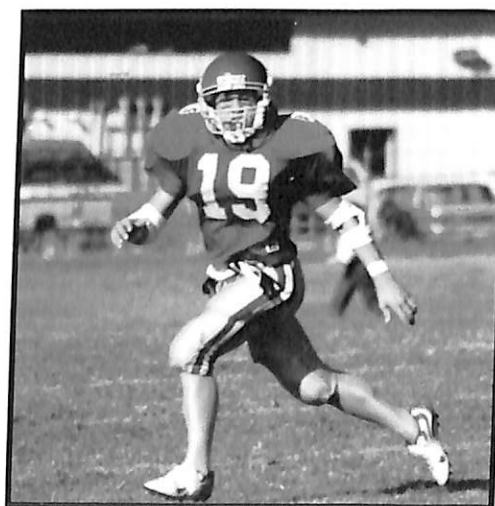


Go Braves...Russel Stevenson, the school mascot, supports the braves to the end. He said, "Cheering for the school is one of the greatest experiences that you could ever have."

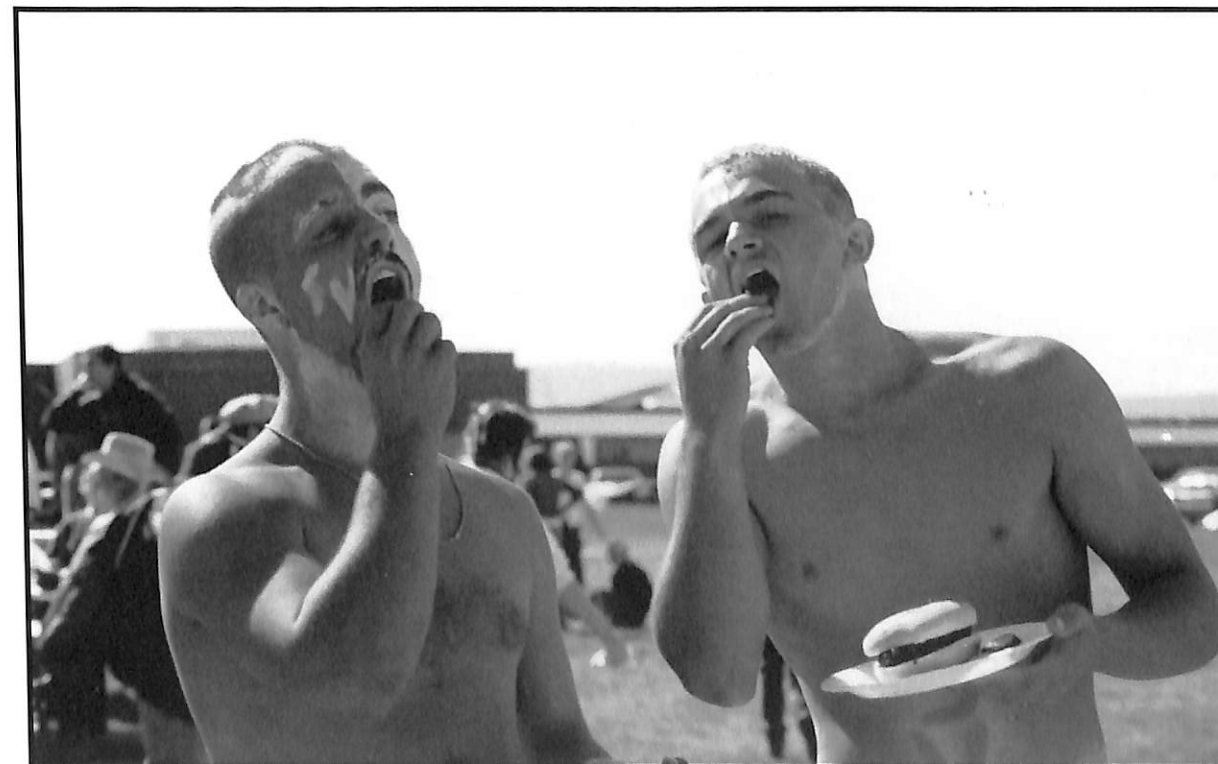

