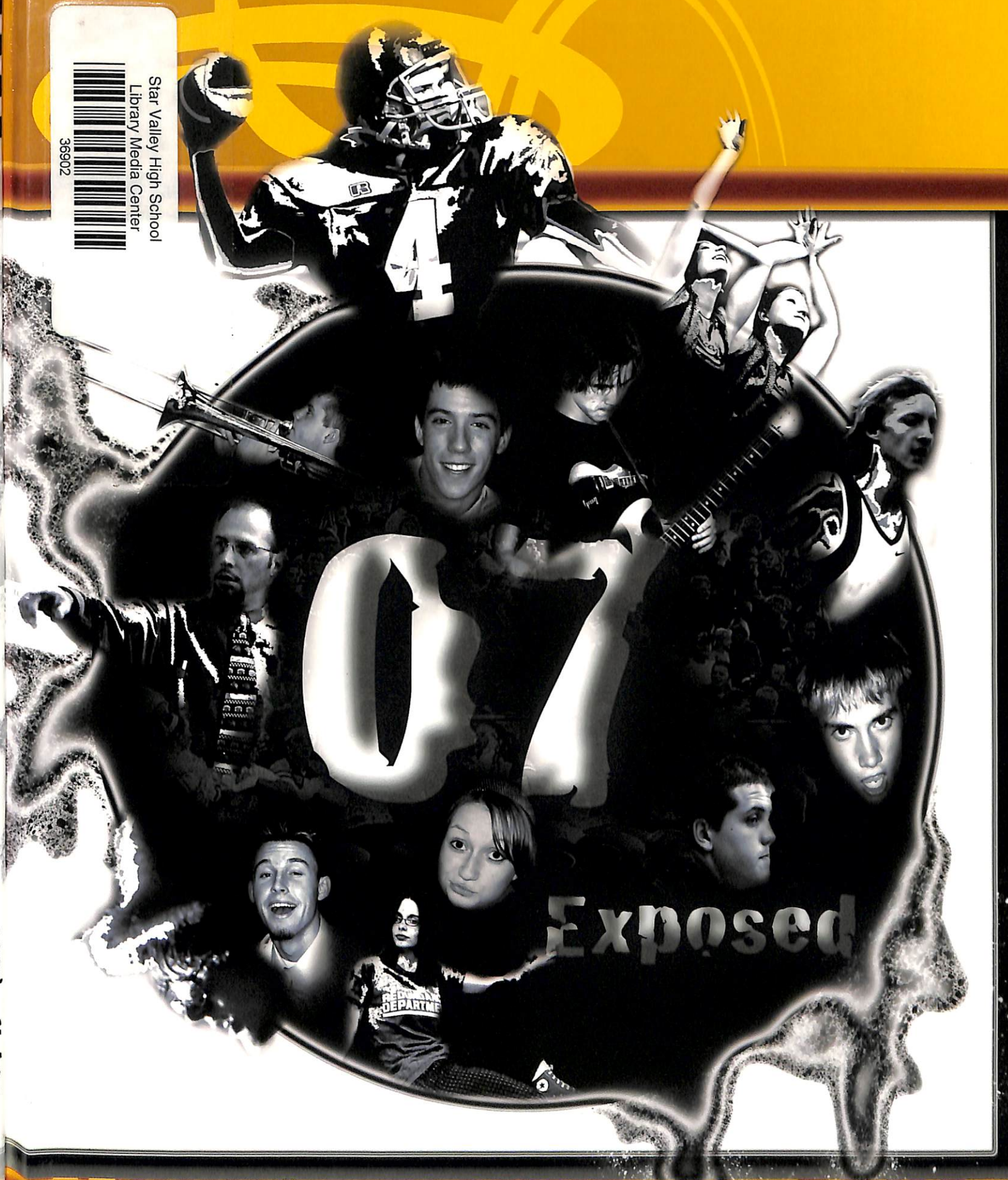

Attending high school comes with baggage, baggage we spend four years trying to hide in our own little closets.

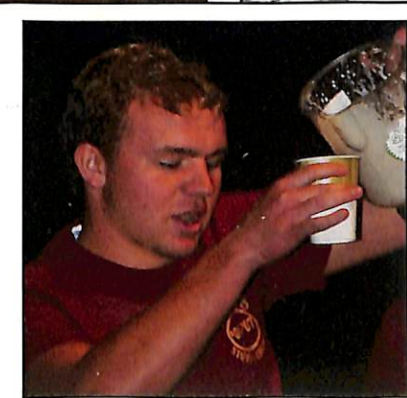
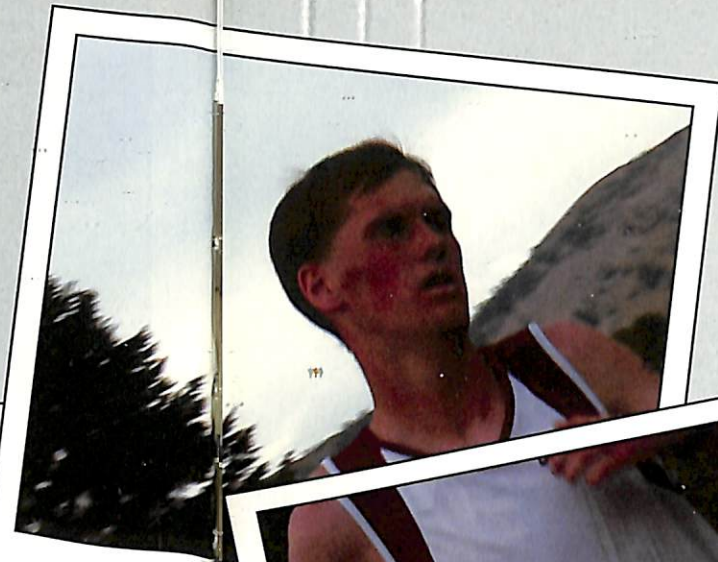
During the course of those four years we go through experiences that make those hidden parts of our lives visible, if only for a moment or two, to the world around us.

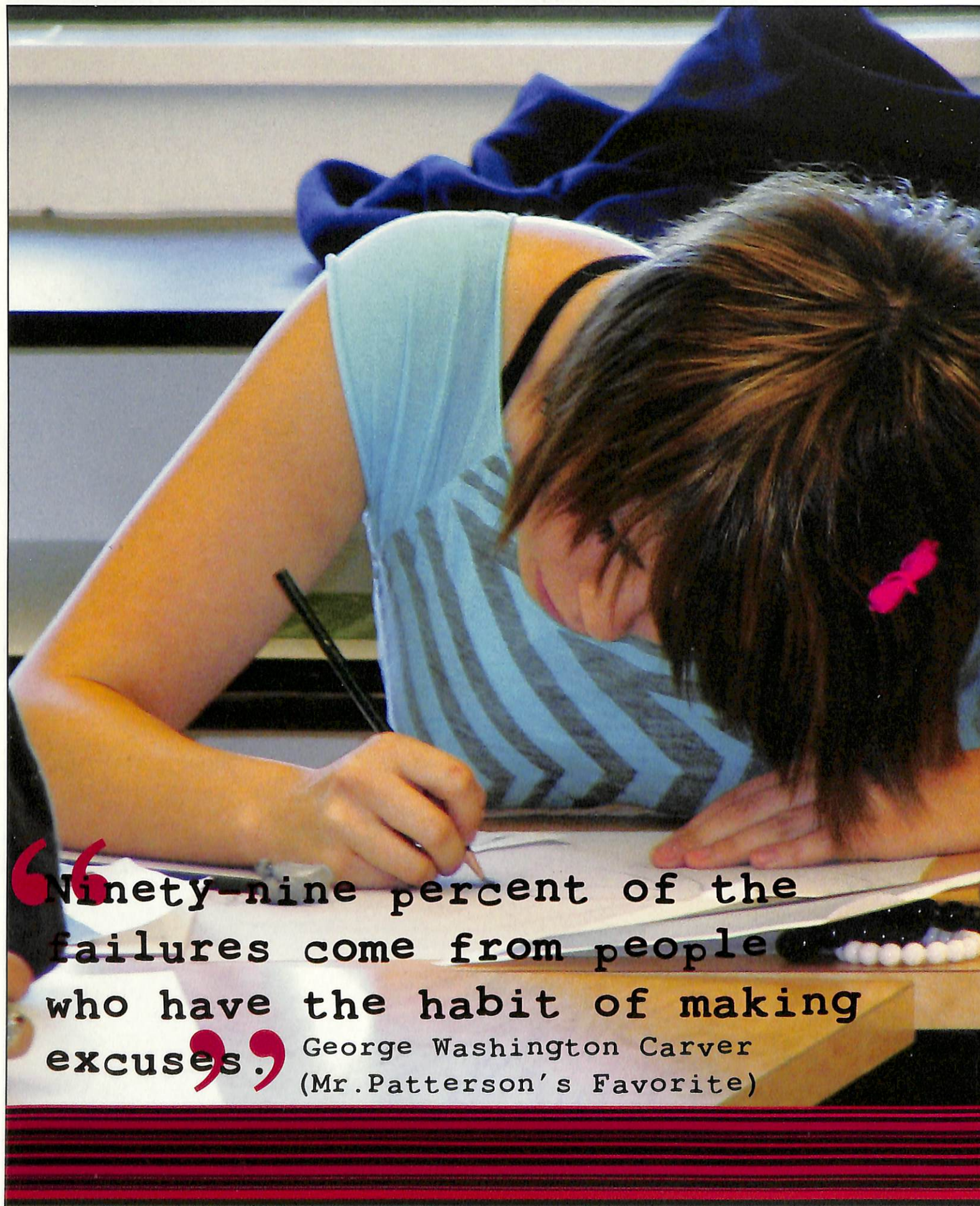
Why? Because Star Valley High School offers its students more than the usual drudgery.

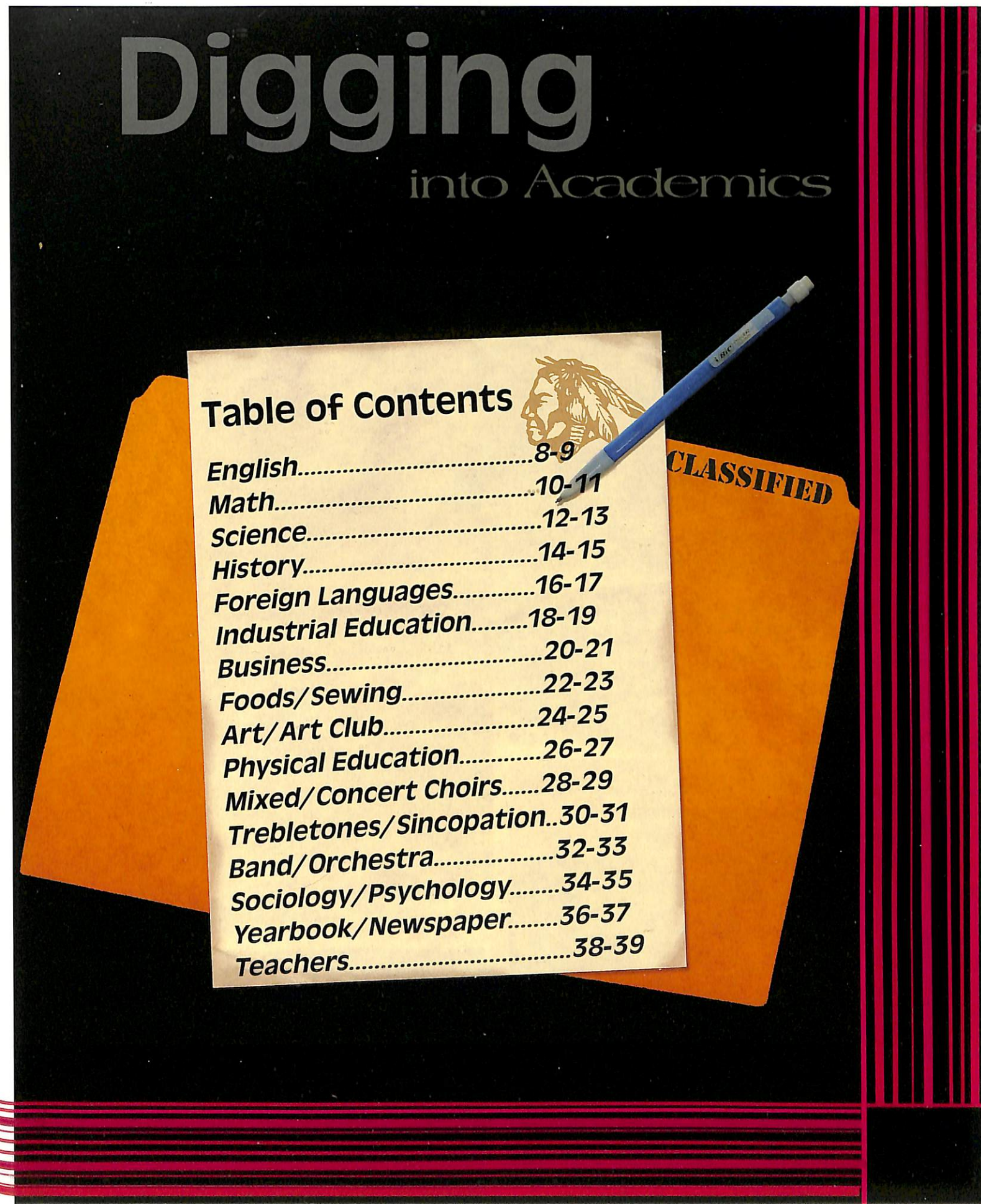
As a result every student expanded on their specific talents rather than having to only attend classes that held no interest for them.

