
#### What do you love the most about SVHS?












Junior Ben Sessions said, "Without math the world would be lost because we wouldn't have electronics and nothing we would be precise


Even though everybody knows numbers and the basic laws of math but the concept of math can be super hard to understand.

Without this subject we wouldn't have the things we enjoy today, and it's the only thing that everybody in the world uses.







## SVHS leads state in PAWS reading

Why do we have noses that run and feet that smell? The school's English department could have answered that one.

One of SVHS's strengths has always been its English department. Through great teachers, great literature, and great students, language arts was a vital part of student

learning this year.

Students may have noticed that their English classes were a little larger than usual this year.

The class size increase was due to district cut backs this year; the school didn't replace English teacher Mr. Qualls when he left last year to take a job in Pinedale, so the existing six instructors

had to absorb his students.

This year we learned that the seniors led the state in PAWS reading scores as juniors, with 91% of the class proficient or advanced in the subject.







Out of the 683 students in SVHS, 300 students took a foreign language class this year. Also, earning a Hathaway Scholarship requires two years of foreign language.

According to these statistics, it makes sense that students at SVHS could take with Spanish or ASL. Spanish teacher Mr.


Casey Parry hopes his students will continue to learn and speak Spanish outside his class. He said. "I'm not sure to what extent they will, but I would like to think so."





Kessey Hanks said, "I like being in computer programing because I get to work on the Internet and work with computers."


Senior Kristopher Beech agreed and said, "I really enjoy being able to spend so much time working on the computer."

Christopher Galloway said, "I enjoy the technology that we get to use. I plan on taking more business classes because I really enjoy them and they look good on my background."







Students of any age, freshman through senior, could take the class. Weights was offered throughout the day and even before school in a program called zero hour.

















"Getting all-state was really cool, and a great way to end my senior season," said Senior Hailey Greenwood.


The Lady Braves had a great season, falling just short of a state title with an overall record of 29-7.

"This is the funnest group of girls I have ever worked with,"said Coach Brandy Taylor.


"My favorite part of volleyball was the bus rides and listening to Jennifer's eyeball," said Erickson.





Coach Winston Patterson felt that next year's varsity team can look forward to a group of players who will never give up and play consistently. This team reached their peak when they took down rival Evanston.


Coach Jeff Johnson felt that the success the freshmen team experienced this year will translate to confidence for them next year as JV players.

Friday night lights await these underclassmen after successful seasons.





Although the Braves fell short of their first-place goal to Powell high school and their season did not end as expected, the fight of the Braves was nothing but commendable.



















This group of girls had a great time together during a season that couldn't have ended in a better way!



Senior Walker Hoopes said, "We work hard to make life easier for the student body."


Together they planned the dances and activities for the school, lead out our assemblies, and took to keeping the vending machine full.





For example Sci-Fi day gave kids a chance to become their favorite superhero or comic book character.



Nobody had any complaints about this dance and that made it a success, a perfect end to a perfect night and a wonderful way to celebrate yet another win for the BRAVES!






More often than not people came up short of their desired prize. In fact, many times they may not haver shot anything at all.



Adviser Mr. Fullmer said, "With nearly all juniors on this year's staff, we should put out an even better book next year."









# Students find ways to serve in community



"Don't practice till you get it right; practice until you don't get it wrong," said freshman Sarah Jenkins.









hope to share my enthusiasm and love of music with my students along with providing them with the tools they need to grow into accomplished musicians."



Band members made marching band and pep band come alive. Without them our year would not have been nearly as colorful or fun.







Not everybody can sing but almost everybody loves singing to their favorite song. Listening to these elite singers made audiences want to sing along.



















"Being a junior is awesome; I have more opportunities and harder classes," said Melissa Espinosa.



Salvador Gutierrez said, "Senior year is the year where you are closer to your dream and you expect the best."







Senior Paxton Hokanson said, "The name on the front of the jersey is more important than the name on the back."


Junior Chance Merica pitched in some wisdom of his own saying, "If you ain't first you're last."

One of the better-attended proms in recent years, all who attended enjoyed the opportunity to take a nice stroll in the moonlight.