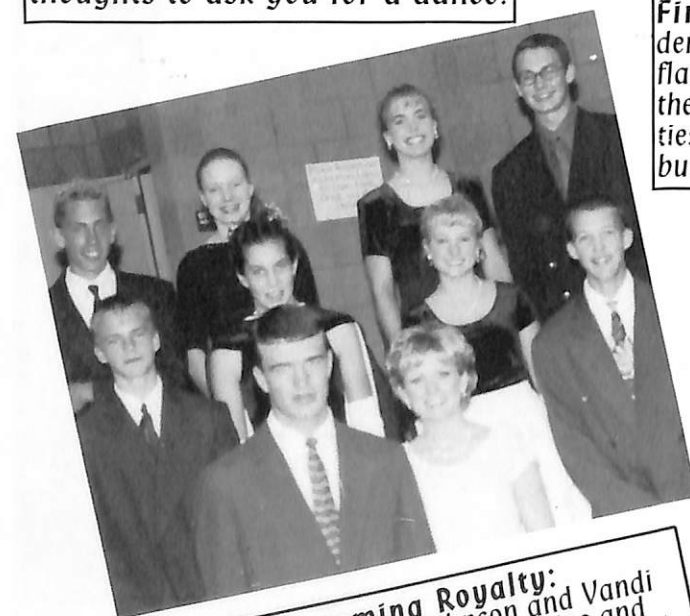

Year 2 Conquer

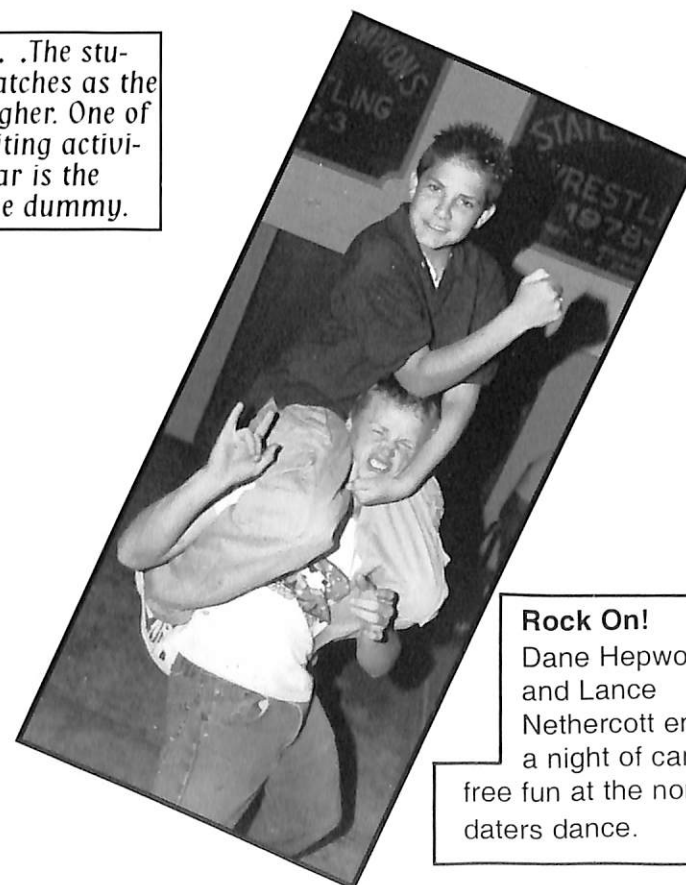

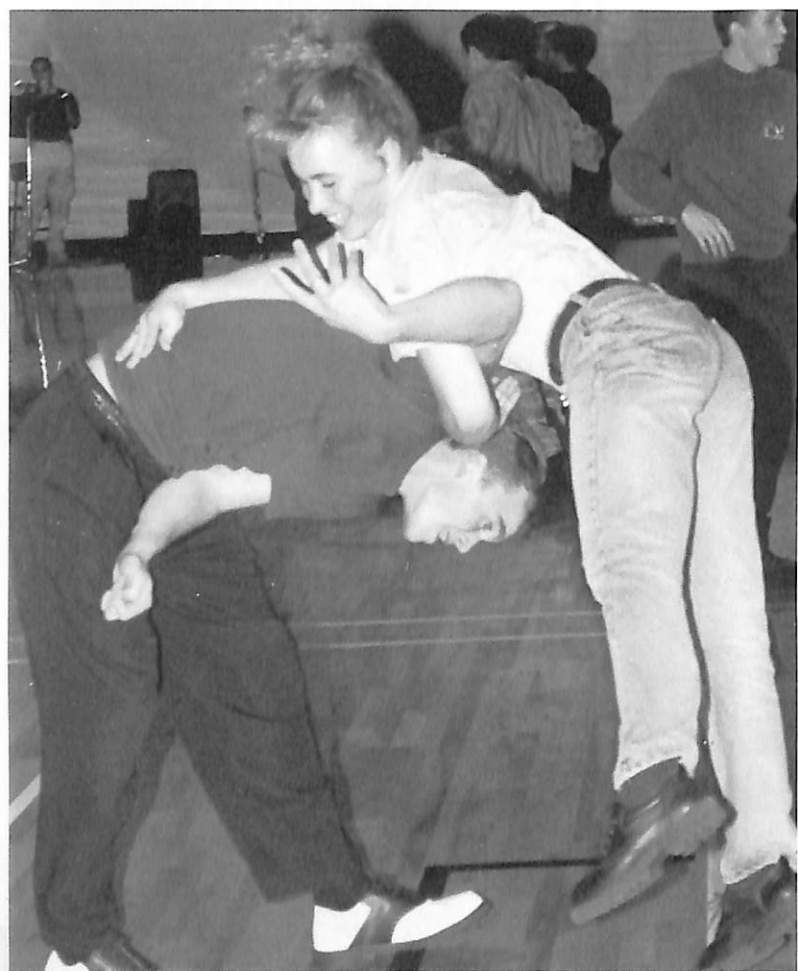

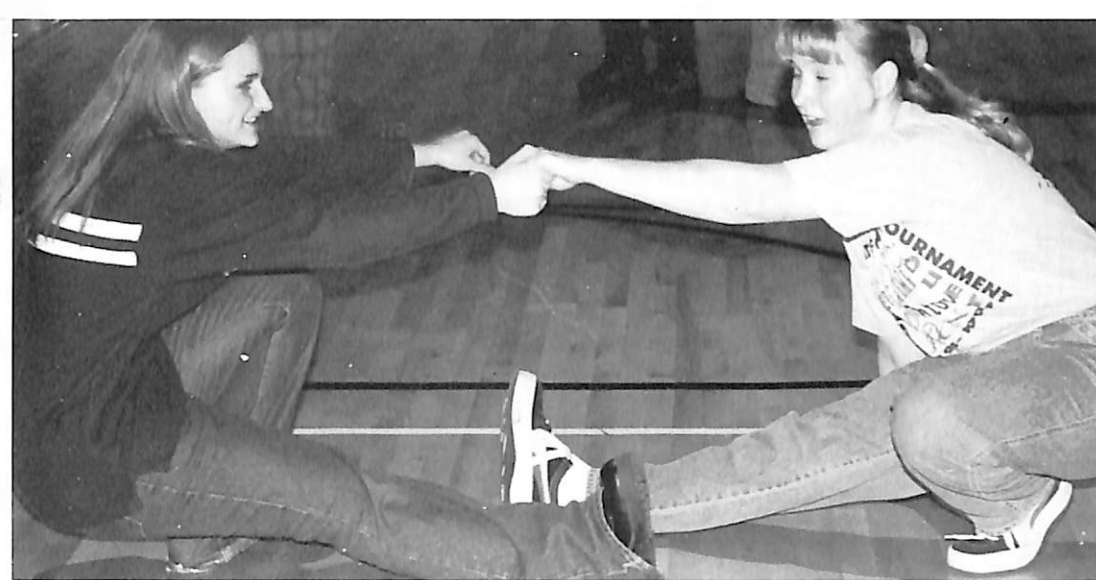
It don't mean a thing. . .Eric Clark and Amber Hall know that it don't mean a thing if it ain't got that swing.

