
New Teachers Join English Staff


Along with our regular steady flow of homework. we endured small quizzes that led up to our most feared tests of all: Common Assessments.





Choir Attracts Multitudes


Who wouldn't choose singing over answering half a page of questions in trigonometry?





A-BAM! Their deadlines weren't as pressing as The Daily Planet's, but the newspaper staff seemed just





The intrepid staff teamed up in Casper with their newspaper allies to tackle the state journalism convention.


All rejoiced when they heard that their yearbook had taken the state



When regional and state competition rolled around, the boys' team took the regional title and went on to take 4th at State. The girls came in at a close 4th at regionals and finished 7th at State.




Goodbye... there's no other word like it in the English language. It denotes a finality, a sense of lasting separation.
