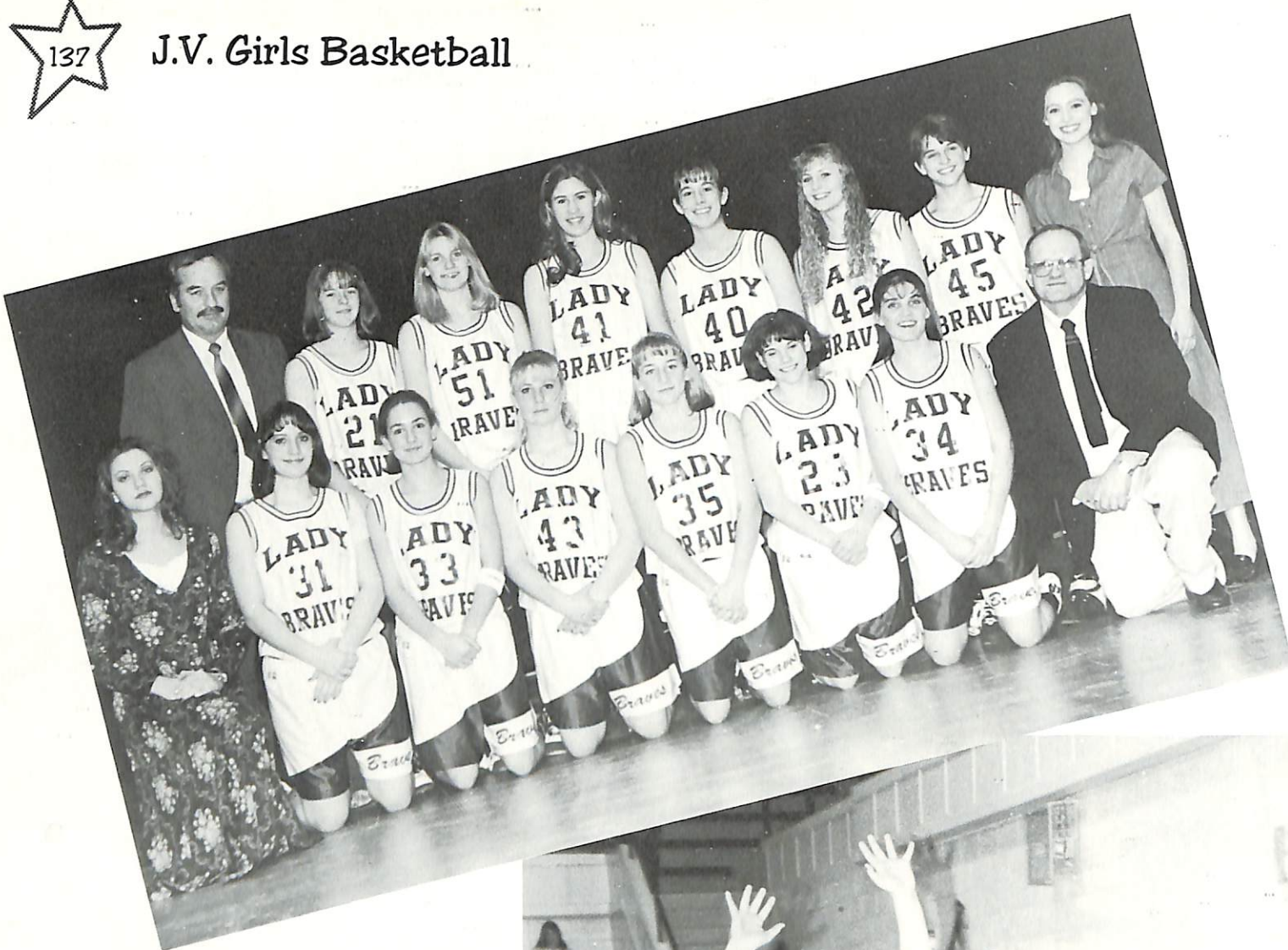