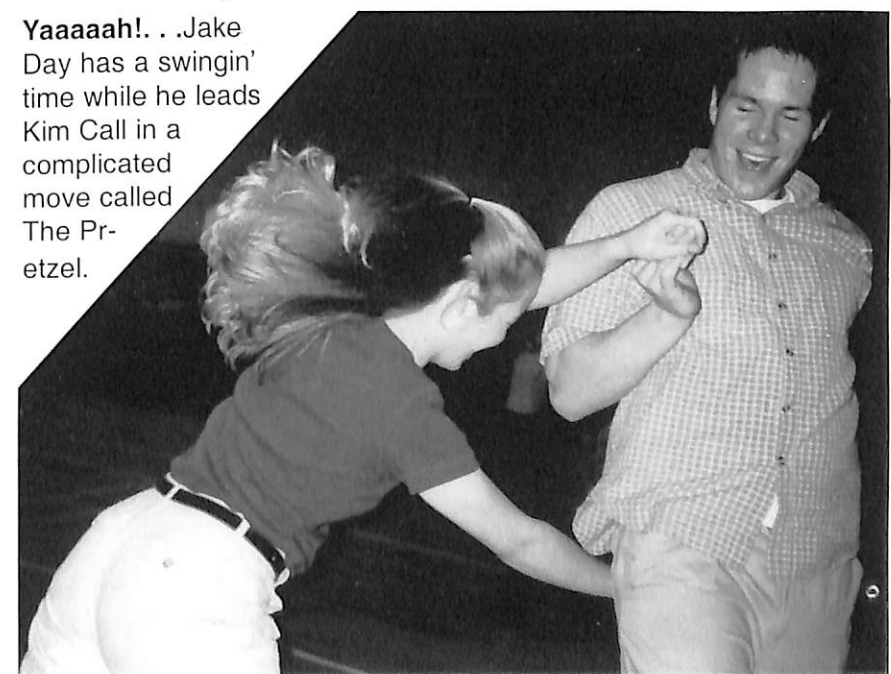

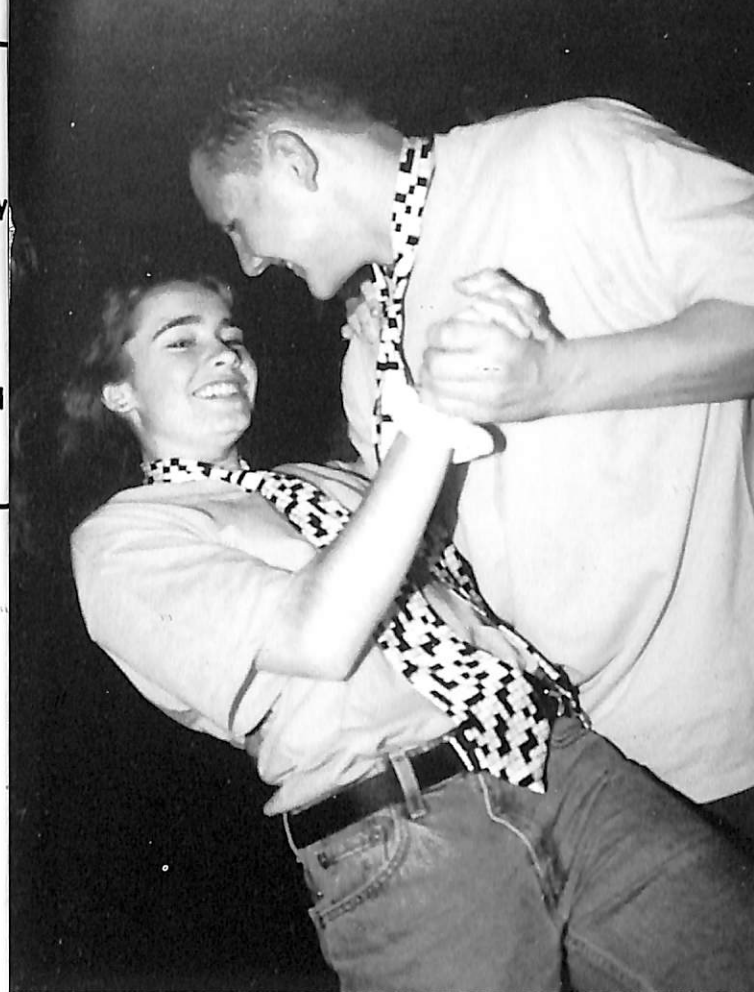

Mashing it Together

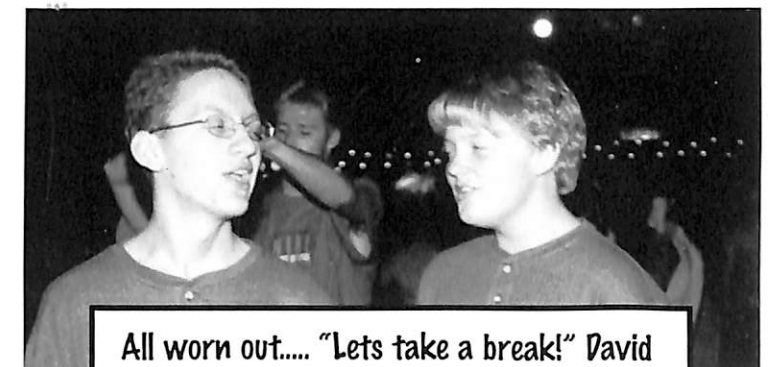

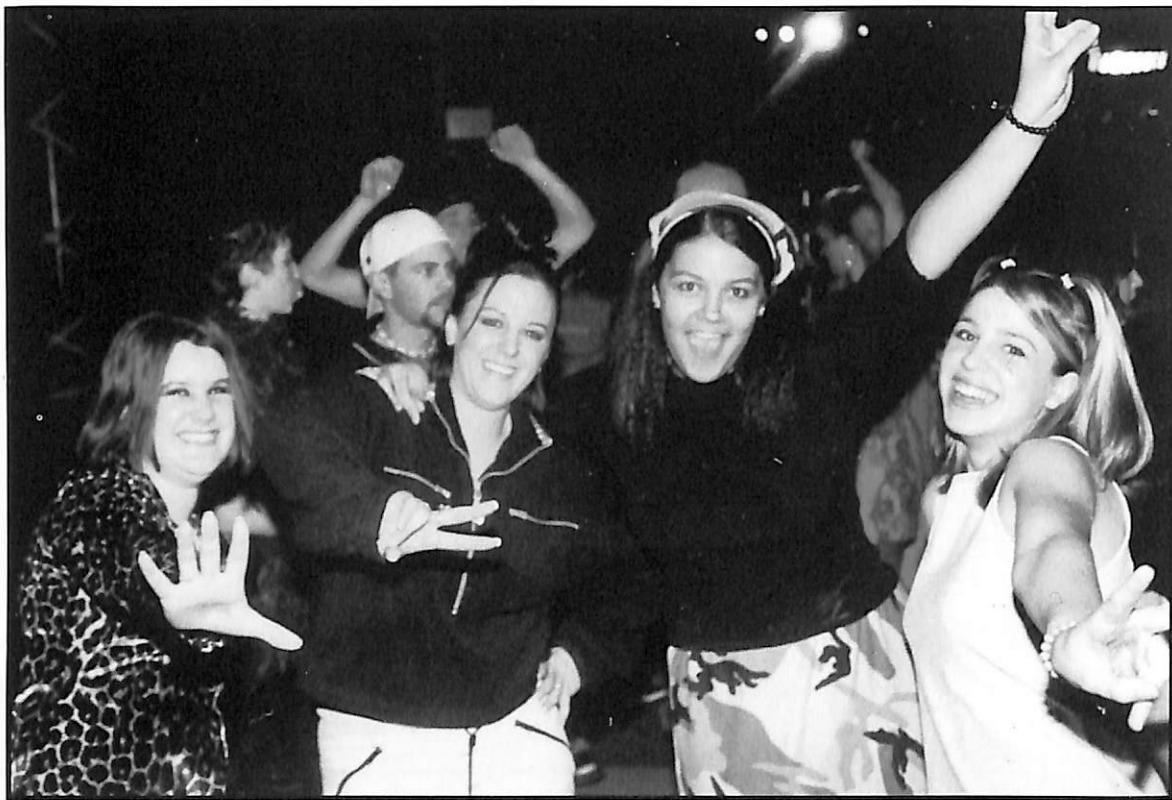

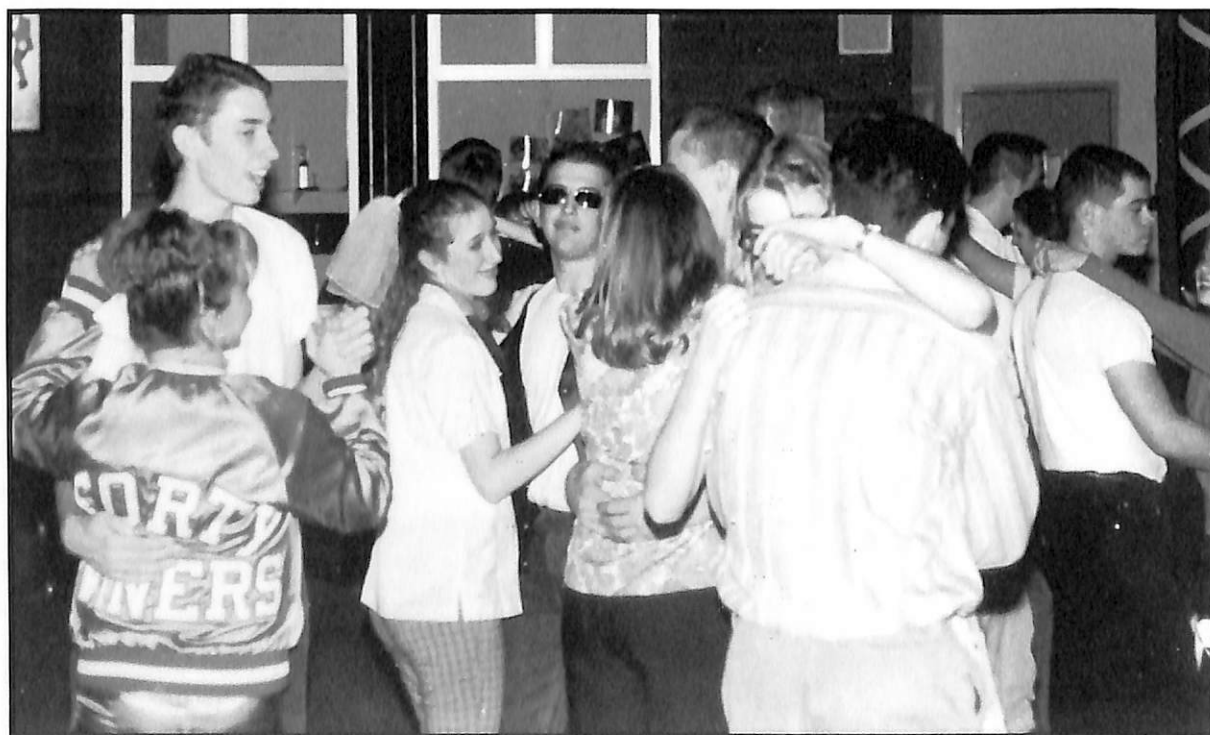