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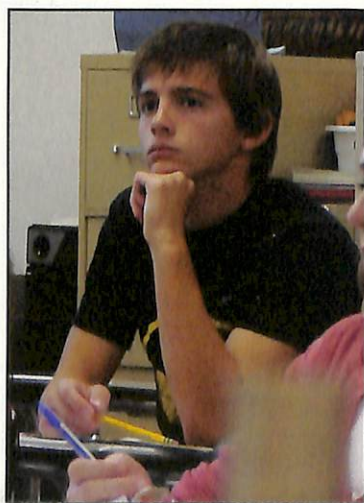


New Teachers Join English Staff

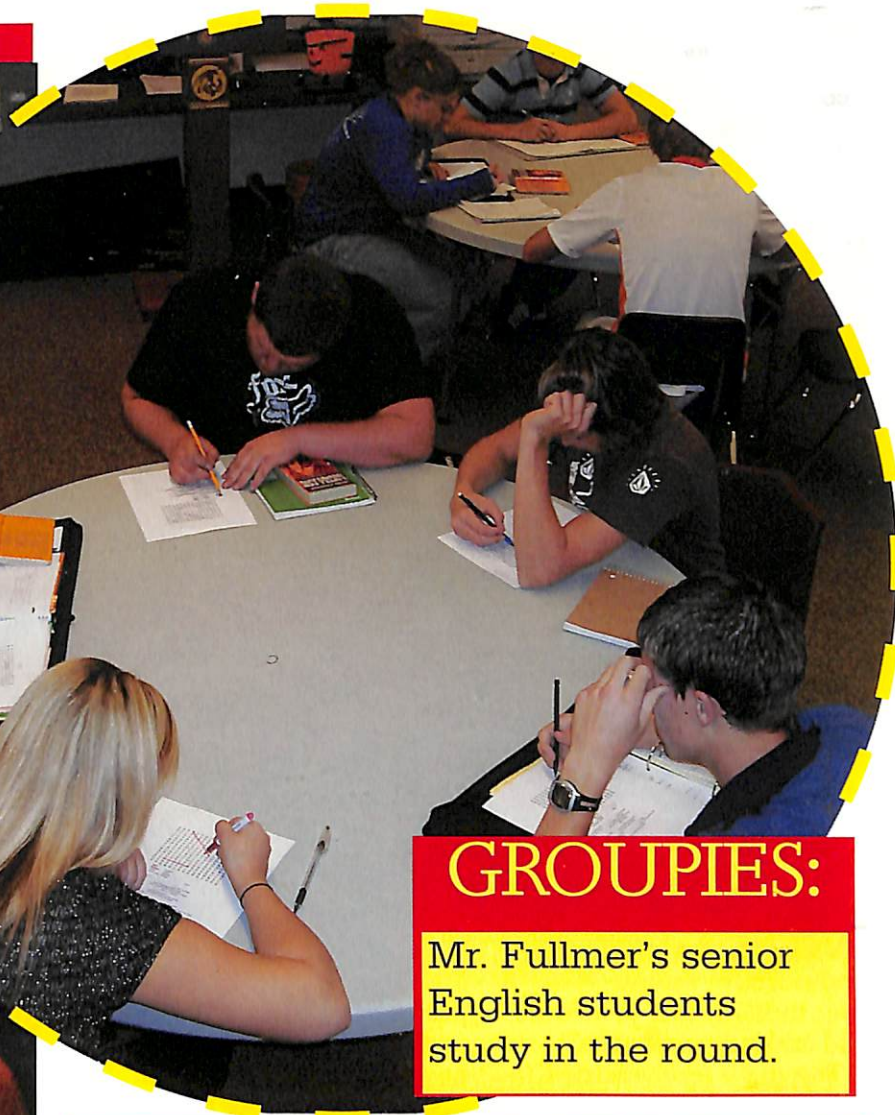

With all this work, we might have picked up some new trick... like ADDING!!!!

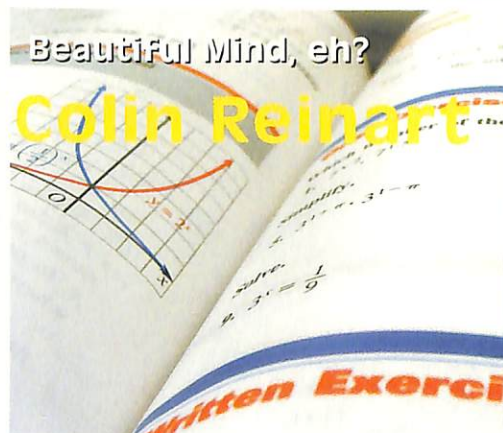

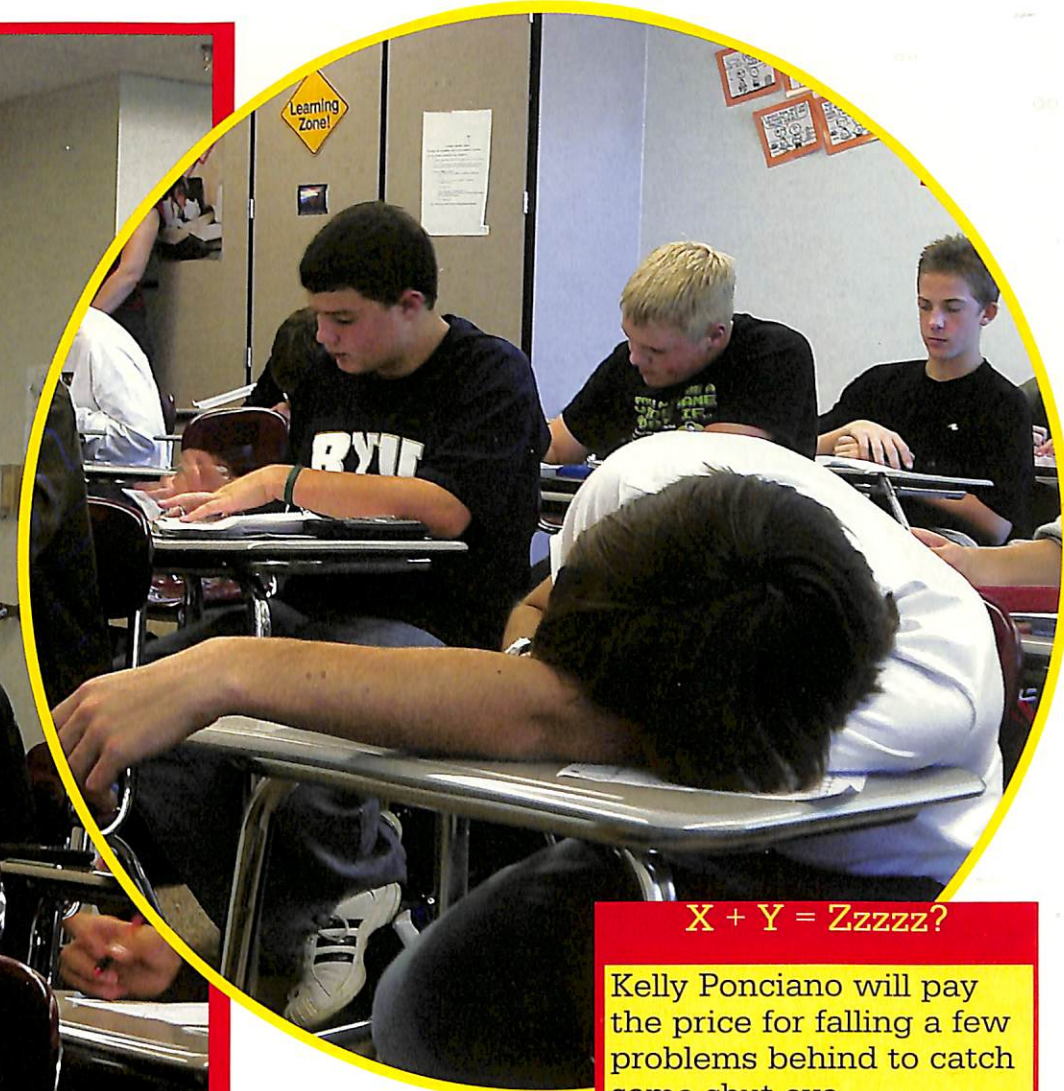

Last year Star Valley participated in the Wolsborn-Drazozich Memorial Mathematics Contest. Forty-nine schools went head-to-head to compete for the statewide awards and about 1,300 students participated. 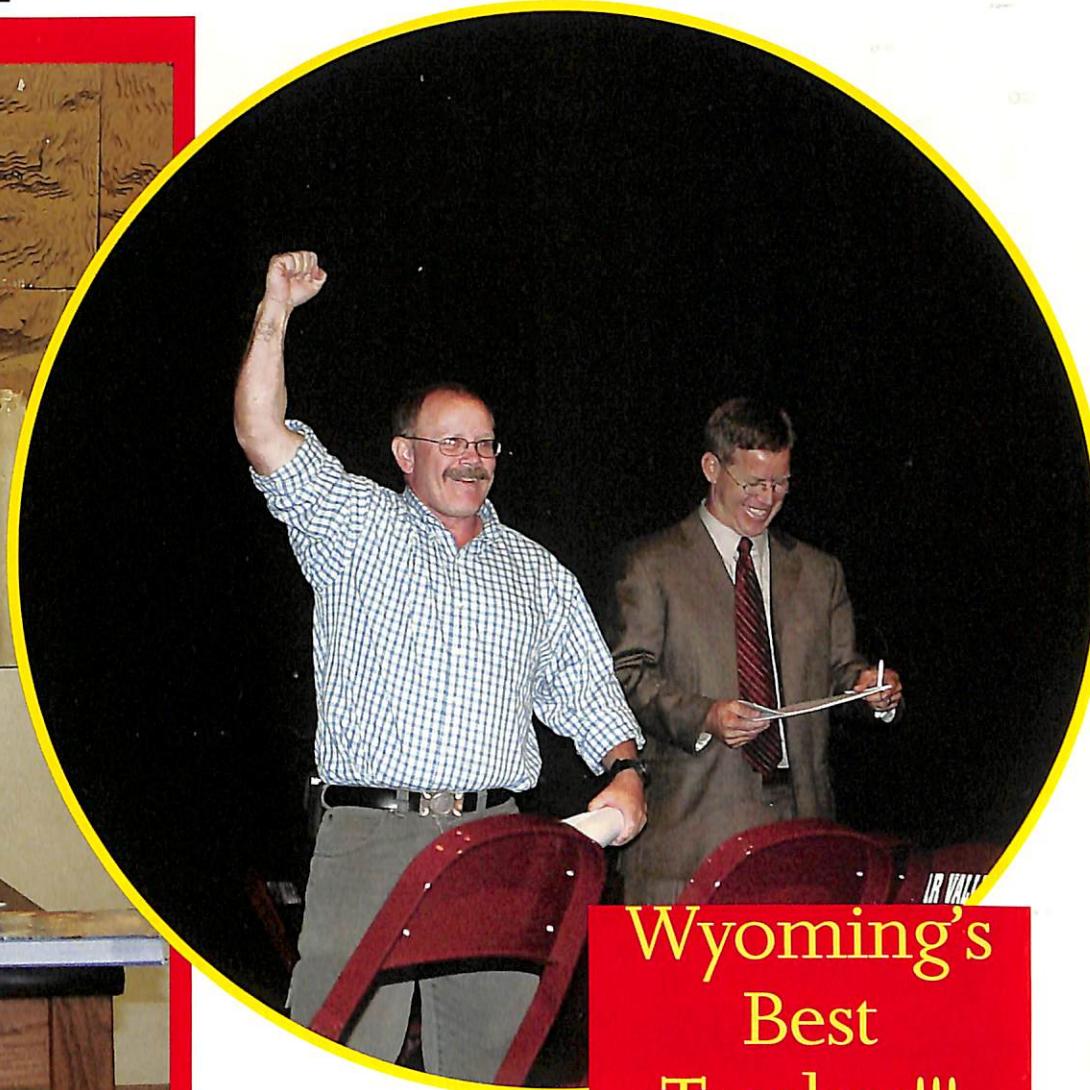

Art teacher Mrs. Kim Dockstader said, "It really helps when I teach about different artists if the students have some background to what was happening at that time in history."

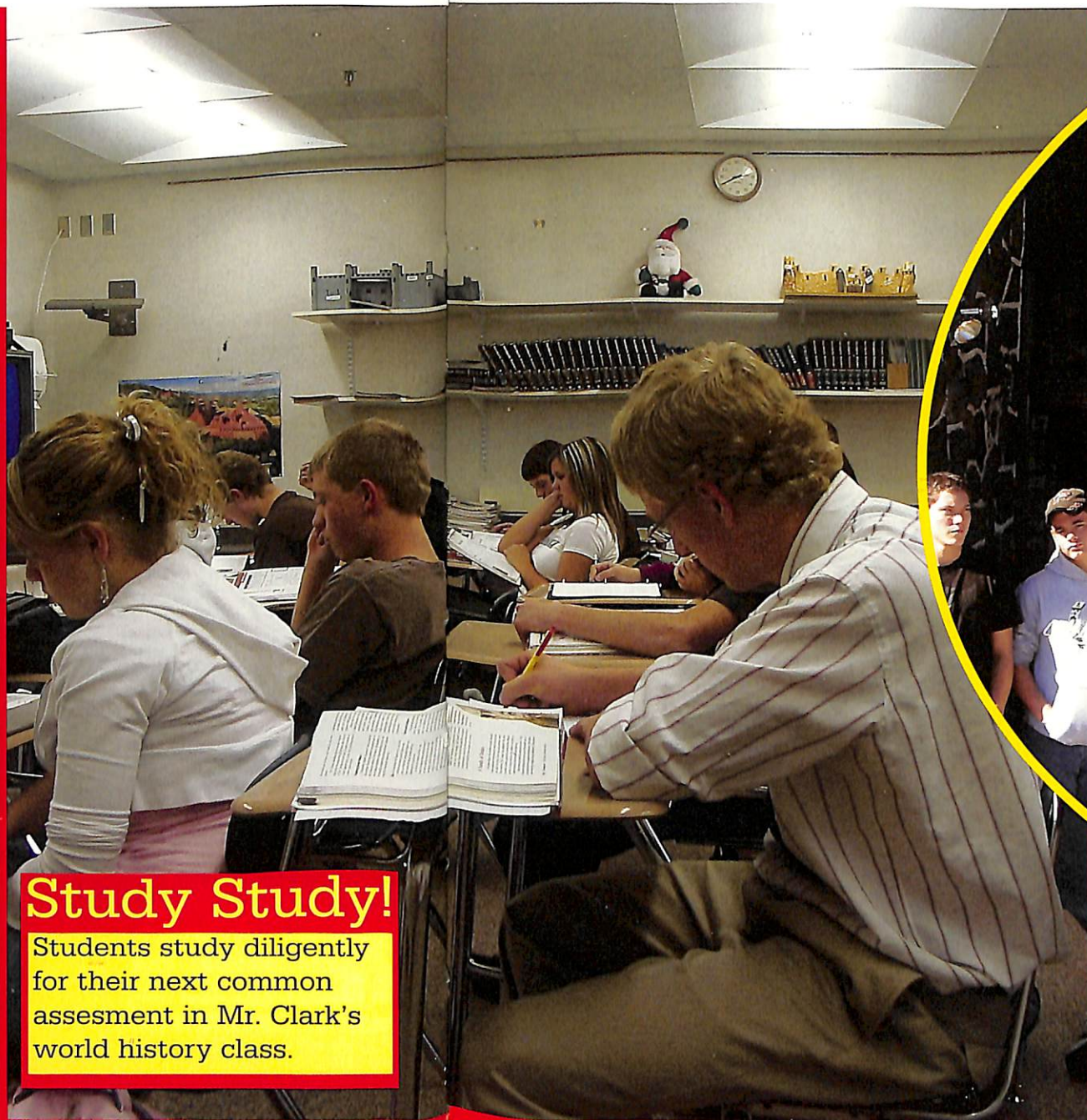

Learning a foreign language isn't any walk in the park, but have you ever thought about learning English as a foreign language? Most European countries require students to start learning English around the age of ten.