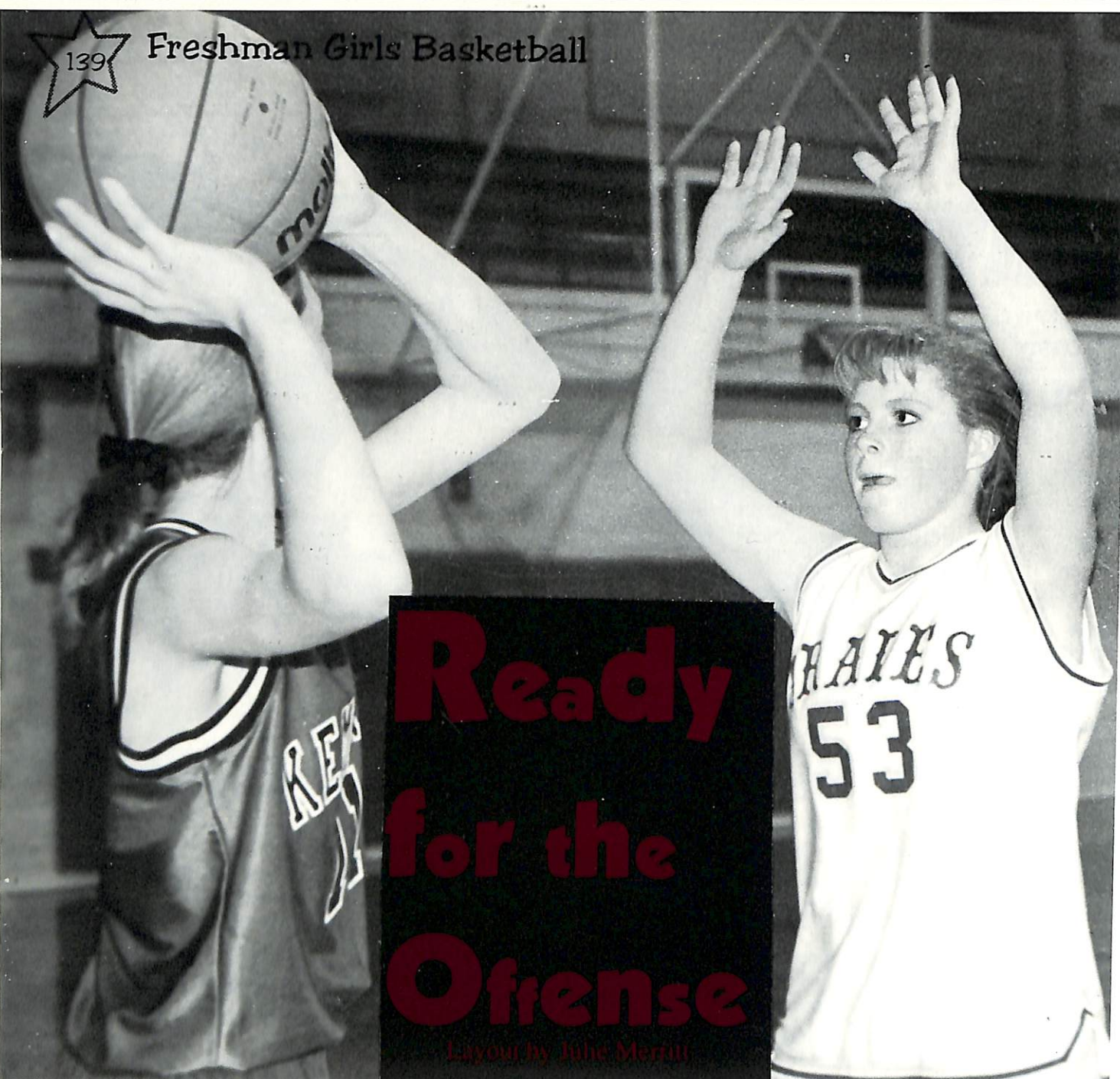

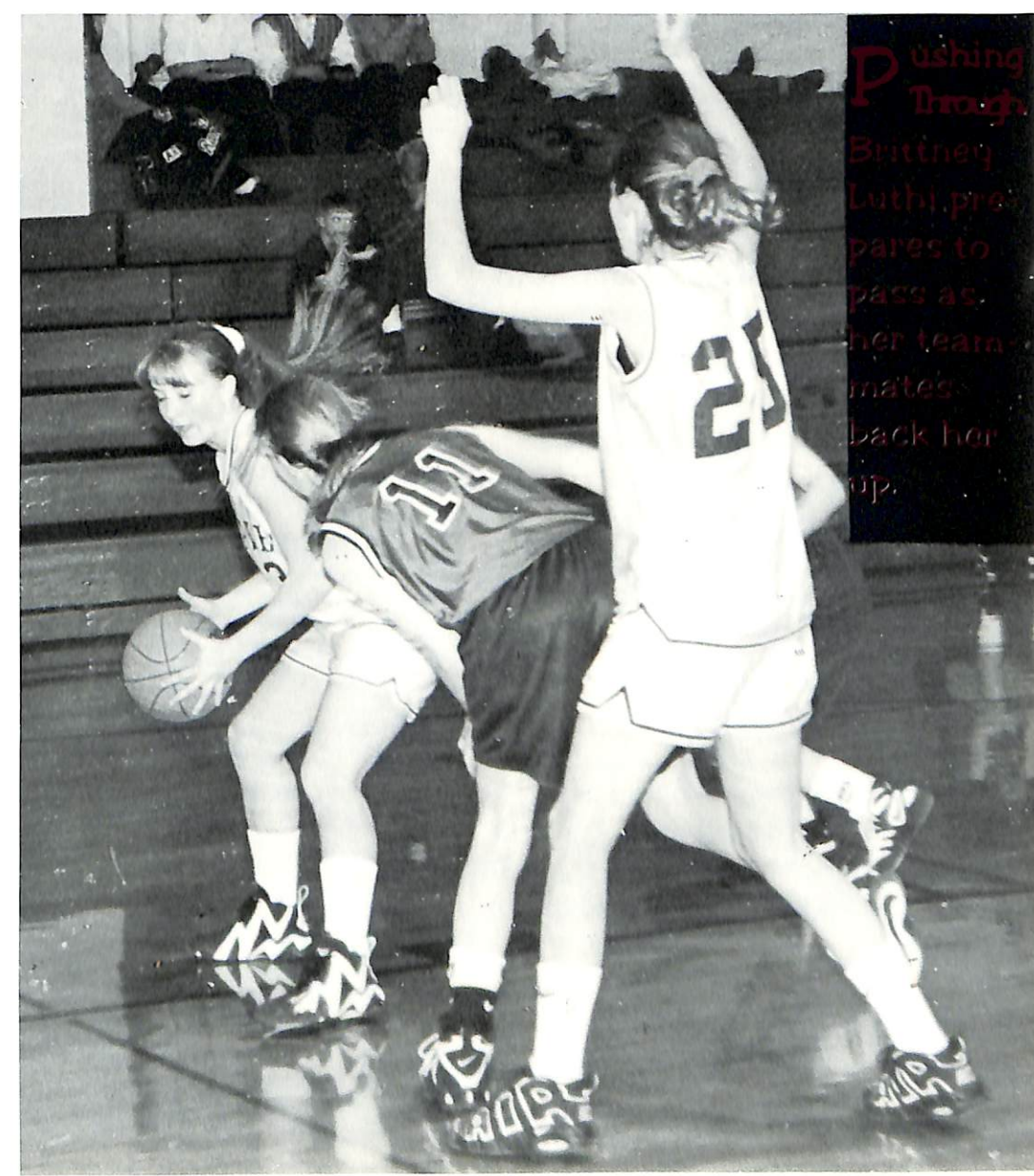