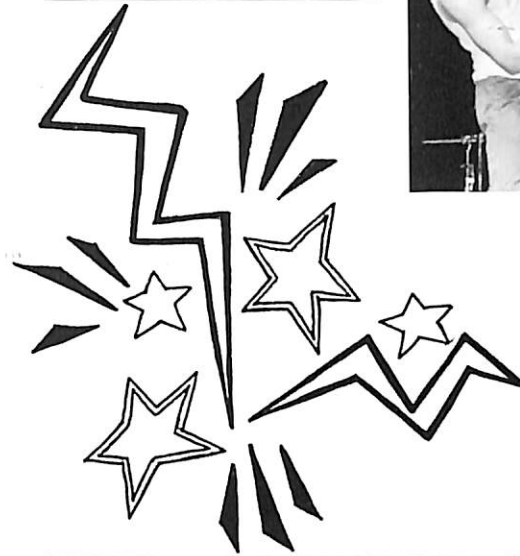

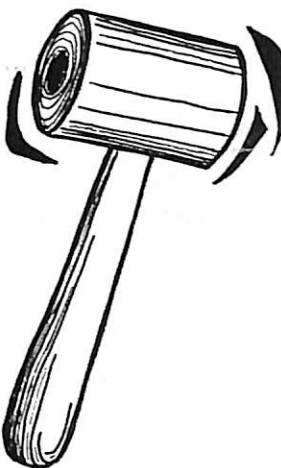

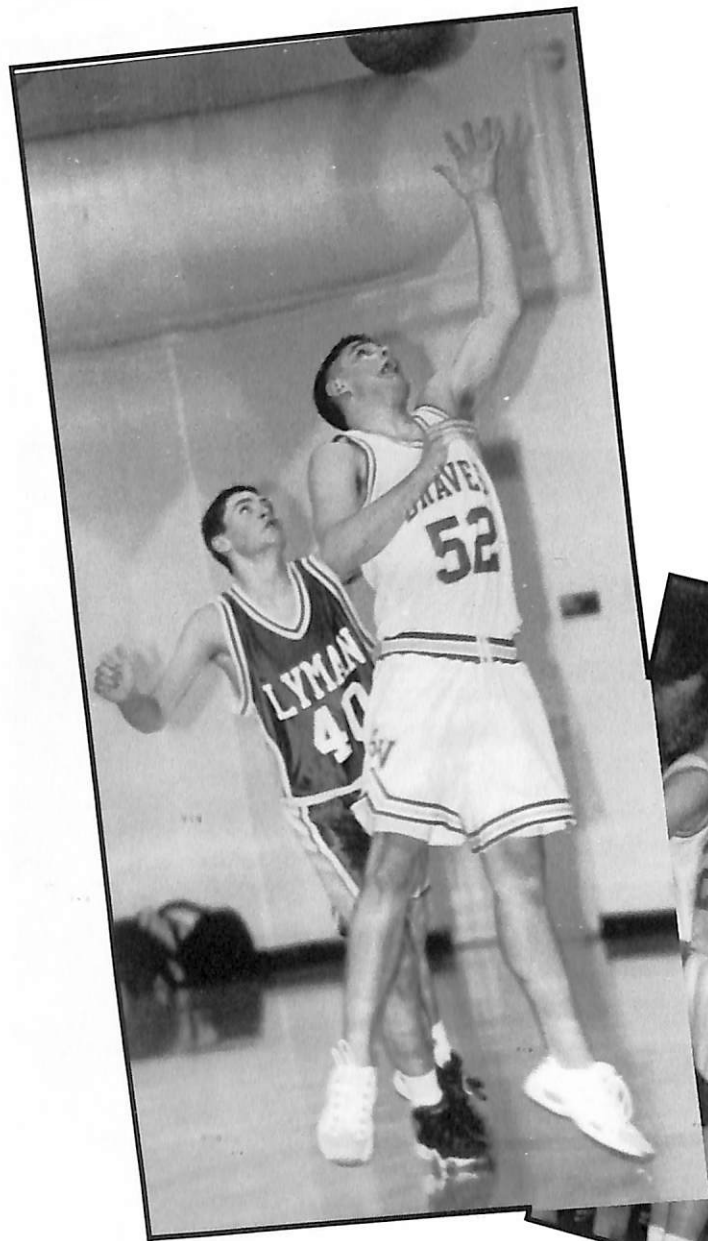

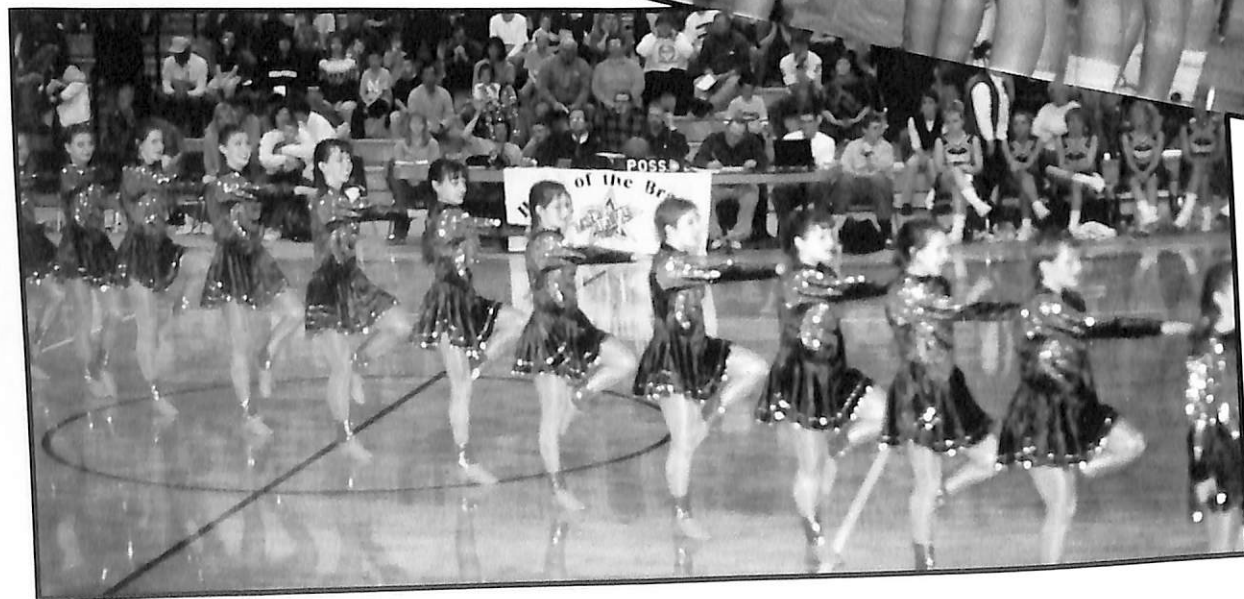

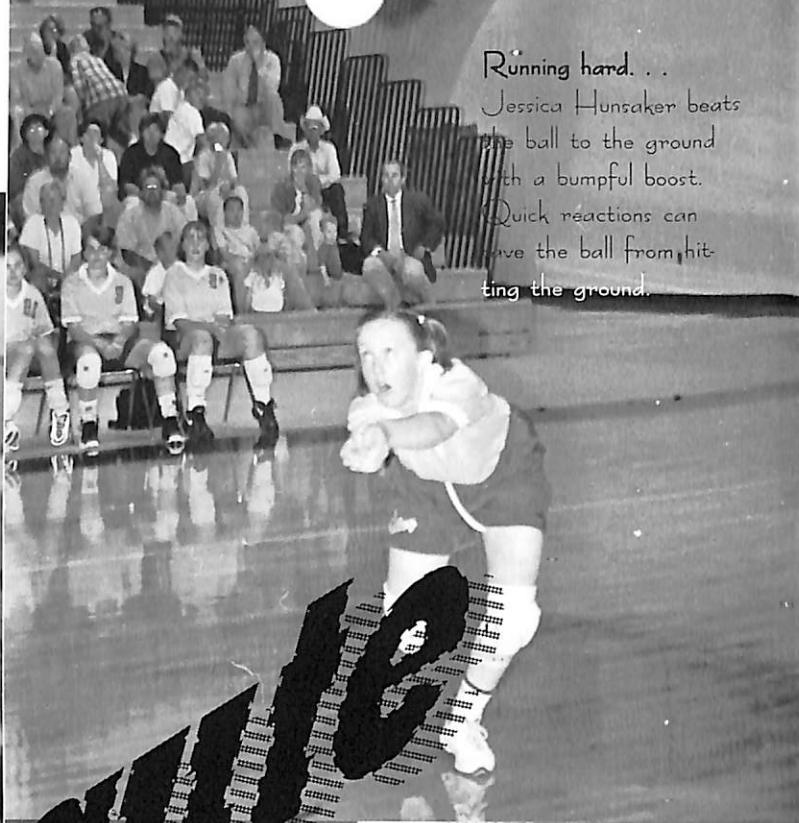