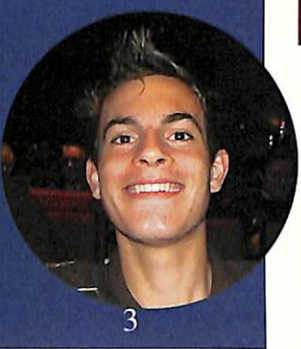
(1) Eivind Stein, from Norway, learned English when he was eleven. He said, "It wasn't hard; we started with simple words like colors and foods."

(2) Camilla Klausen from Germany was also eleven when she learned English. She said, "Some of it was hard, but it was

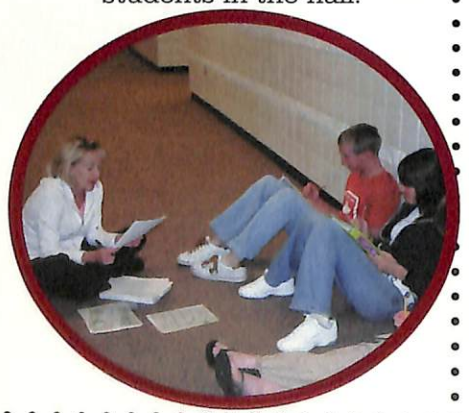
required."

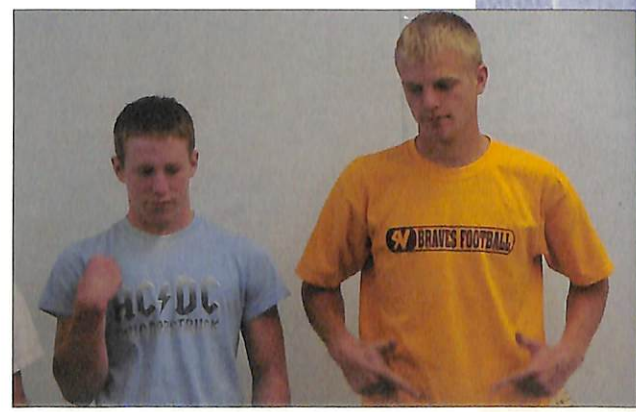
"Foreign Languages give us an outlook on different cultures," said Junior Chad Clark who took Spanish II and Honors French.

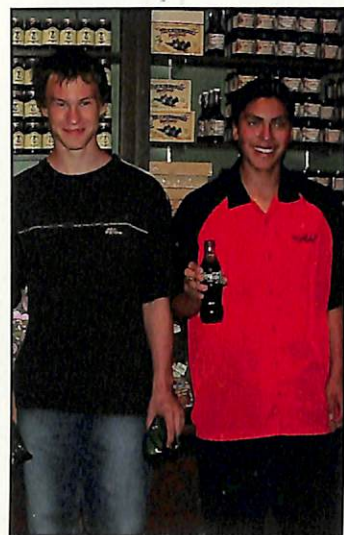

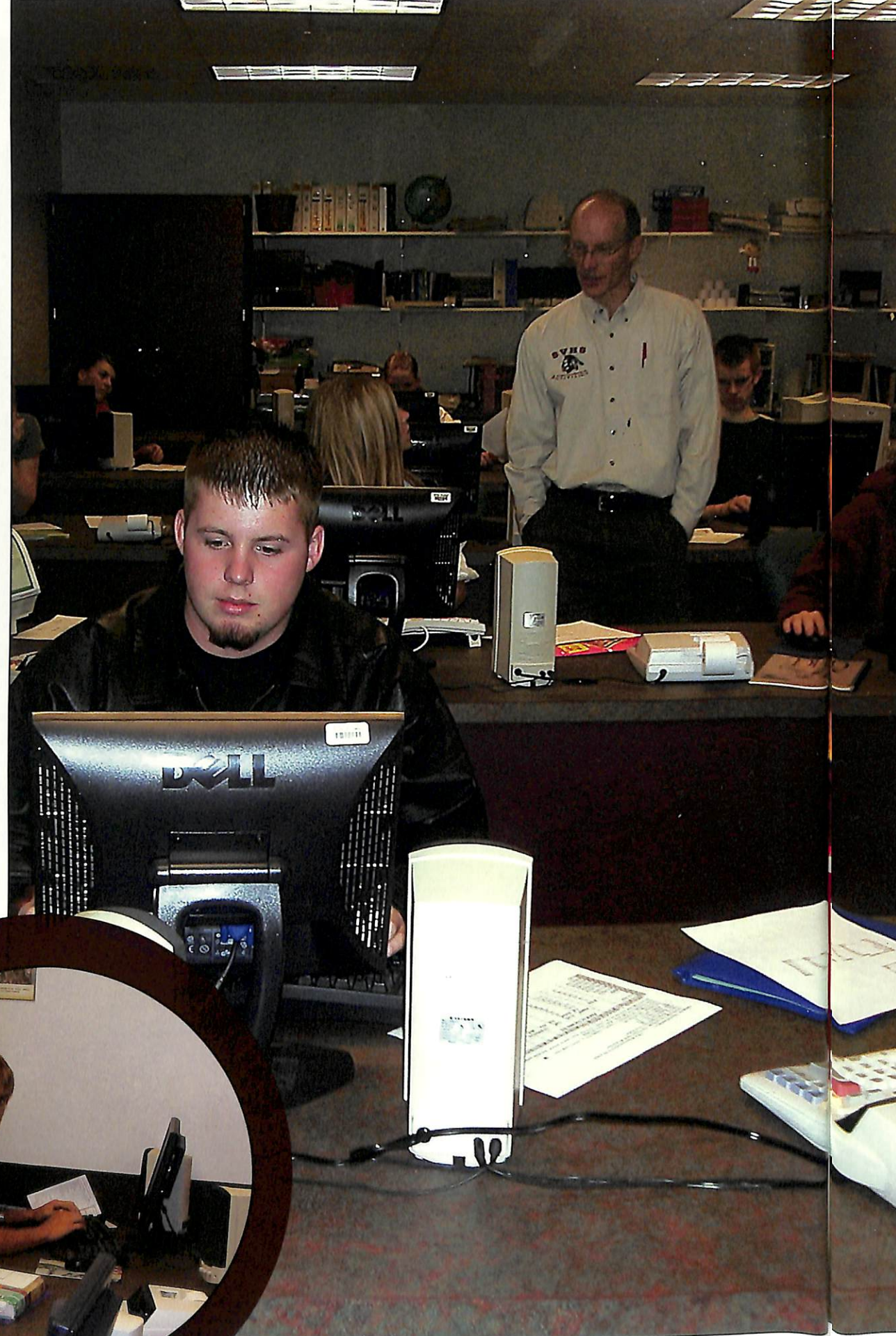
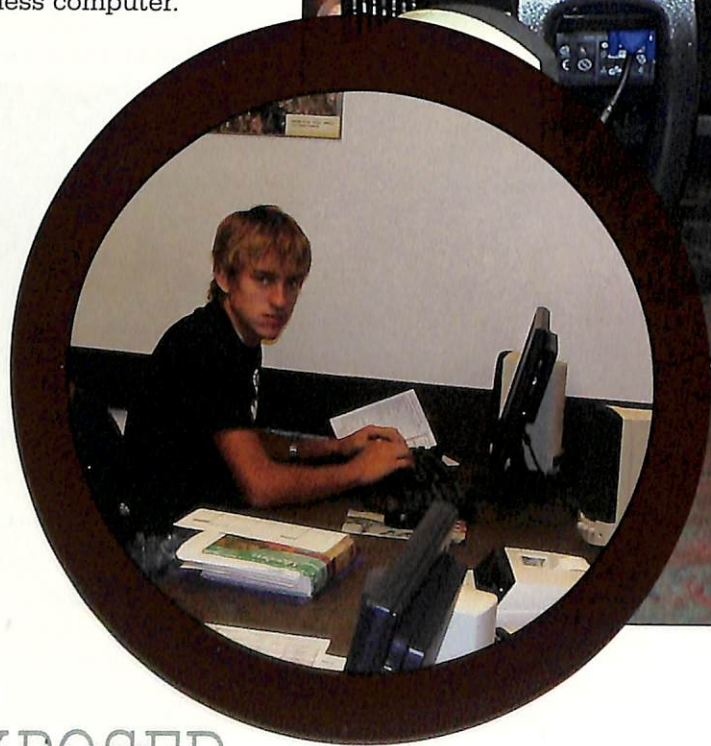

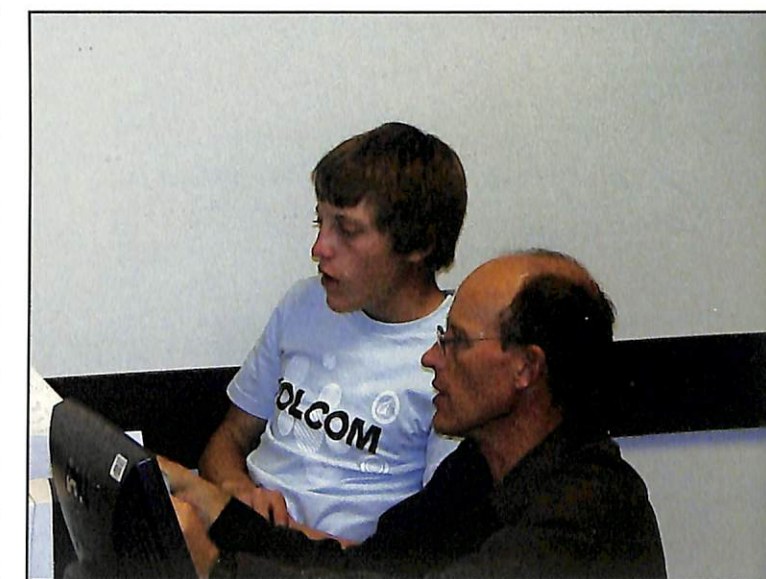
Mr. Eberspacher said, "Personal finance is one class that will have an influence on your future life; it will teach you how to manage your check book and your money."