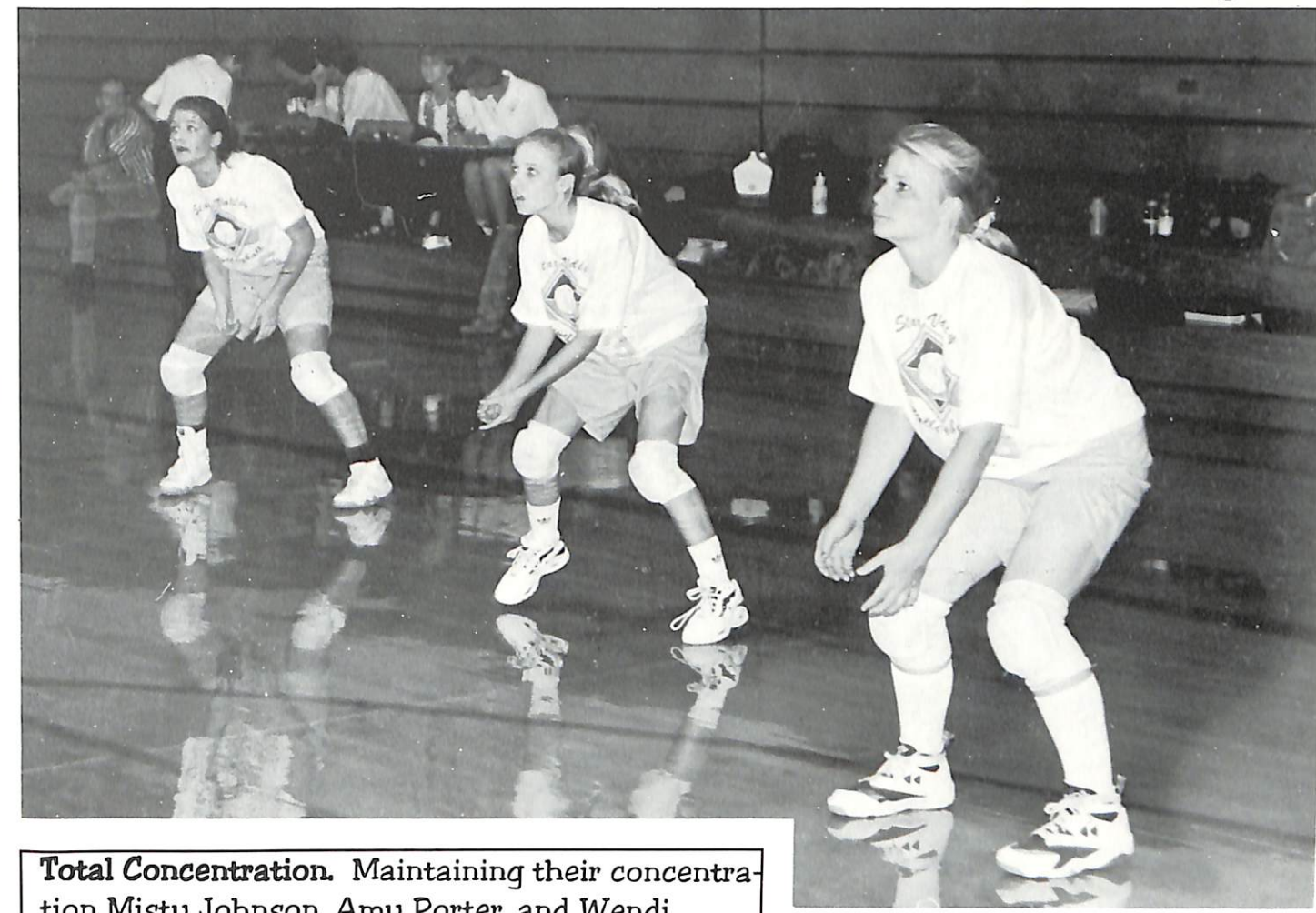