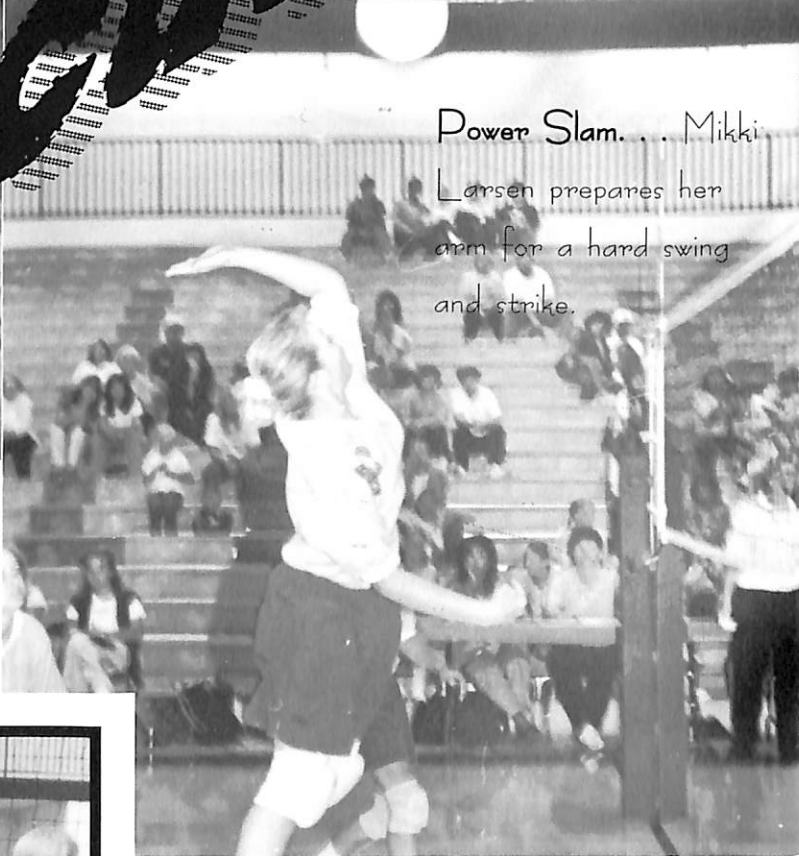

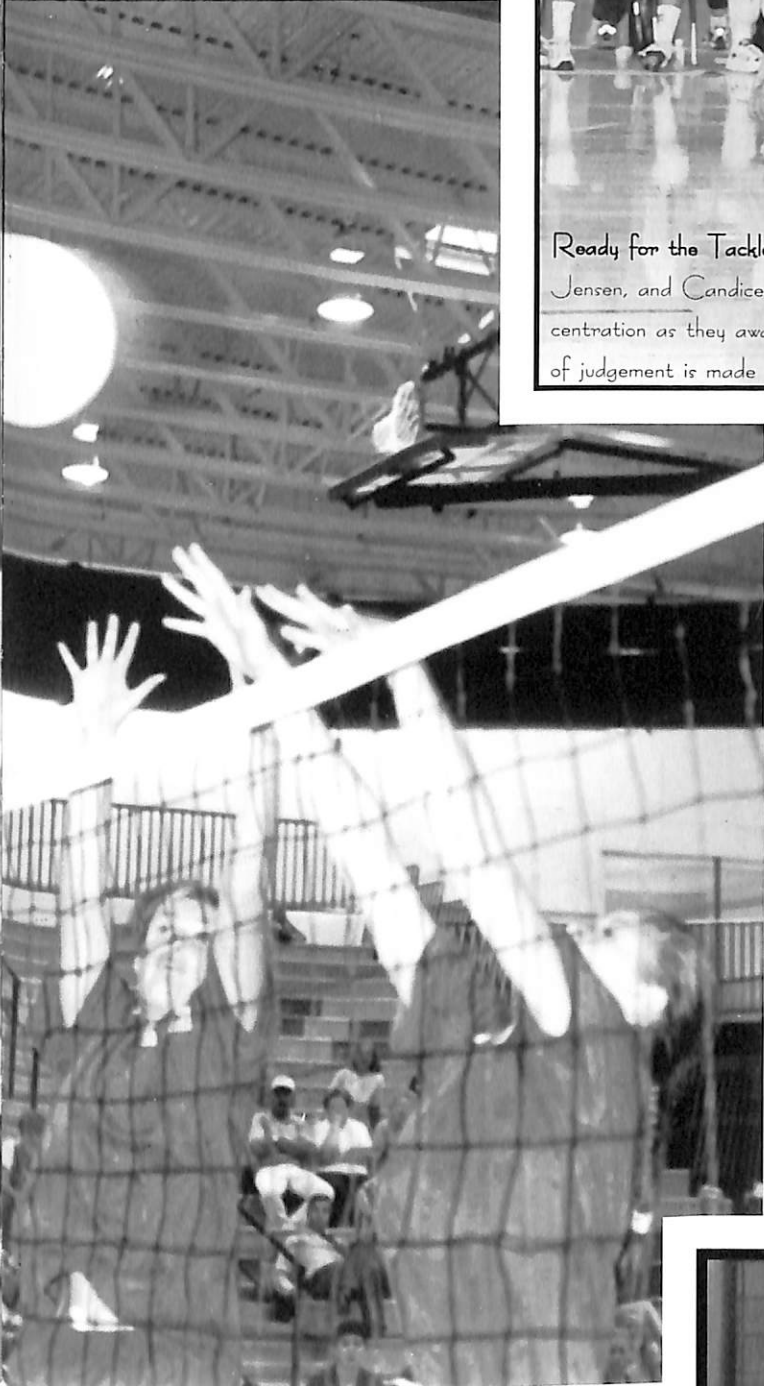
Running hard. . . Jessica Hunsaker beats the ball to the ground with a bumpful boost. Quick reactions can save the ball from hitting the ground.