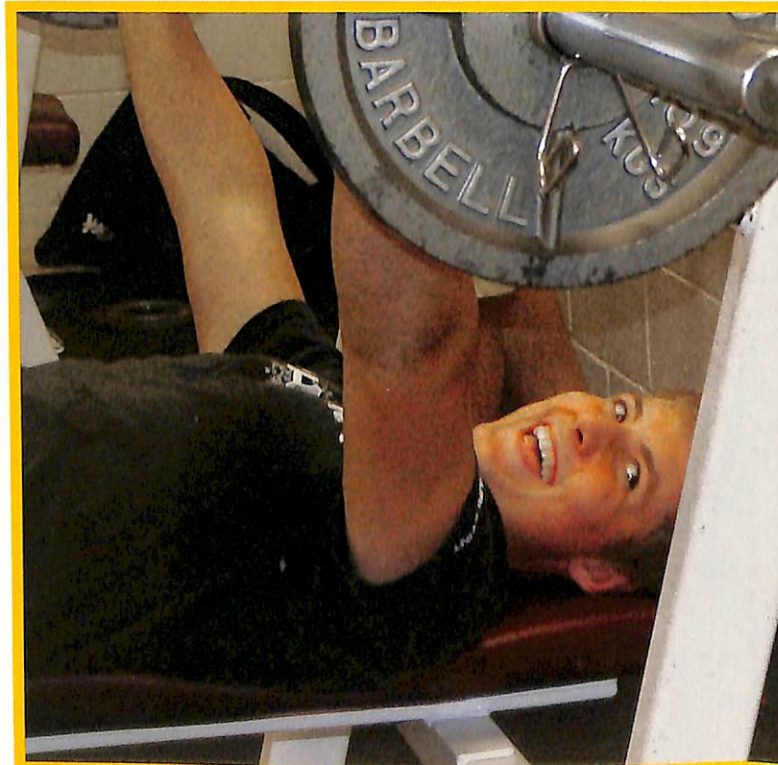

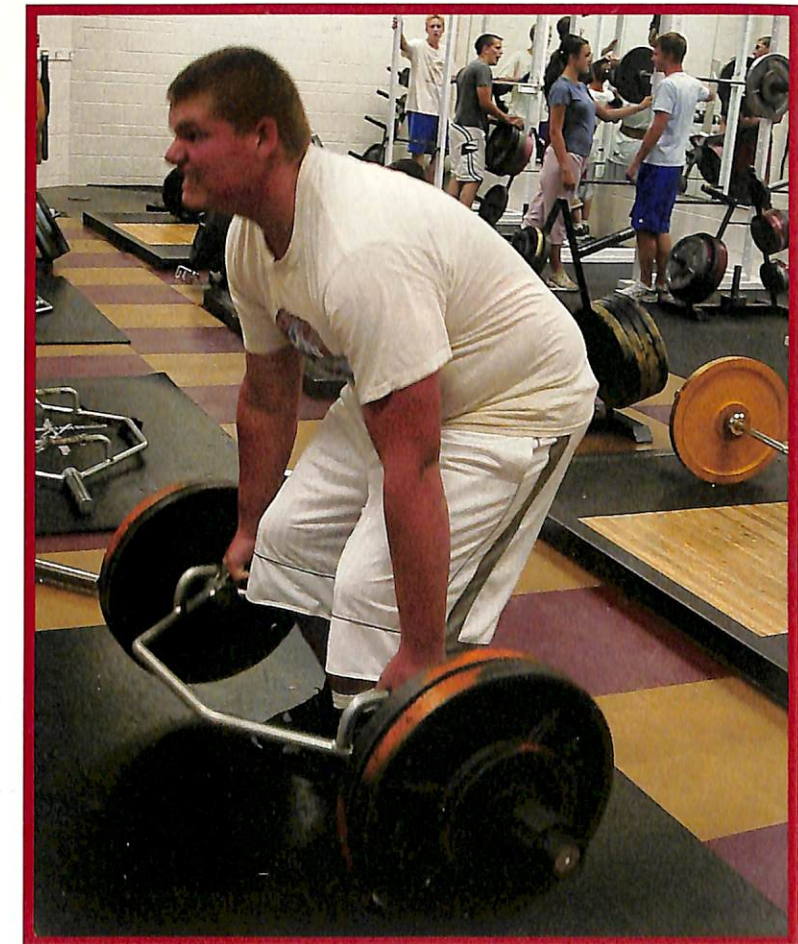

Choir Attracts Multitudes

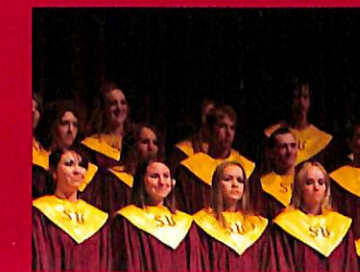

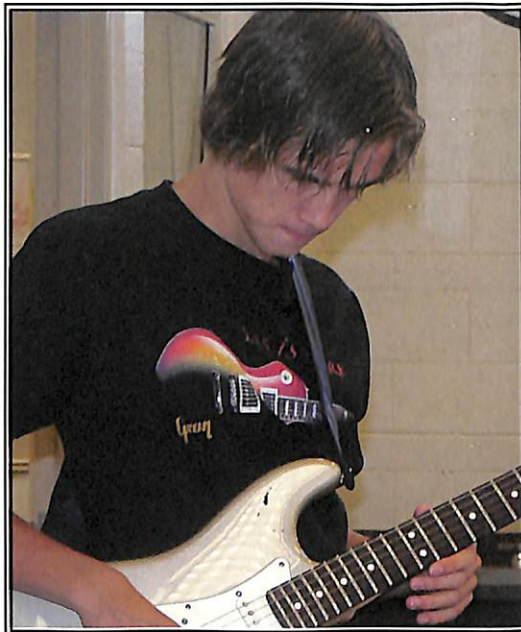

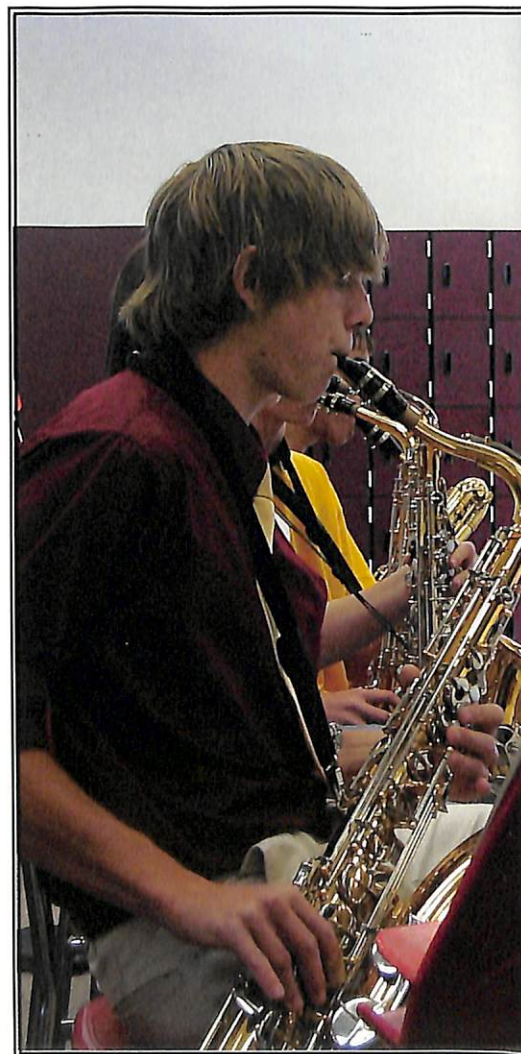

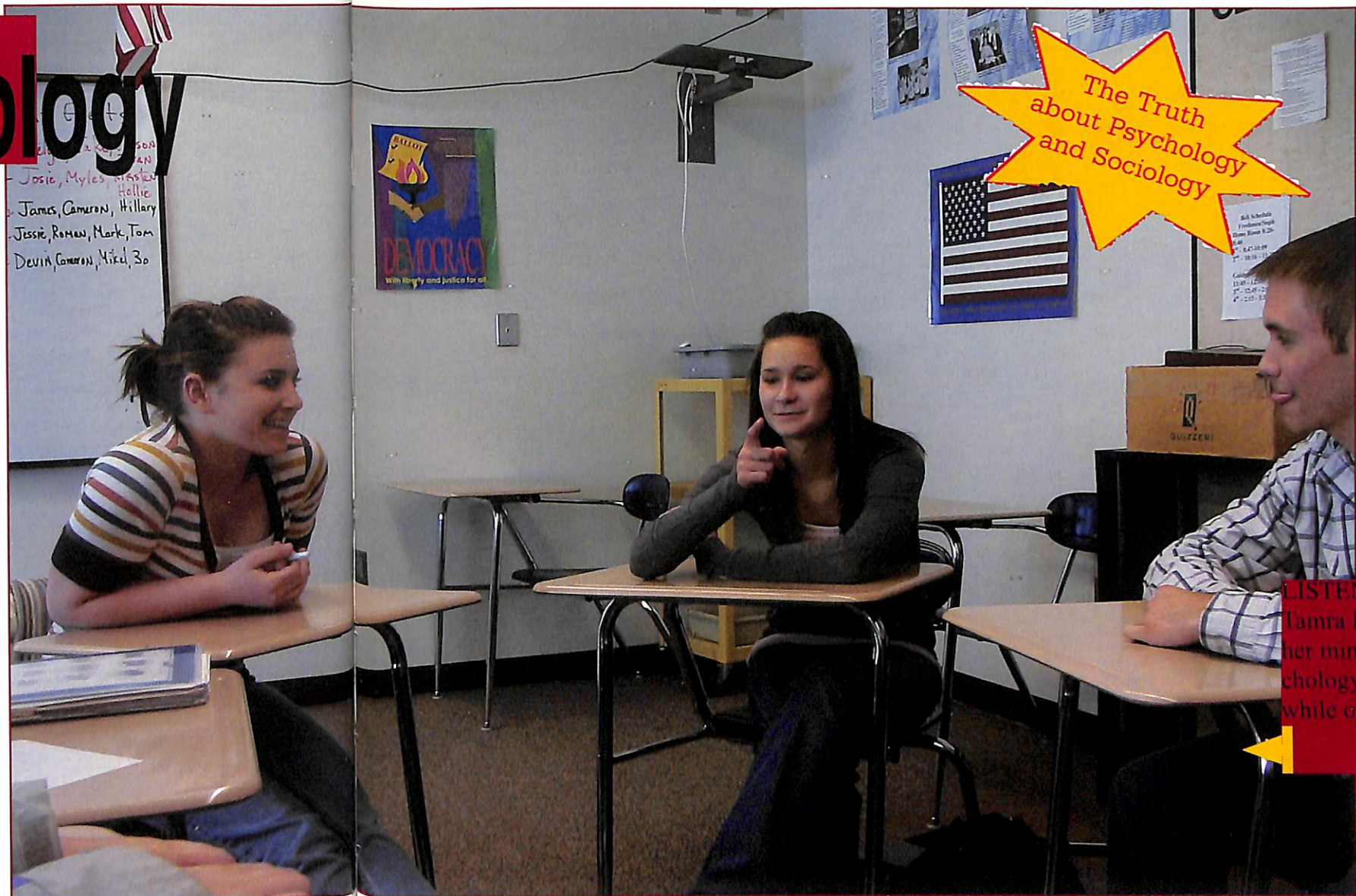

Exchange student from Columbia Nathaly Vargas said, "We went on some crazy field trips, like we went to the cemetery and to the funeral place."