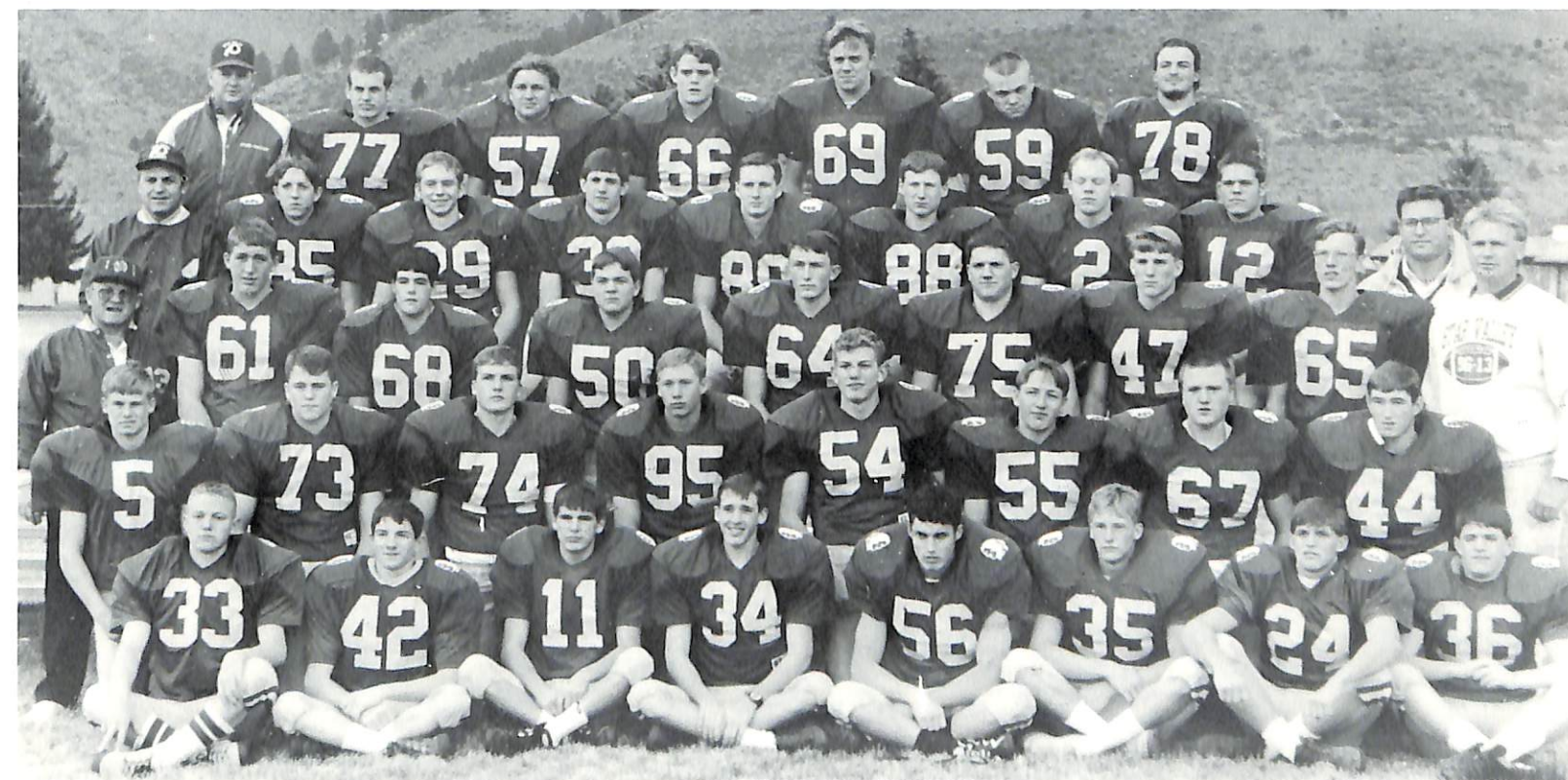