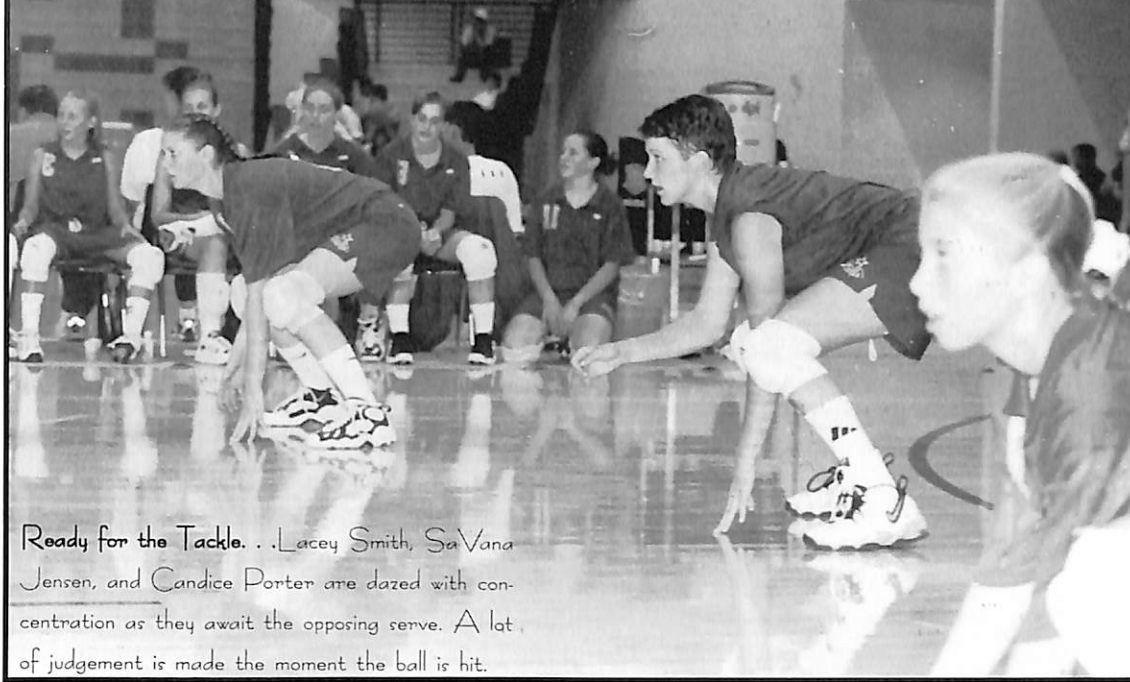
Power Slam. . . Mikki Larsen prepares her arm for a hard swing and strike.