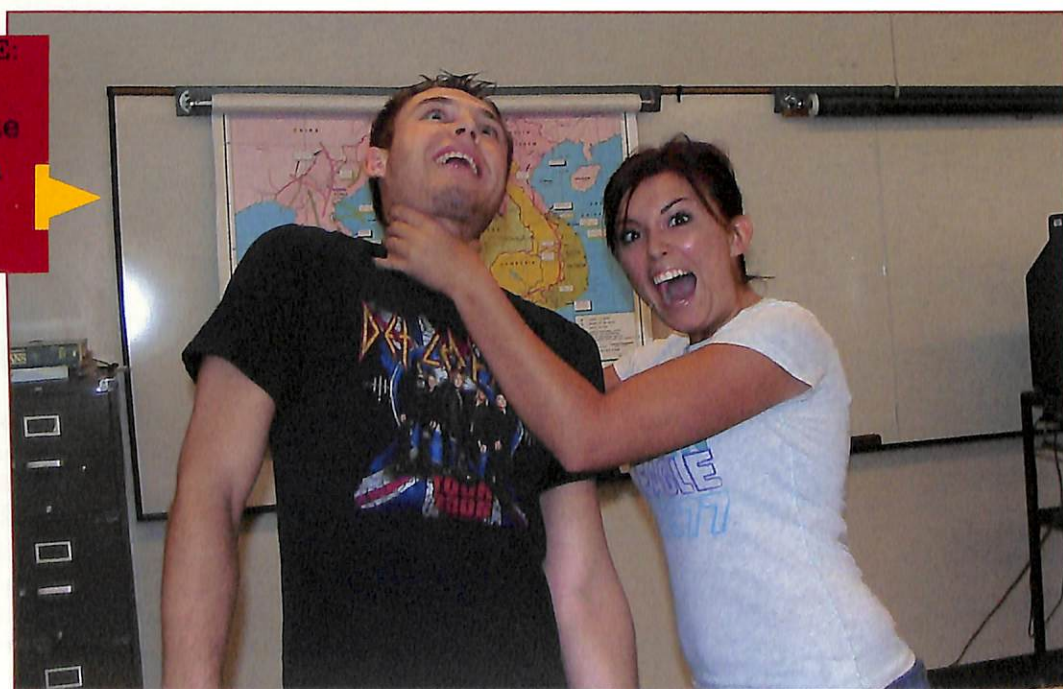

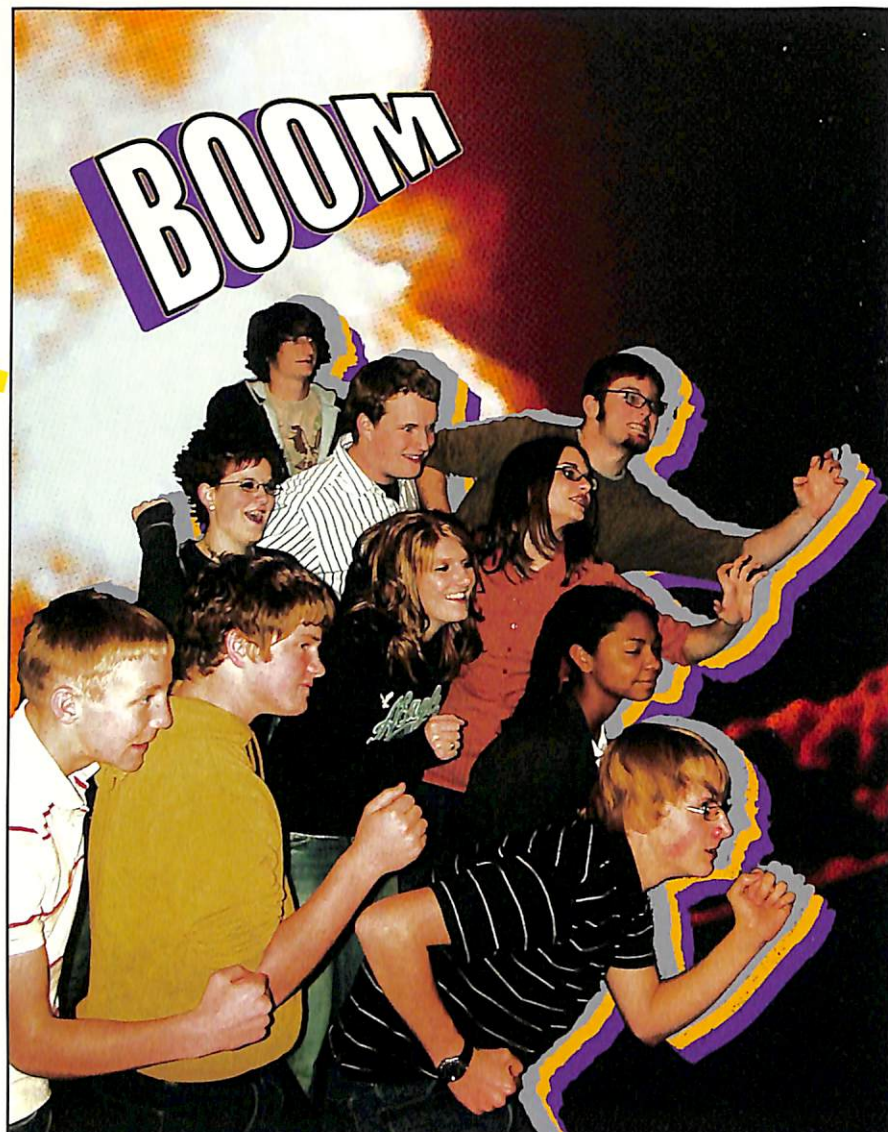

MOUNTAIN STAR FOURTH BEST IN STATE

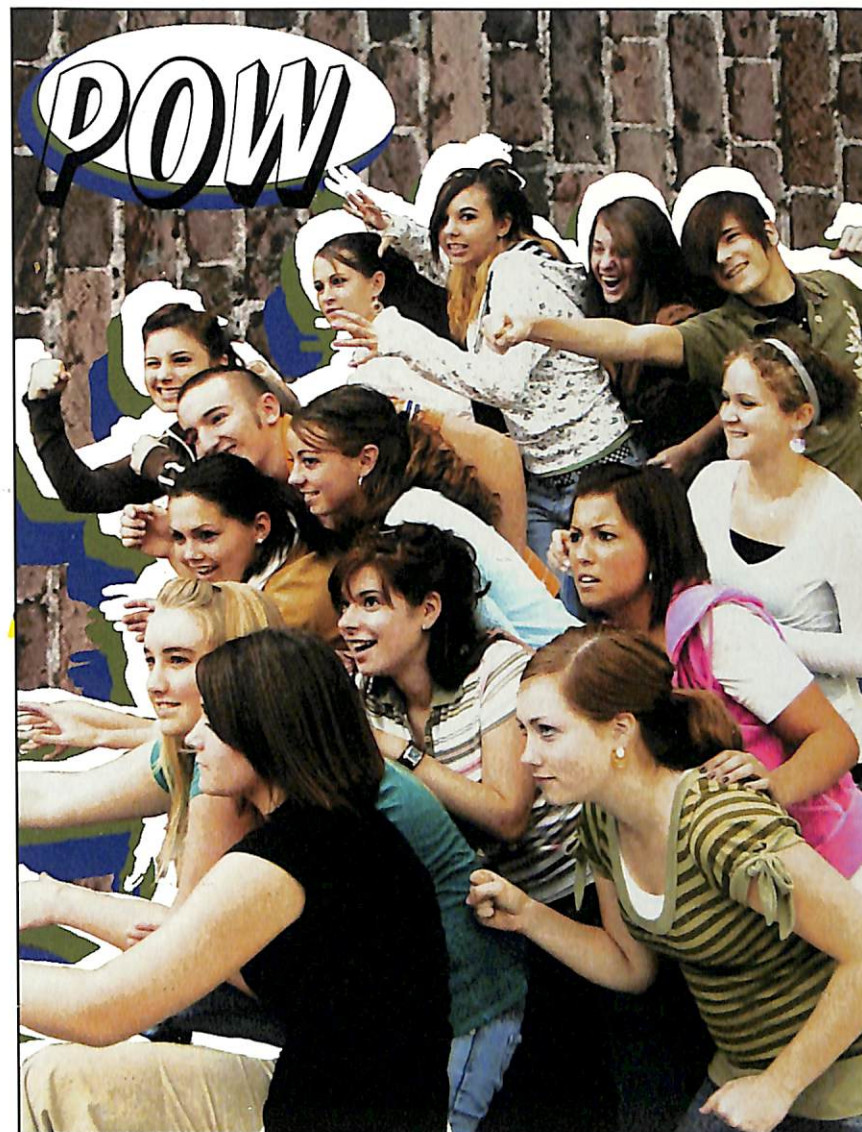
KA-BAM! Their deadlines weren't as pressing as The Daily Planet's, but the newspaper staff seemed just as super.

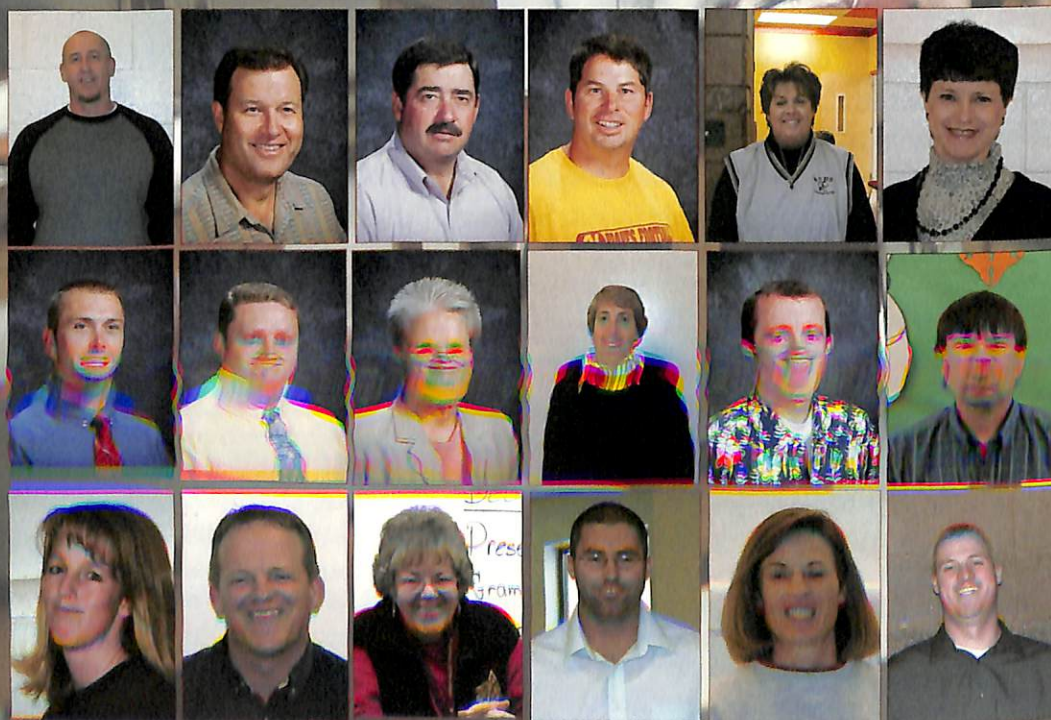

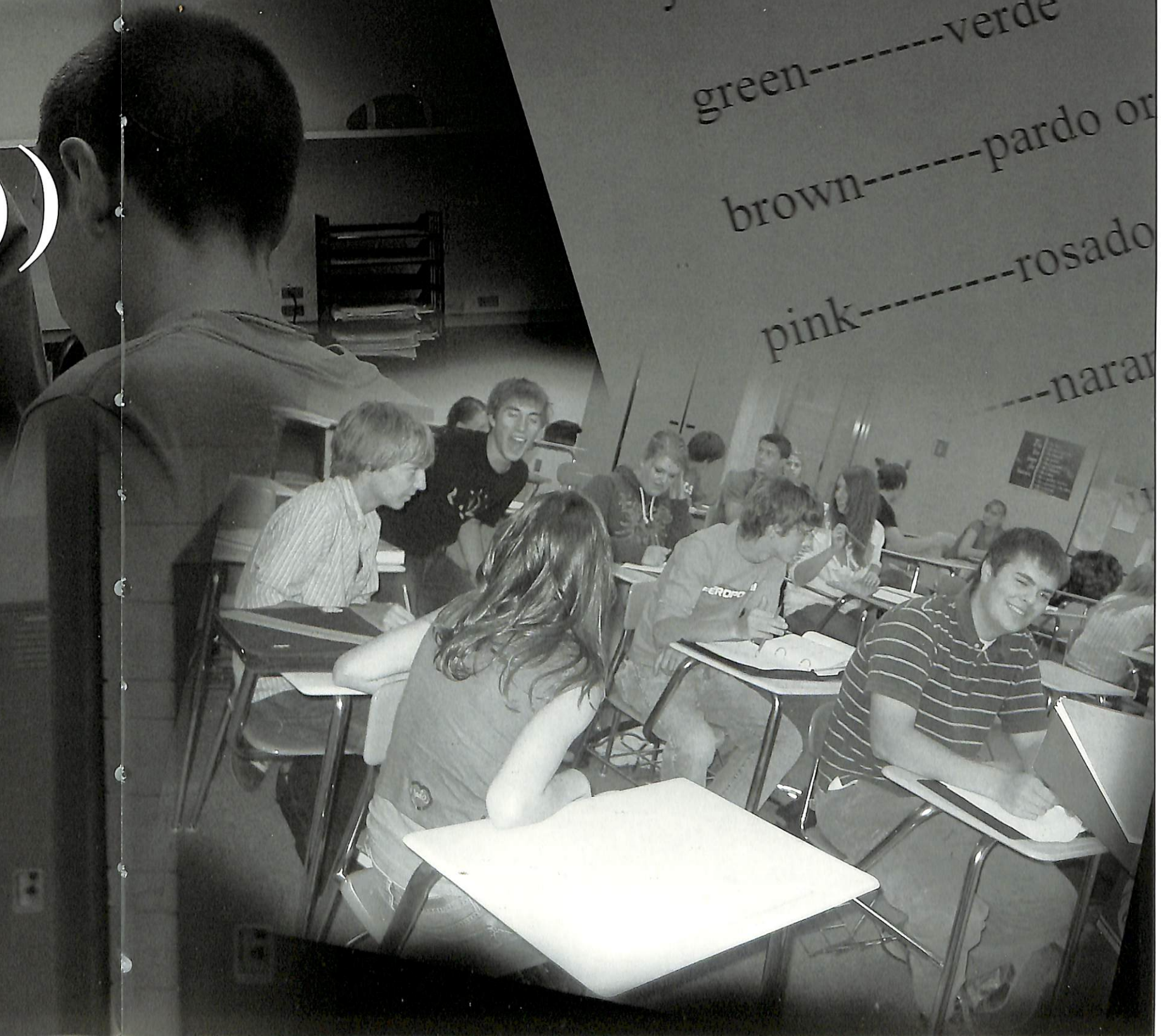

Blood, tears, and key losses all successfully made an appearance on our fields, track, and gyms this year. However, so did laughter, high hopes, and unforgettable victories.

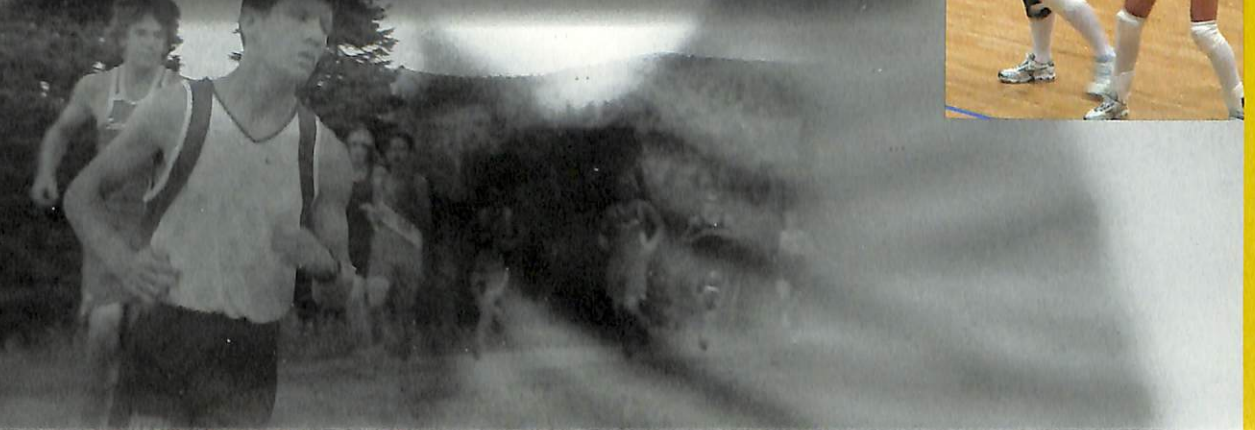
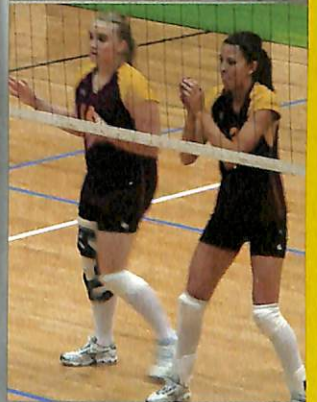

When asked about her cross country experience, Michelle Bowers stated, "It was hard, but very rewarding. The people were awesome and we were like a family."

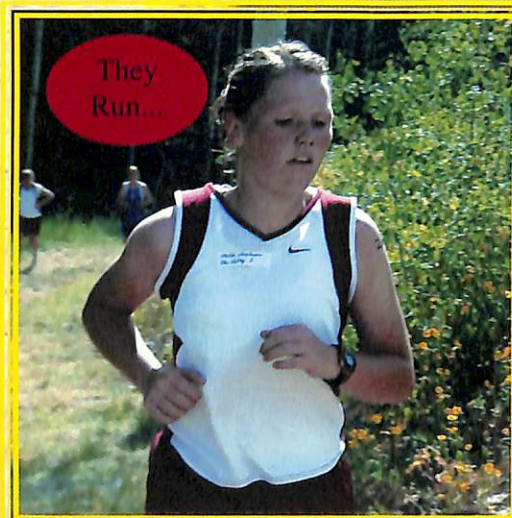
When regional and state competition rolled around, the boys' team took the regional title and went on to take 4th at State. The girls came in at a close 4th at regionals and finished 7th at State.