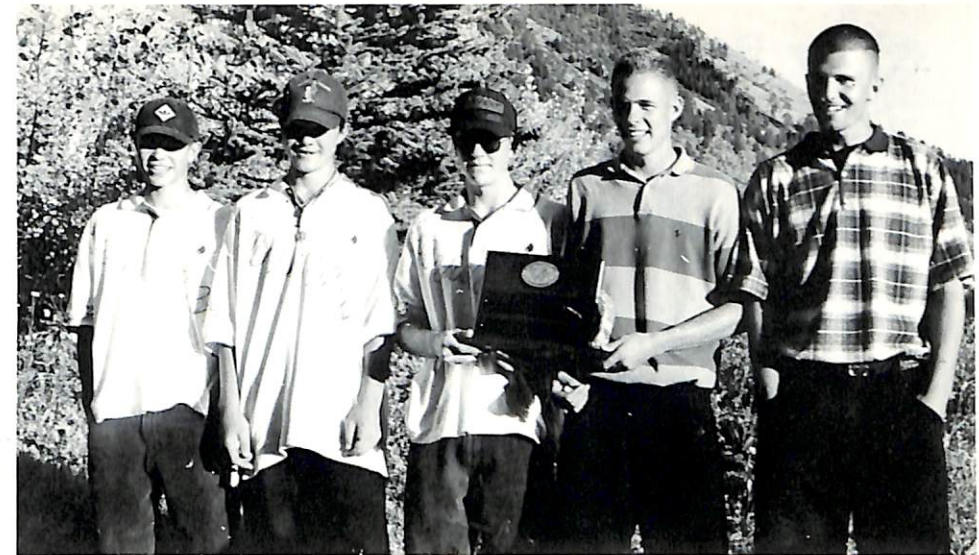