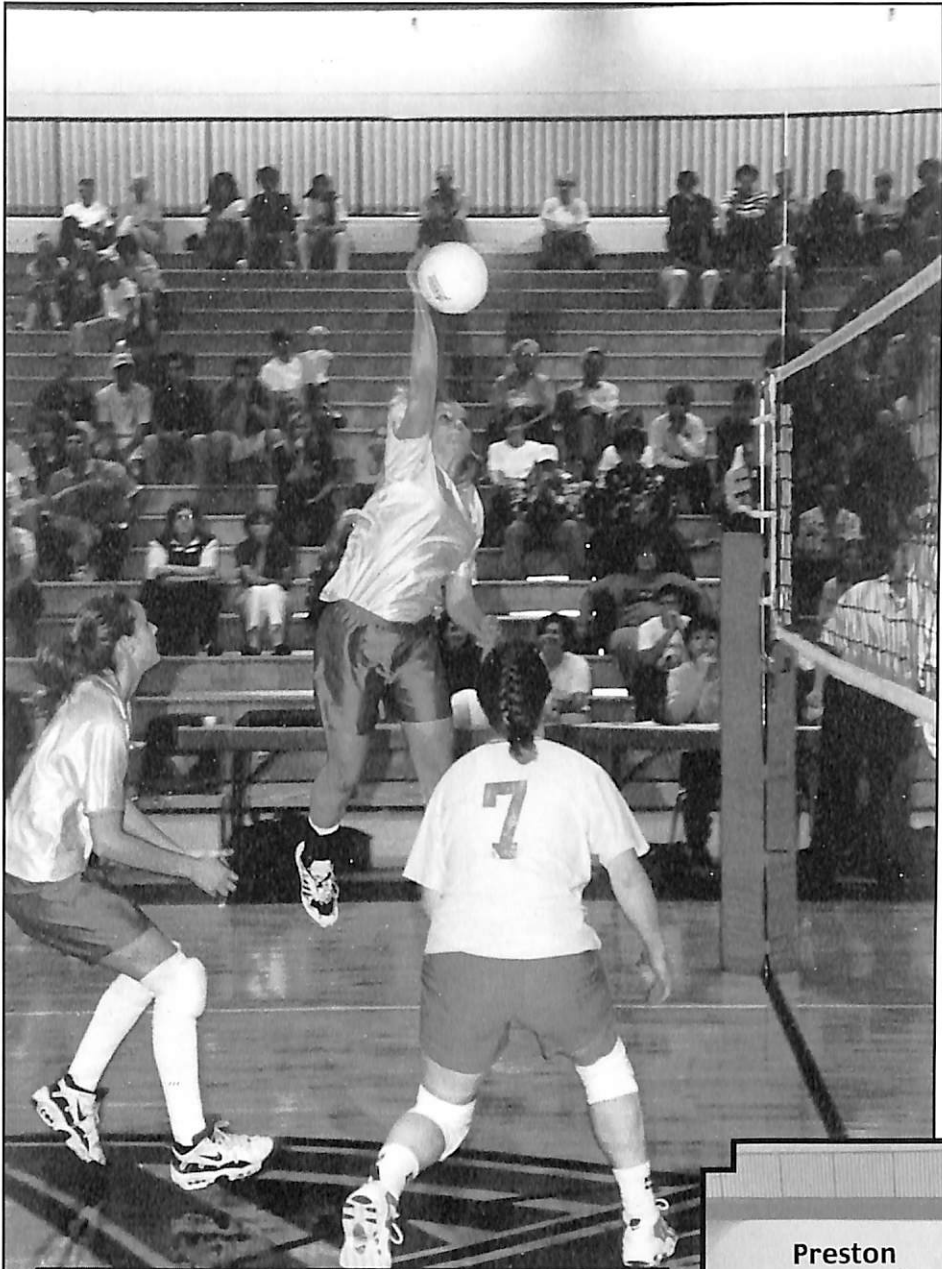

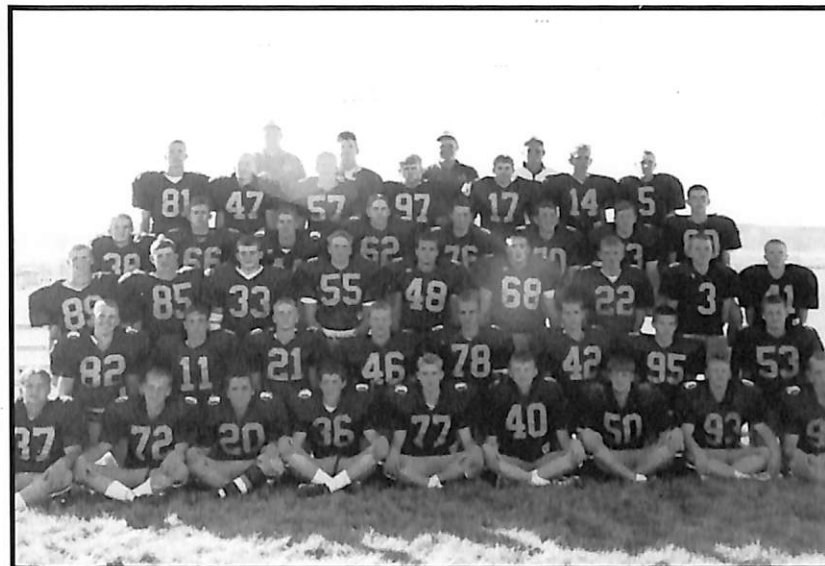
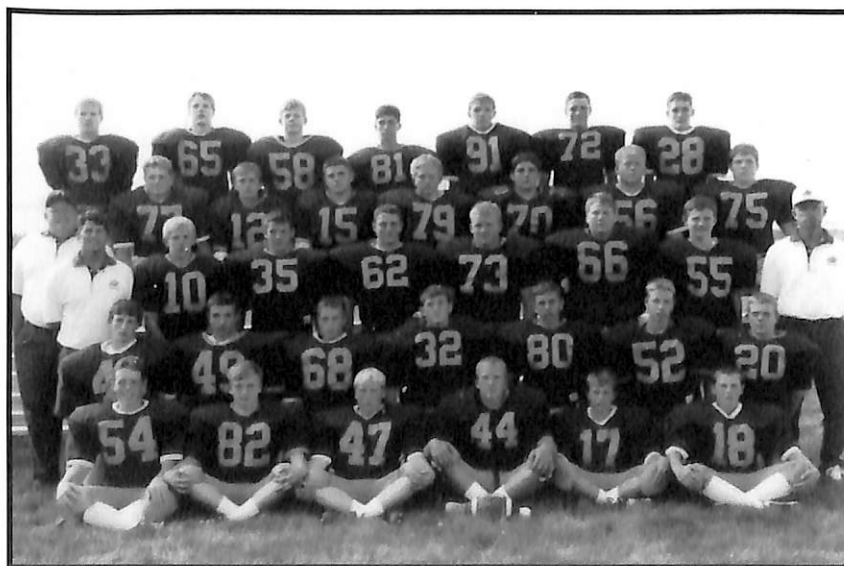


Intense accuracy... Thinking quick on his feet, Matt Nardacci dodges the opponents defense and rushes in for a touchdown.