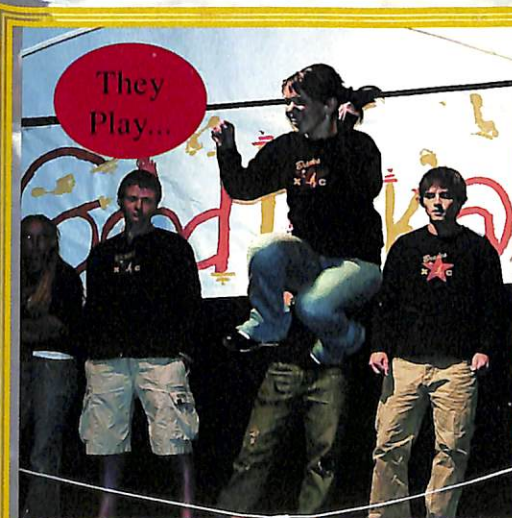

Despite the rough start and season, the freshmen ended on a good note beating Teton for a final win of the season.

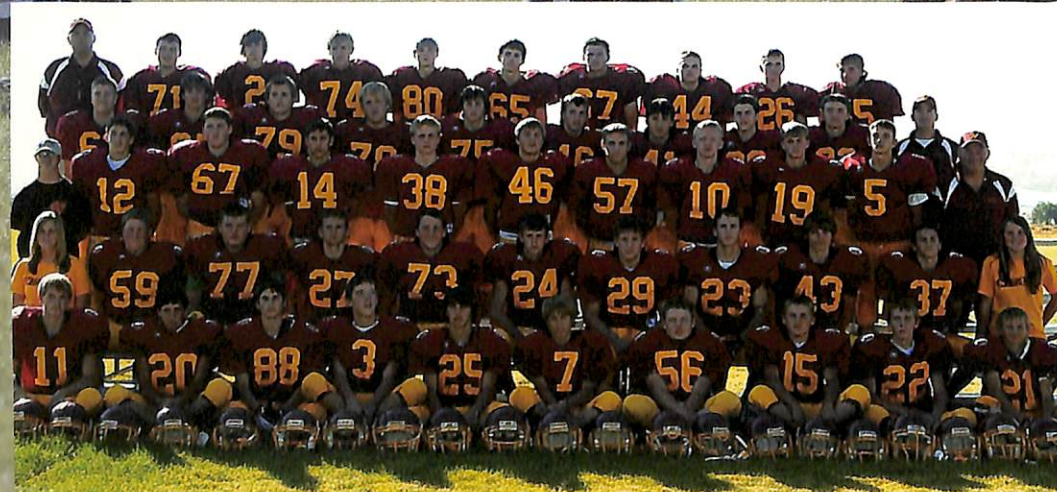
The freshmen will build on this win as they put on their J.V. jerseys next fall.

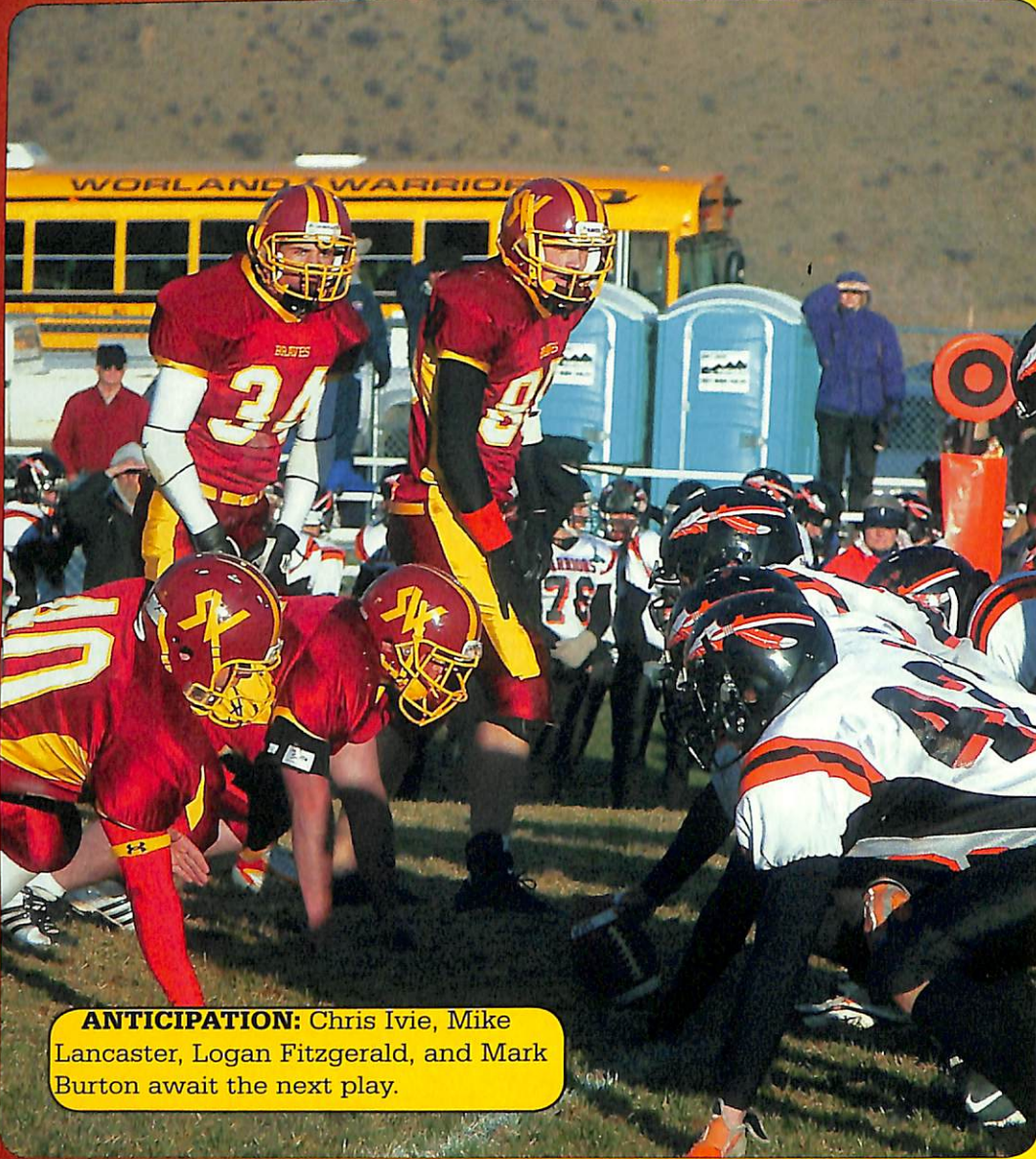

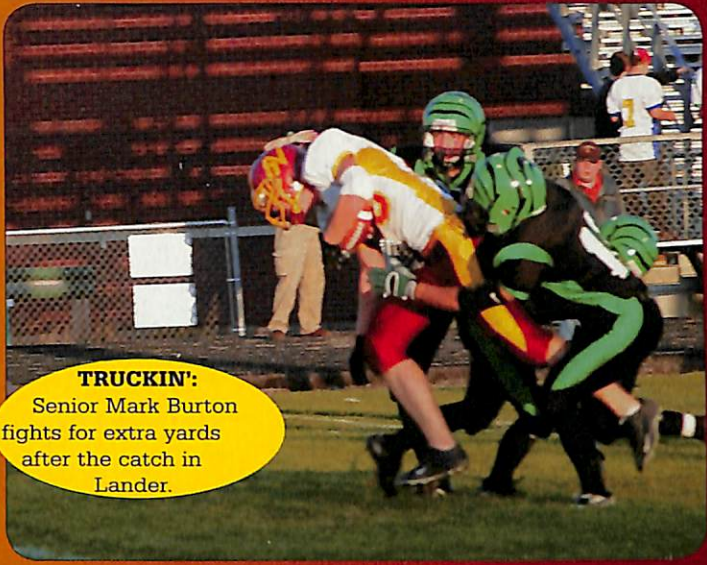
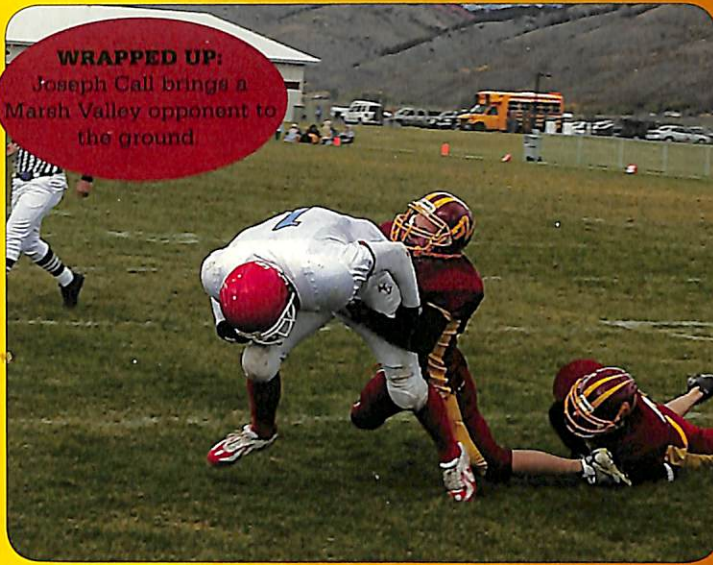

So ended another year of the proud tradition of SVHS Golf! Good Bye Seniors. Hello new golfers! Lets work hard and hope for another awesome year!

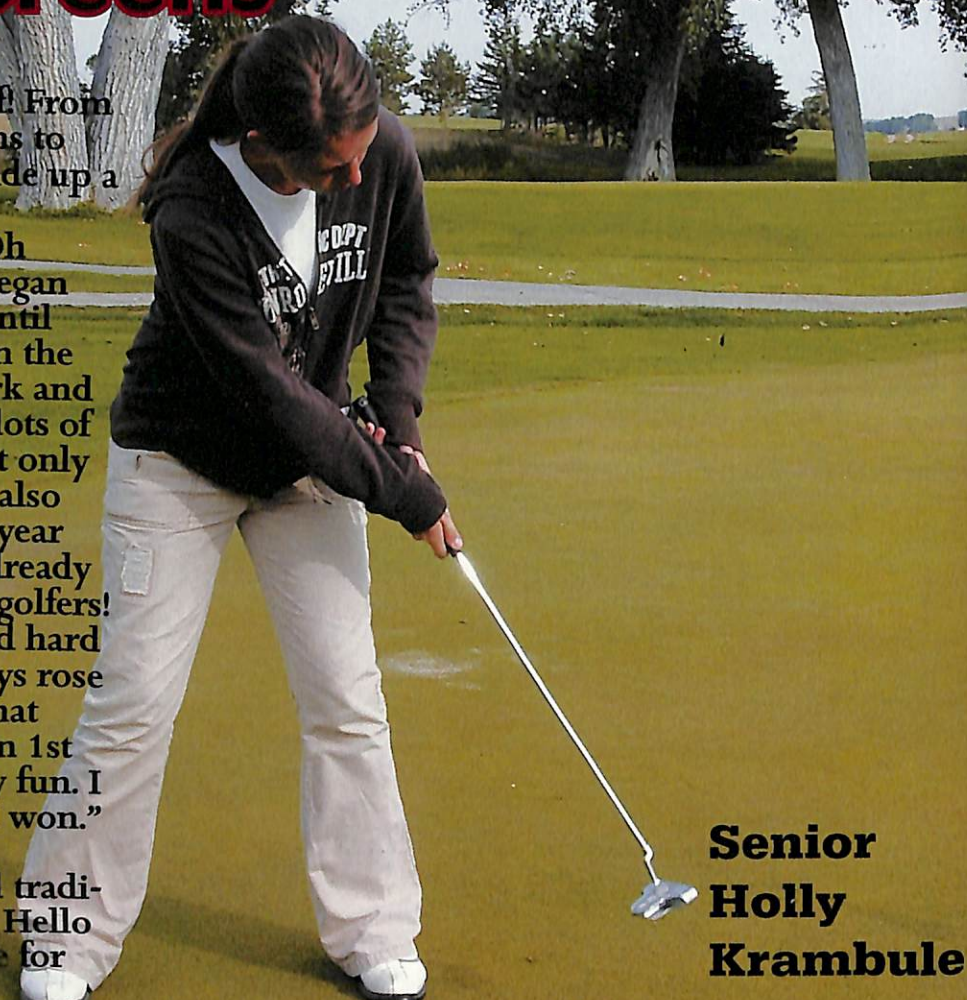

Braves Establish Winning Tradition

Tradition, a word that runs deep in the veins of those of the Star Valley wrestling team, a group known for their dedication, hard work, and excellence. The boys exceeded in another superior year. "It was a great season," said head coach Eddie Clark. "The kids worked hard and overcame a lot of obstacles. They persevered."

After completing an excellent season, the boys went on to claim first at regionals. Placing six men in first place, five in second, four in third, and five in fourth, Star Valley swept the 3A west regionals.

Having a 55 and 1/2 point lead over the second place team at regionals, the boys barged into state with a go big or go home attitude. Making history as the first team in Wyoming to take all 28 wrestlers (two from each weight) that went to regionals, on to State.

As the Crimson and Gold streamed out onto the floor as the returning State Champs, for the Parade of Champions they were met with loud roar, "Once you hear the entire stadium cheering against you, that's when you know you've arrived," said the coaches. "State felt like Star Valley against the entire state; it was awesome to

have everyone against you and still come out on top." When even teams from different divisions are cheering against you, you know you're in for a good show.

State featured some big losses and some big wins, but in the end the mat men were pulled off a feat that some teams said we couldn't, bringing home their 4th State title in five years. Landing four men in the finals and winning three of the matches, the Braves finished a total of 38 points ahead of the second place team Doubois. The SV group landed four men in the finals, winning three first place titles.