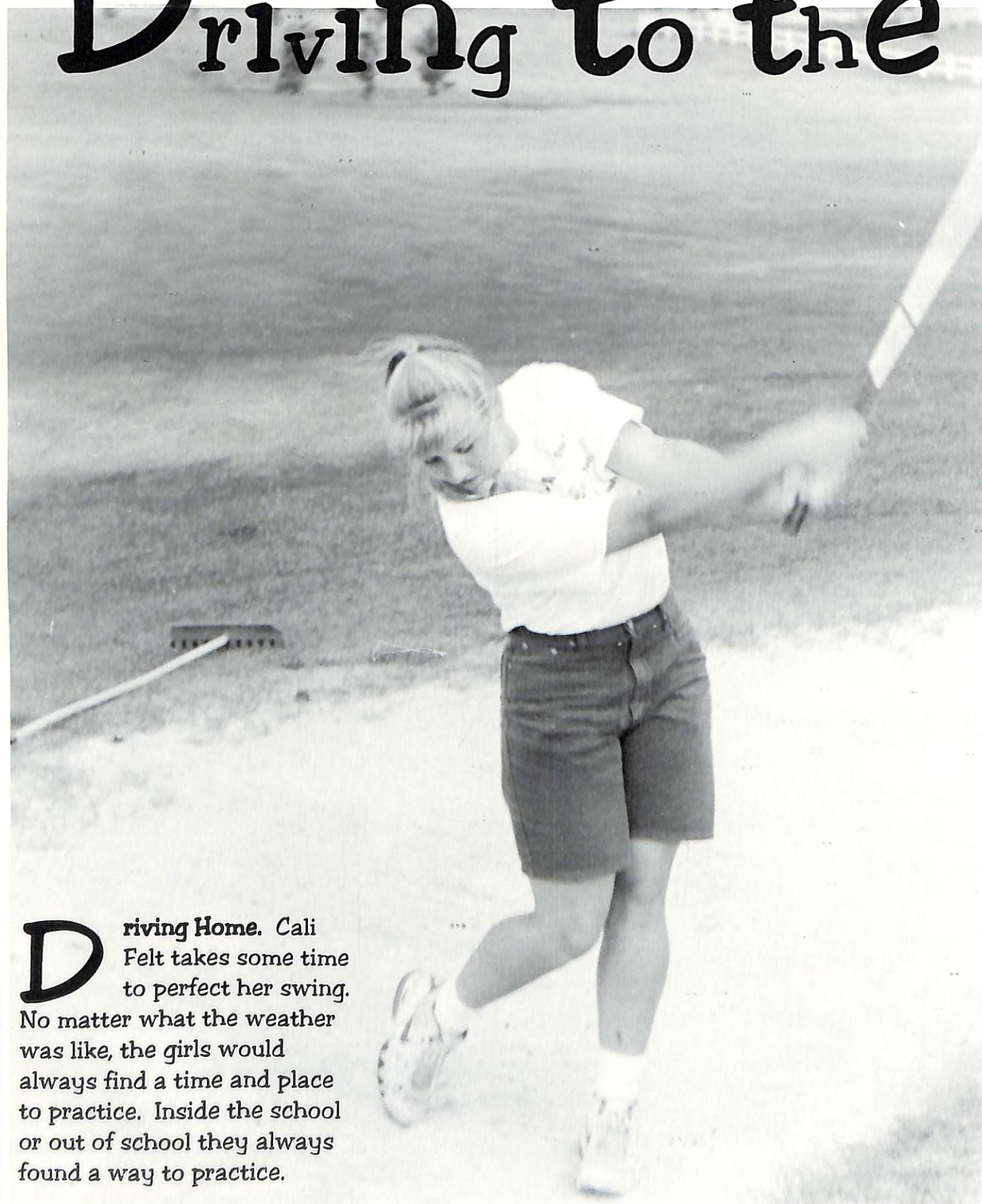