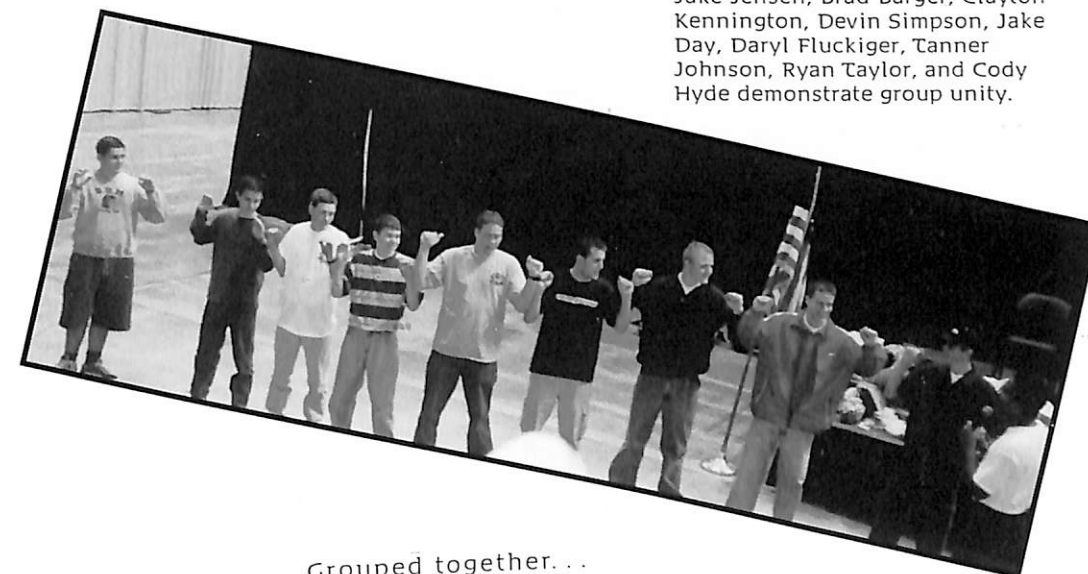

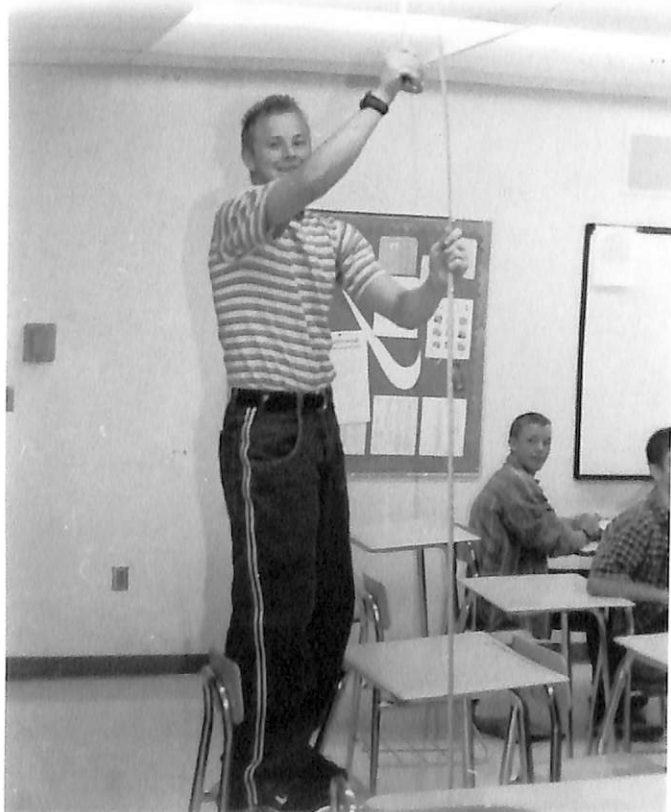

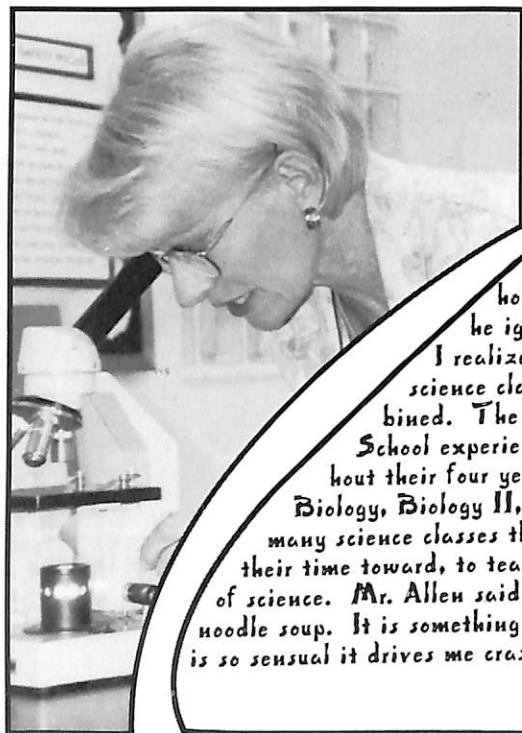
Applications

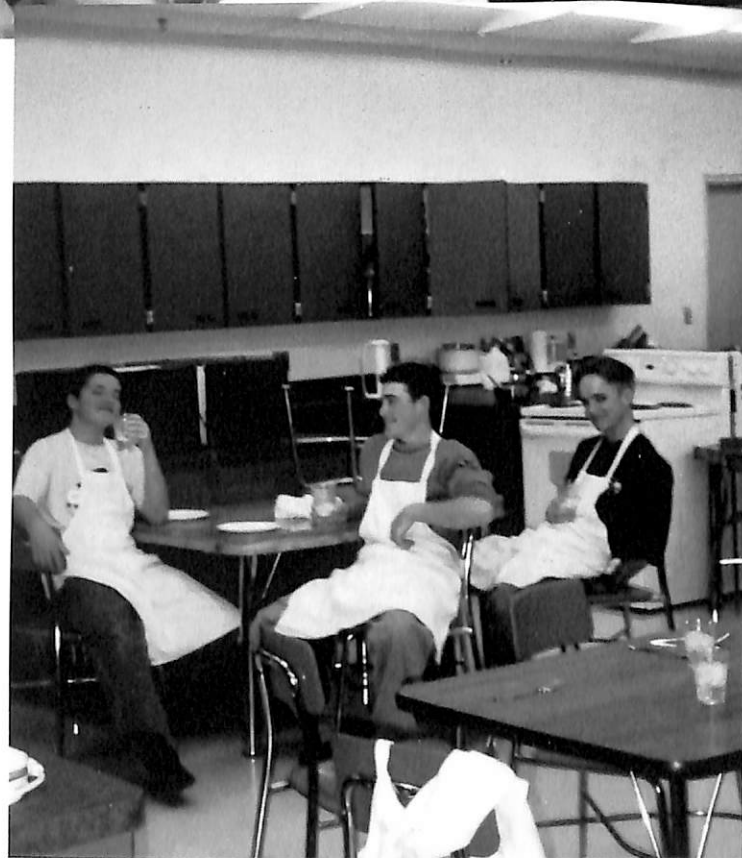

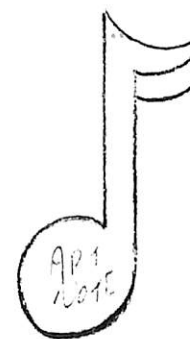

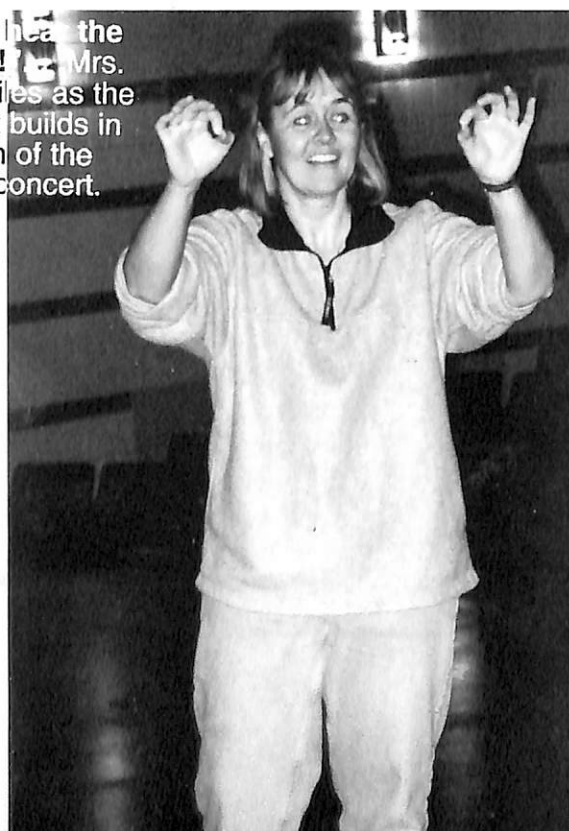

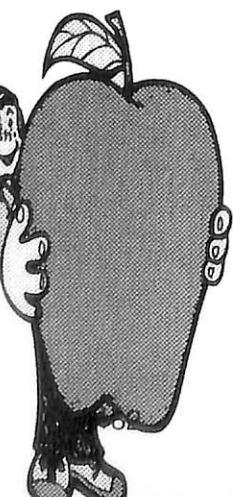


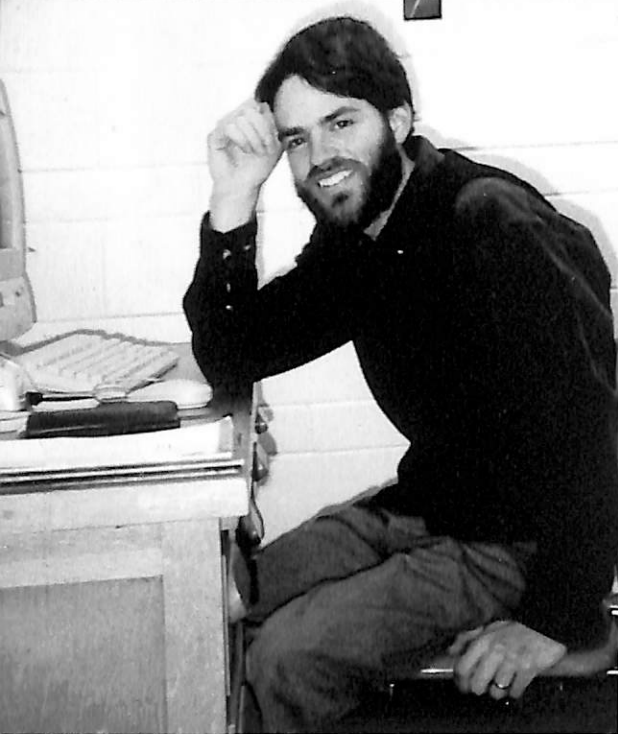
Mr. Clyde Rainey graduated from SVHS and then attended the University of Wyoming. He has had 2 careers, one in engineering, and the other teaching math.