"[State] was a great tournament; it was so much fun. It was a culmination of a lot of hard years of work for a lot of those guys," said Coach Clark. "[Winning state] was a great way to finish up our reign in the 3A's," said assistant Coach Adam Guild.

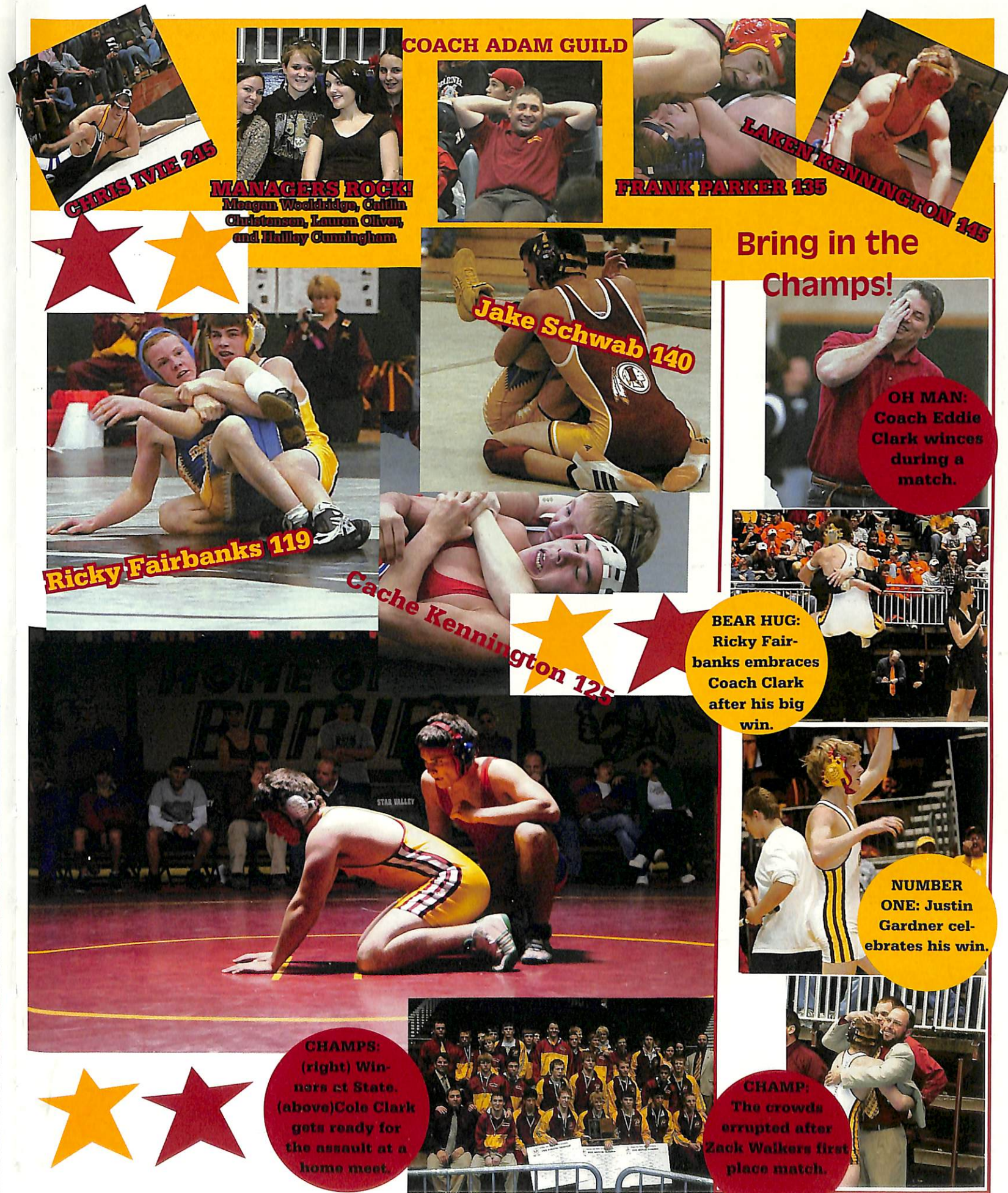

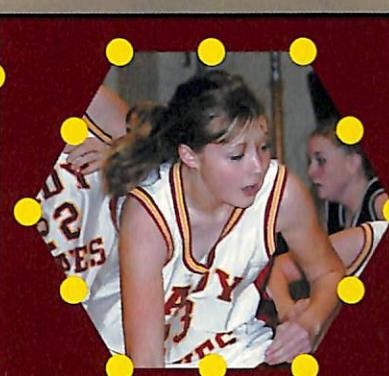
Not only did these frosh girls have to play in their own games, but they also had to help the JV team out.

An other old saying says, "Winning isn't everything." However, the Lady Braves won enough this year to learn that losing hurts.



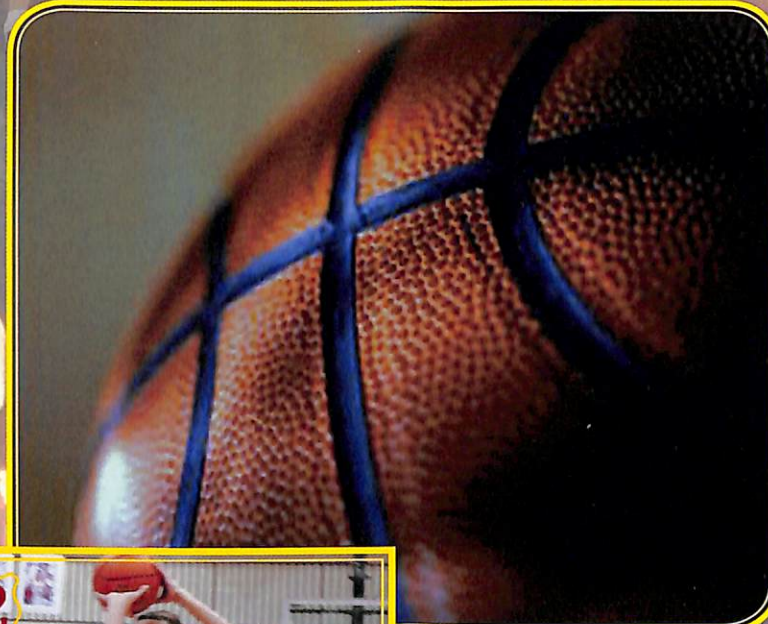
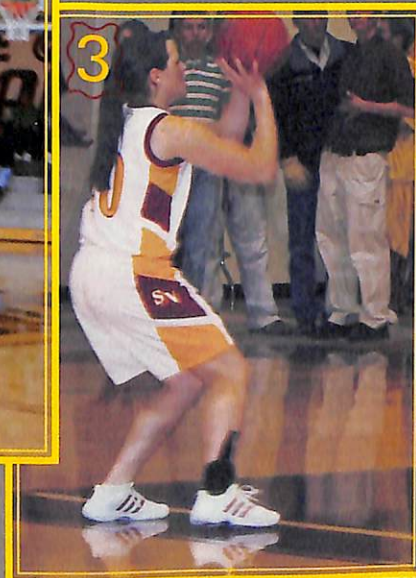

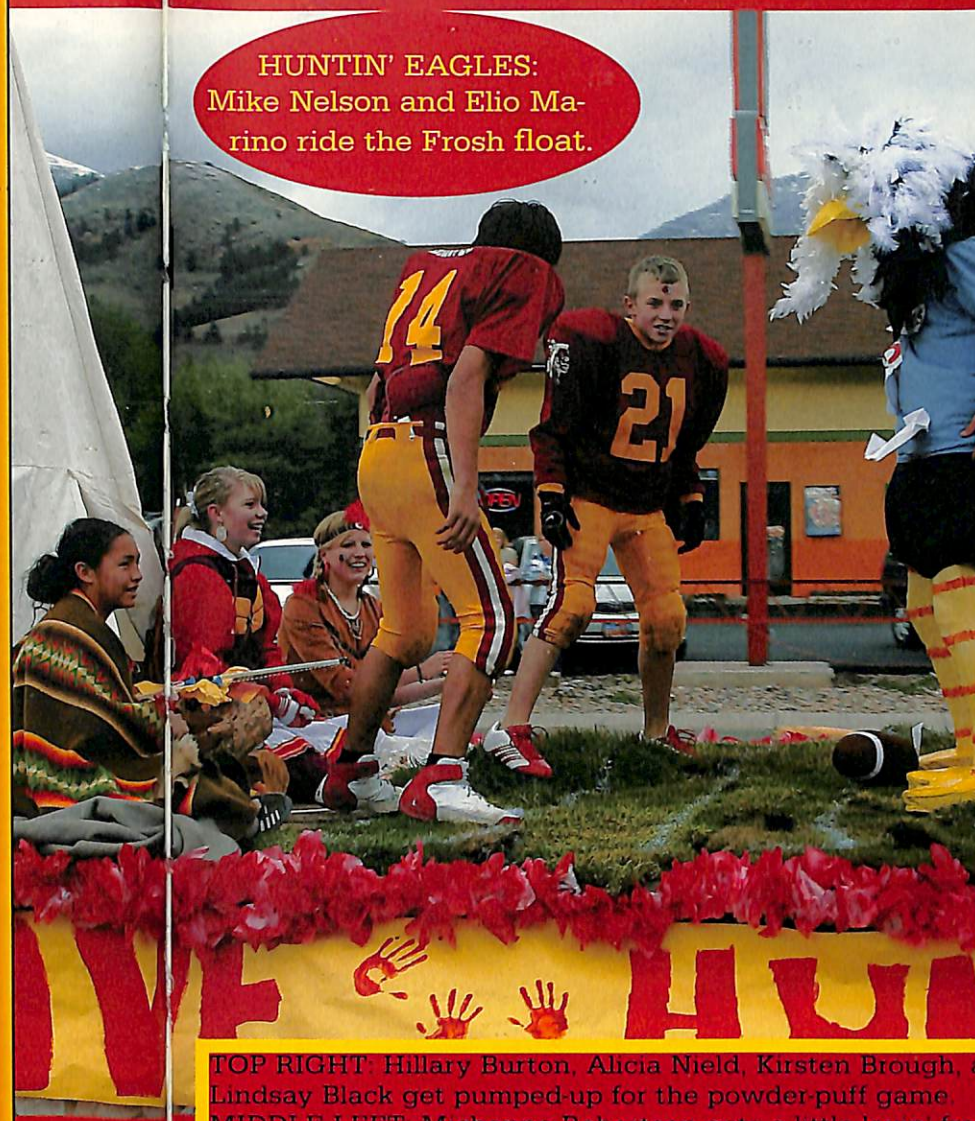

The powder-puff football game, an annual tradition,

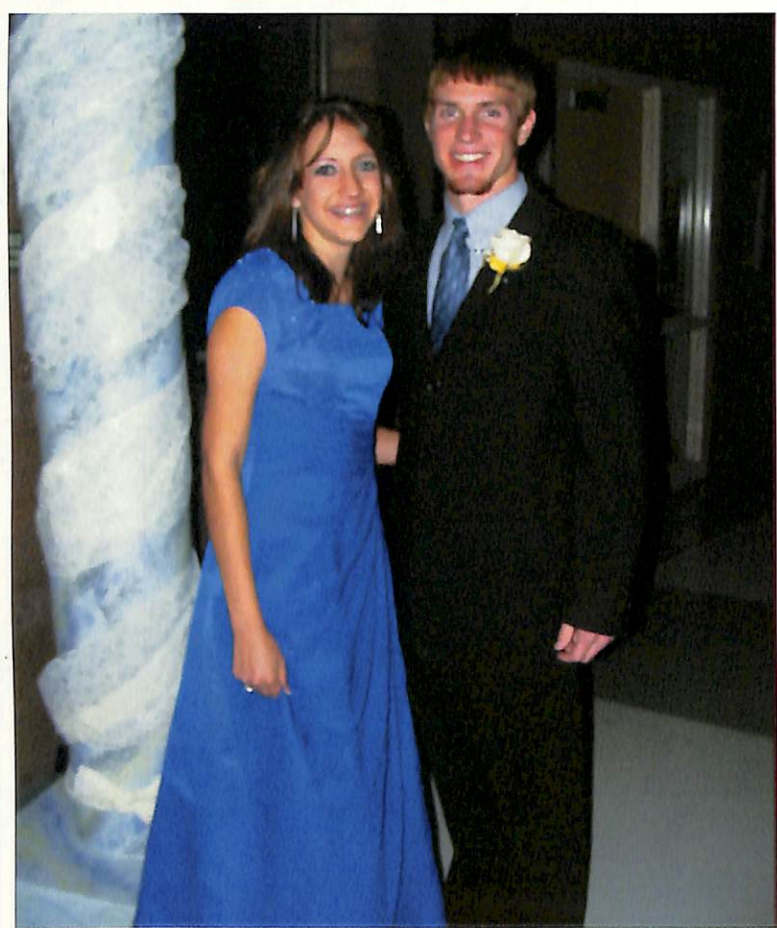

Most of us lived off our parents, but we could go only so far with that, so eventually we all had to work or get jobs, whether we liked it or not.