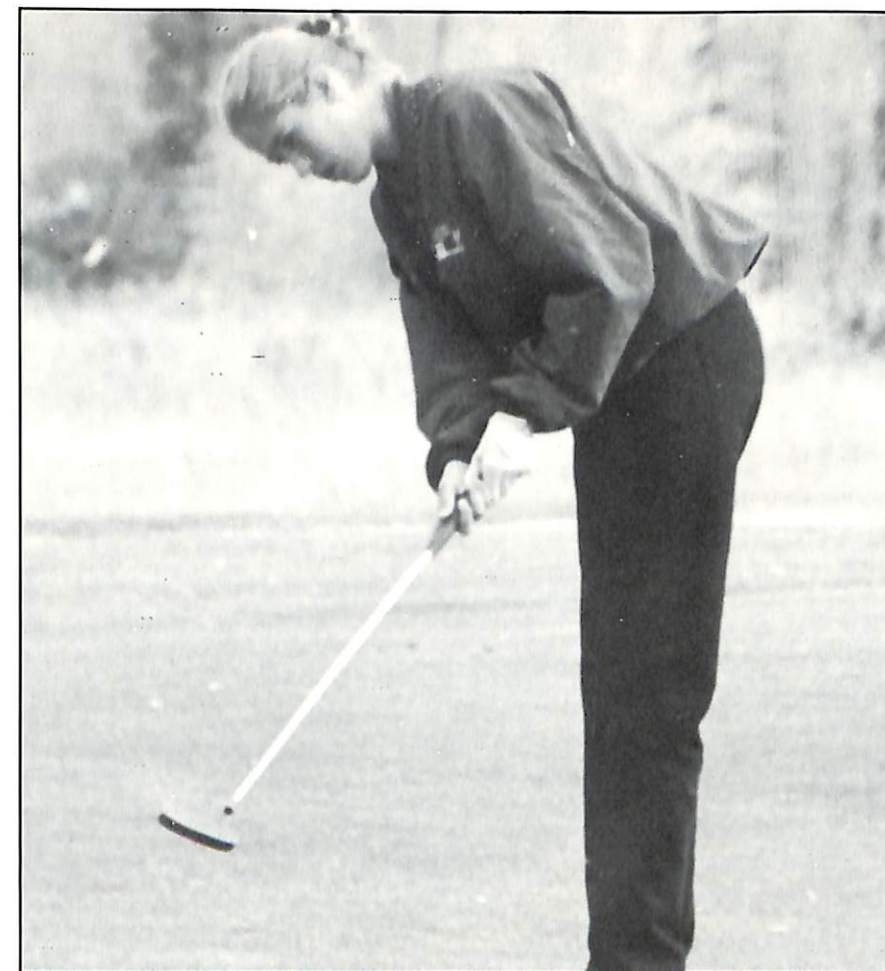

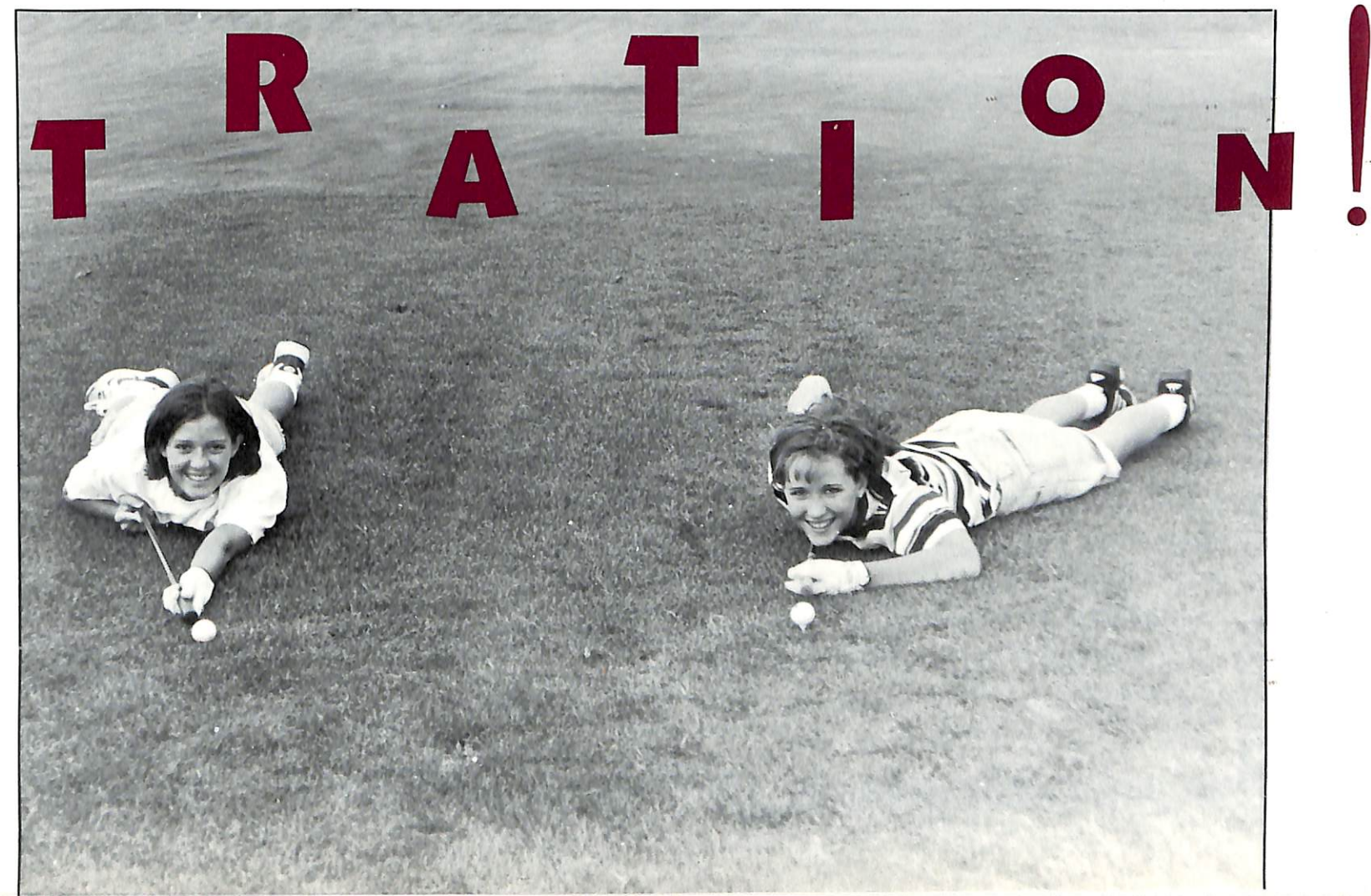