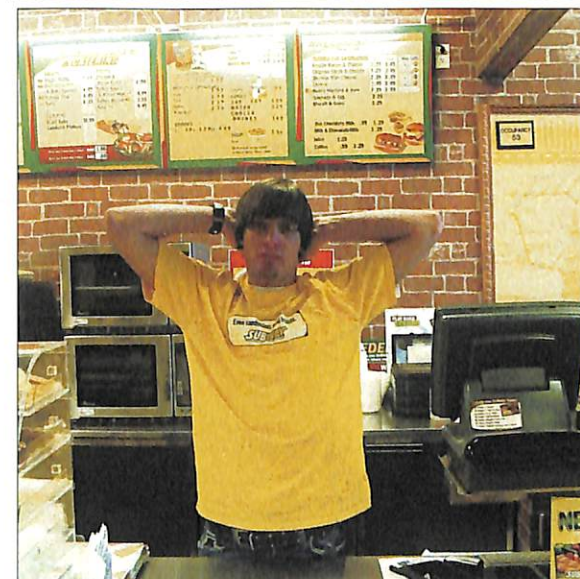

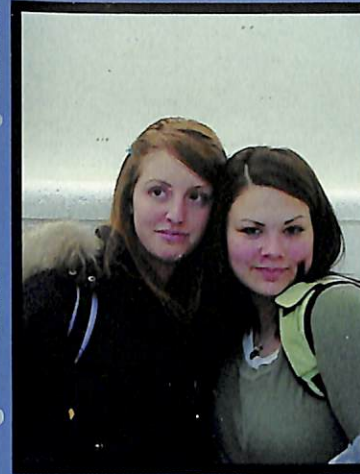

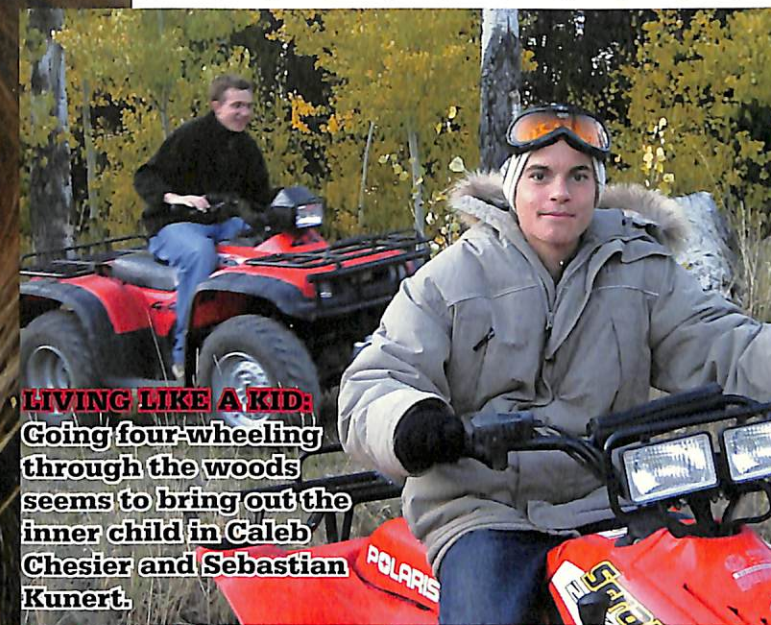

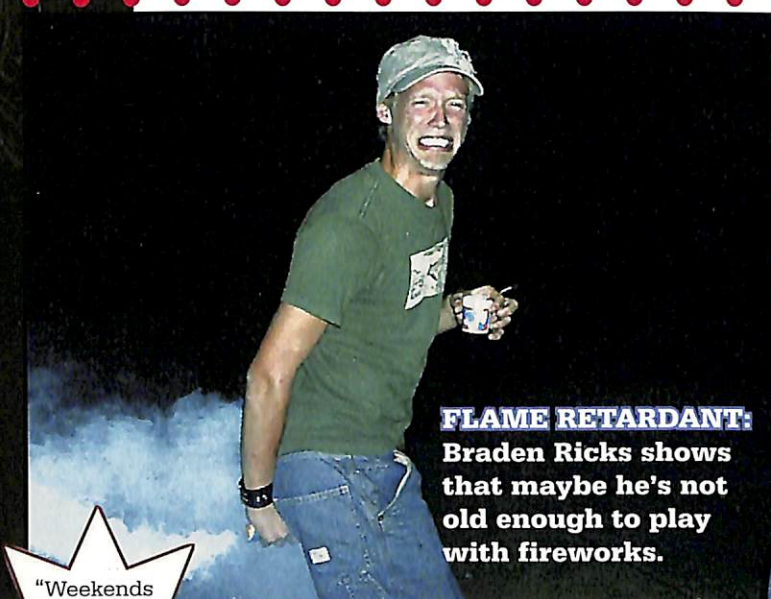

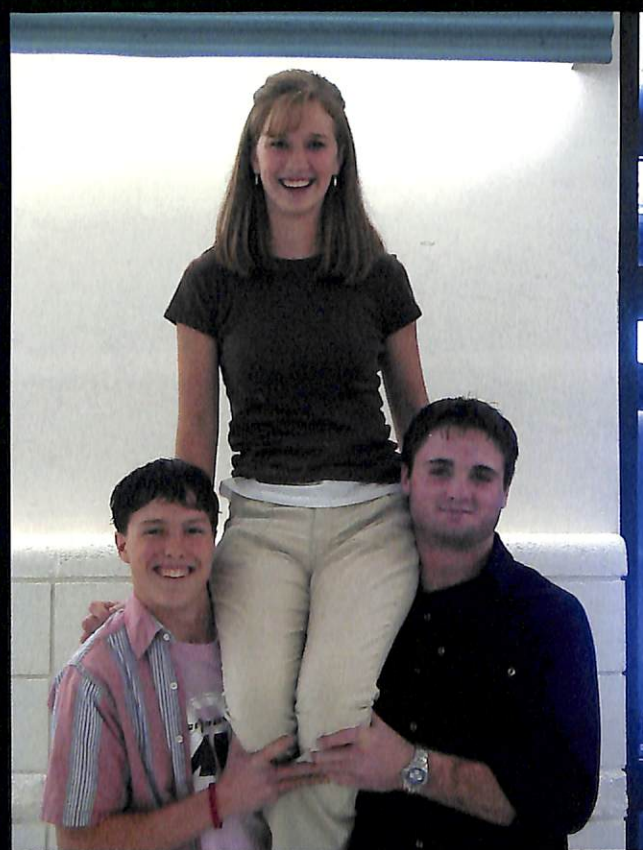

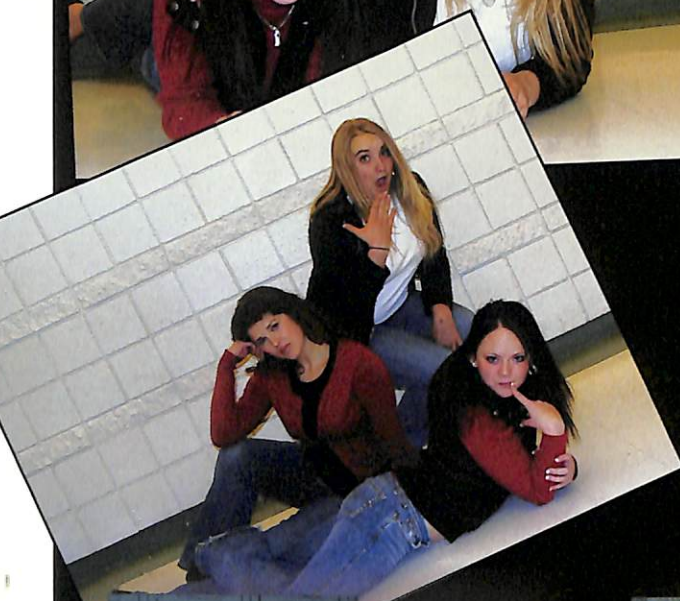
Please Remember...

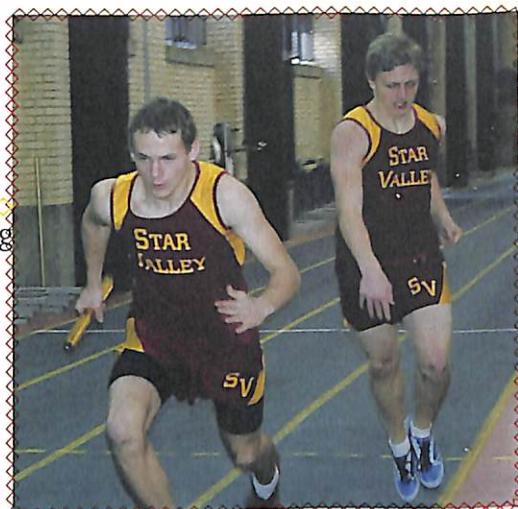


INDOOR TRACK

"Run Forrest run!" -Forrest Gump

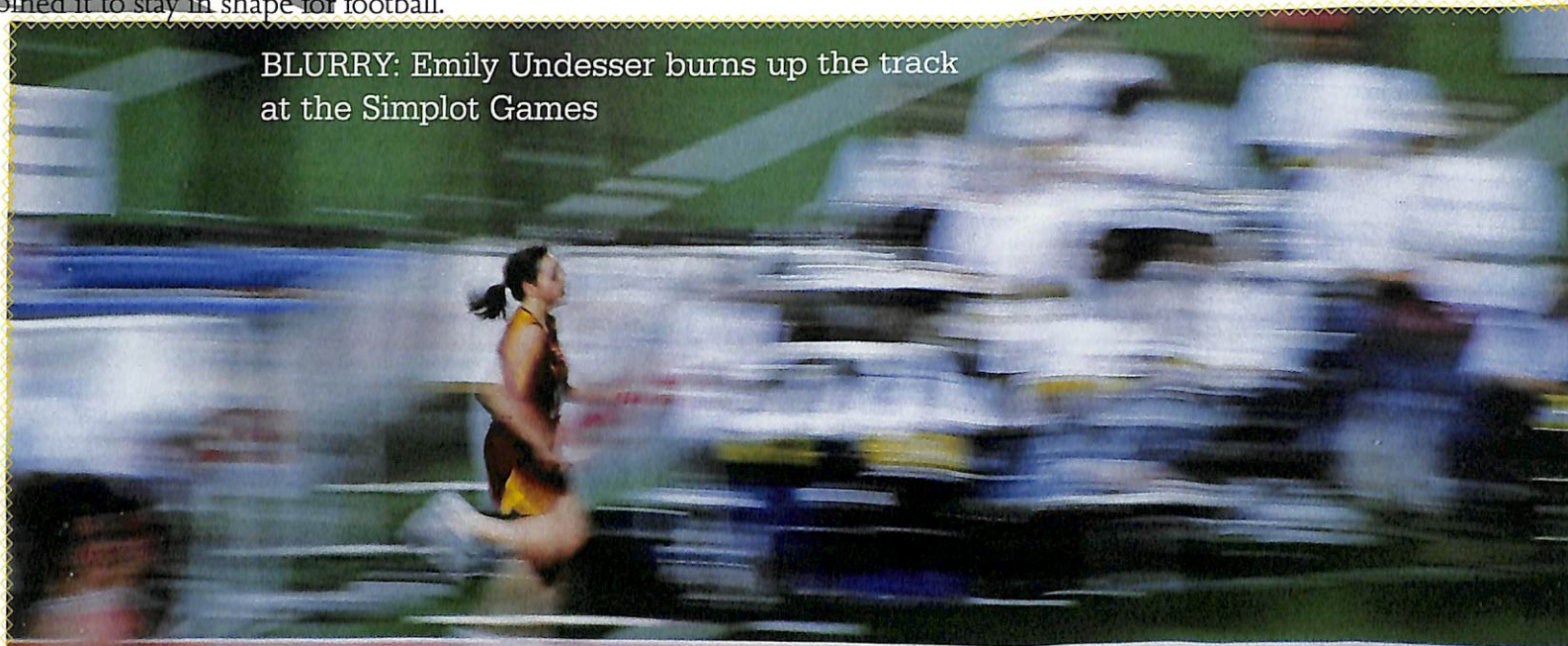

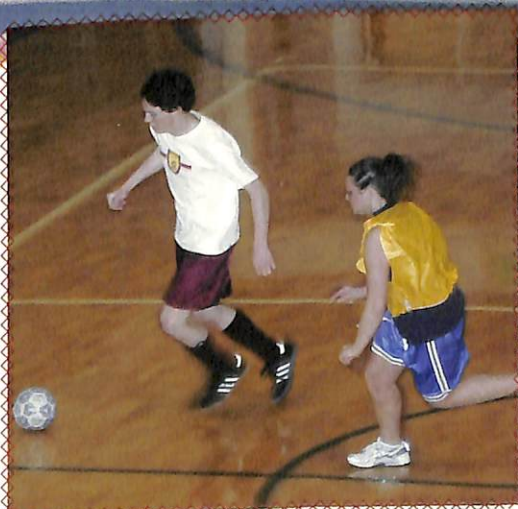


KICKIN' IT SOCCER STYLE

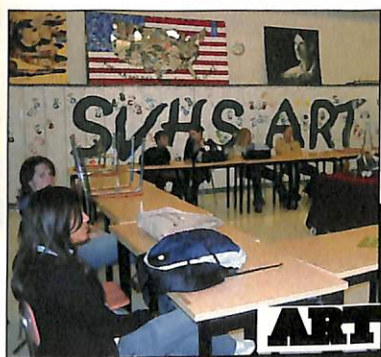

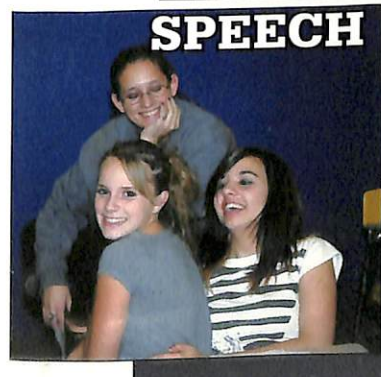

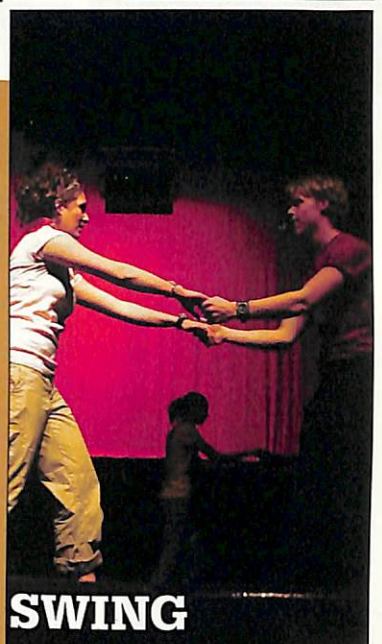