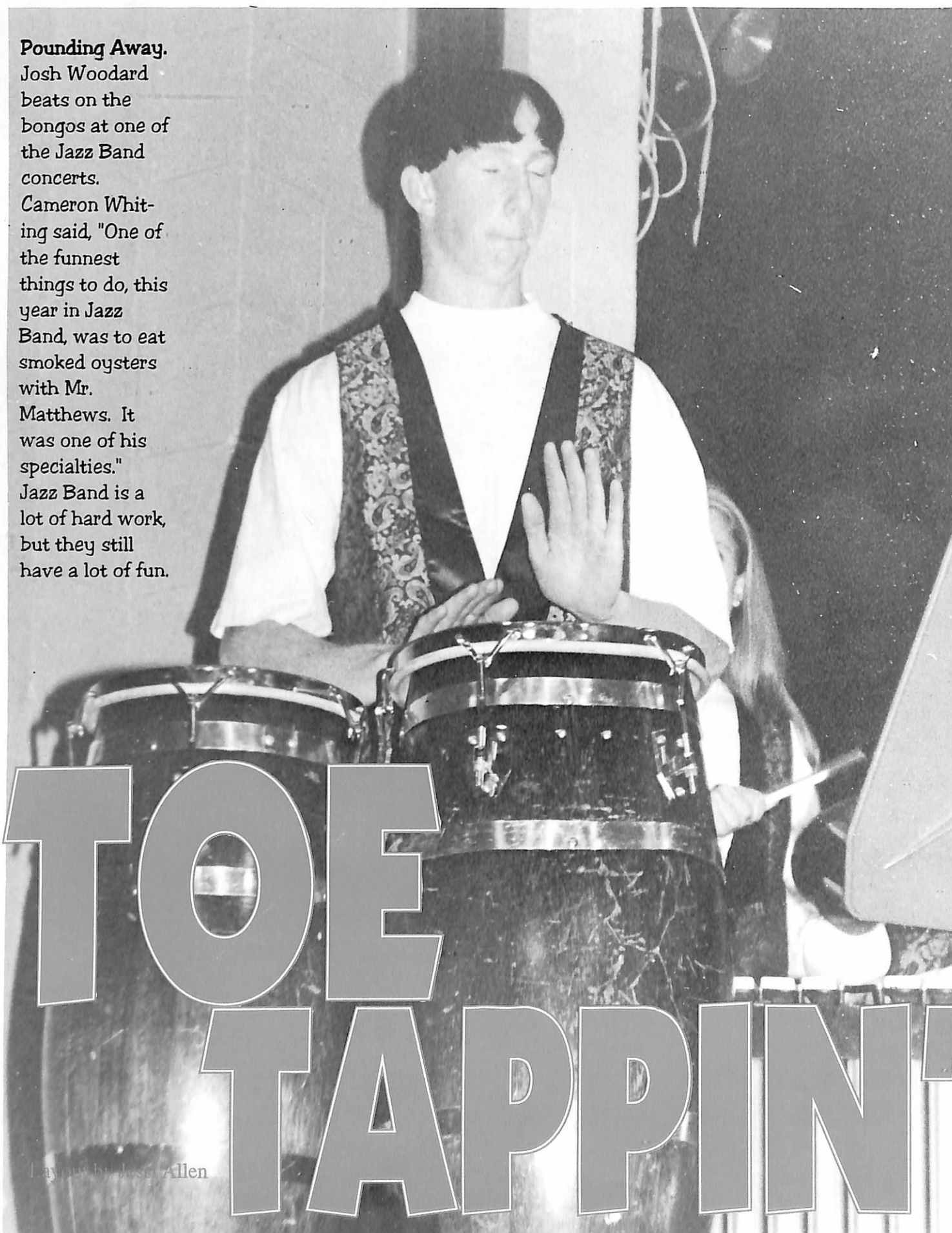
